

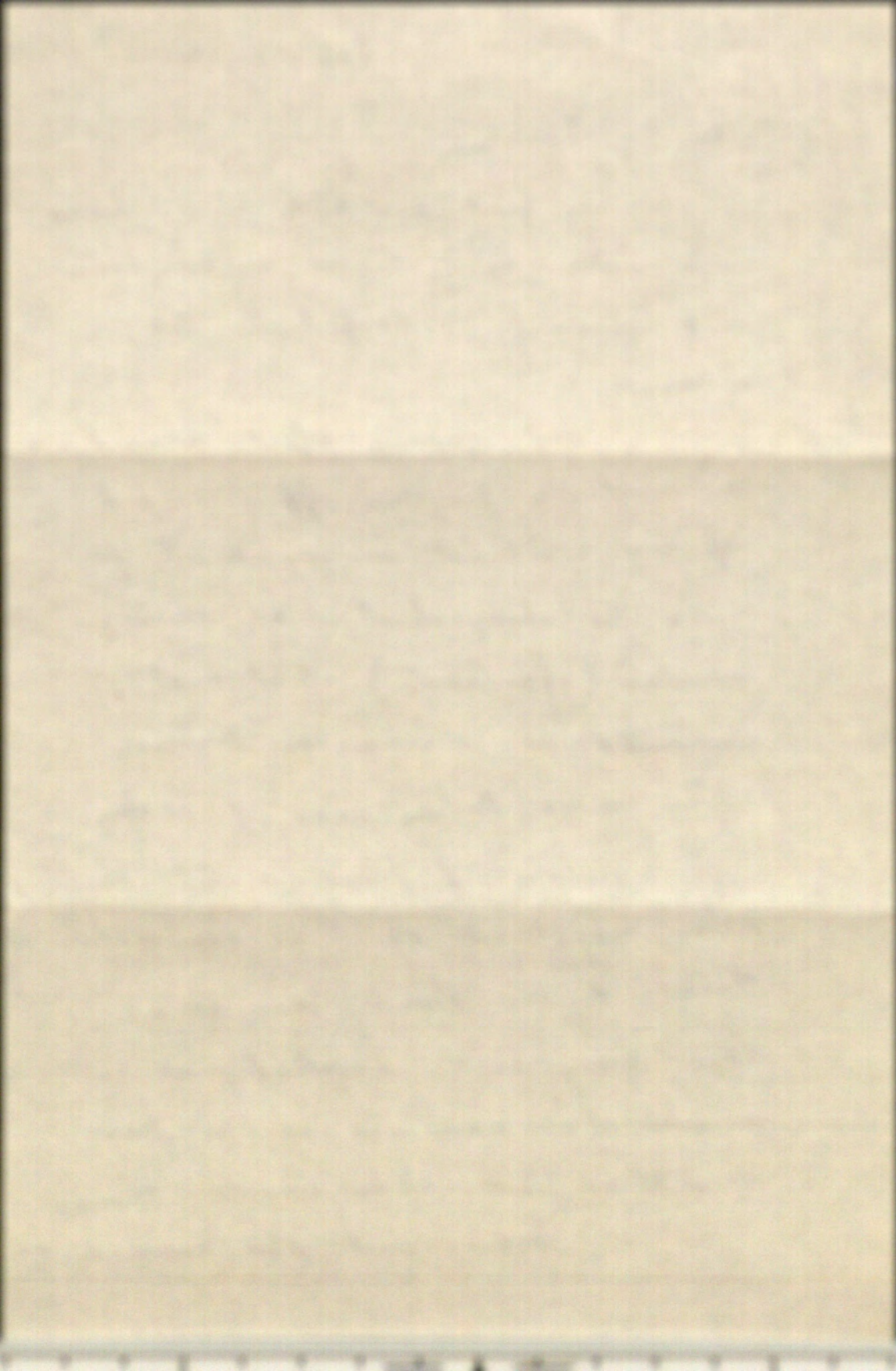
Feb. 10<sup>th</sup>, 1946
