You'll notice that my letters are trying to reflect my better spirits for the past few days so please, darling, don't worry too much about baby and me. We'll be well taken care of and all we need each day is some news of our dearest Daddy.

Only this morning I received your Monday letter in which you said such lovely things. Thanks, sweetheart. I've been lucky too, you know, in finding you. You also wrote out the directions for the filling of the 51 Gen. In my last letters, I don't recall whether or not I did manage to fill it with Pop's assistance.

Yesterday afternoon I received another letter from Bob in which he enclosed \$5.00 for Jimmie's Xmas gift. I answered him and thanked him for being so generous, but George, as I told him too, he shouldn't have done it because this Xmas is going to mean very little to all of us at home unless we'll be fortunate enough to have George and Bob home with all the family. Norel's hoping.

Last night Mom and Pop spoke with me, also your Aunt Sophie who just came into the state with your cousin Sonny. It seems as though Sonny is going off somewhere on a boat as a torpedo man, they both send their best regards to you. Mom and Pop will be here to-night and even they're in better spirits, believe me. My family called and I'll probably see all the folks again here on Sunday. Harry Abrams spoke with me for quite a while and I gave him the job of getting 10 films - he requested to do something. In fact, all who call me are getting that job - even John. They send their best regards.

Later in the eve I listened to some good music
permitted and finally to bed, after feeding baby.
Sarah came in at 7.10 and each time she comes
is such a relief to me. I like her even though
she's not too defensible.

I called Mr. Brown yesterday at 4, missed
him and spoke with him this morning at 9.45.
He said some nice things and mentioned that he
received a long letter from you, also that baby
and me should come up to the office soon.

Mr. Pinus also called and again I thanked him
for the stamp and when I offered to pay again
said that he doesn't take orders from a private -
meaning you - and the next time I speak to him
I'll ask him and Mrs. Pinus to pay us a visit.
In fact, I just spoke with him again and he intends
to see us soon.

About our sweet Sunny Jim. Now he's
napping after having a swell lunch. In fact,
he's eating beautifully, sleeping regularly and
is trying so hard to talk. His most common

word is still "dot" "dot" and he even
throws in a "Gay" "Gy" once in a while.

He sure knows his Sladdy and each time I
mention Sladdy he looks up at your picture
which I have nicely displayed in the kitchen,
living room, foyer, & in the bedroom
and 1 over the bar. You'd probably be
hysterical when you see the art gallery.
Have a sense of humor, have I? At least,
Jimmie will know you when he does see
you again. We're both going to see the
Doctors this month and I'll let you know the
results.
