Newholderness July 31. 1780

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I rec^d. yours of the 28th of July, last evening, as also yours of the 7th, containing the resolutions of congress, which last I should have answered sooner if I had met with opportunity.

The resolution of the 2nd of June I had seen before. But the general court having passed over two Sessions since my return without taking into consideration the affairs of the grants or making the least mention of my returning to Congress induced me to believe that nothing further was expected from me.

However I am perfectly disposed to serve the state whenever they will condescend to accept of my service. But it must be in a way consistent with reputation & the power of doing some good.

In short I look upon it necessary to call the general court together to choose delegates and fully to instruct them in this matter. If this is done I shall attend, that whosoever is chosen may be furnished with every help in my power.

I am very confident that the court, if they wish for my assistance, do not desire me to go in a character inferior to what I went in before.
