The mailmen brought no news from you to-day so I'll probably get two letters in the morning mail. Do you get my letters daily? I write sometimes in the afternoon and lately in the evening when baby is asleep.

The weather was much milder today, the sun was out and baby and I were out in the afternoon. Winnie left me company and sends her best regards. Going down in the elevator I met Mrs. Ernest who wants to be remembered to you and told me that Ernest has a defense job. Did I mention that I get fresh eggs from Sam, the supt., whose father has a farm?

For the past three days Jimmie hardly touches his dinner but he does

all right with breakfasts and suppers.

It may be a tooth coming out for only today I noticed him pushing his teeth with his tongue. He's fine otherwise and is still full of mischief - he learned how to flush the water and drives me nuts before his bath. He'll probably put that wonderful plumbing system we've got out of commission. Sam again fixed the tub today as it started to fill up again. Over leave expires on the 29th of Oct. and I'm in a Guandry about the paint job. It's a lot of work for me right now and I think I'll have it done sometime in the future - I'll have it stipulated in the lease. It would be a shame to have it

done when you get a furlough but
we'll discuss it when the time comes.

Mr. Pincus called again to-day and
also your Mom. She told me about the
call they got from Bob yesterday (Wed.)
He's O.K. and knew you'd wind up in
an office job. All's well on the home
front and to-day I've relaxed a bit.

There's an eclipse to-night - the
moon passing over Jupiter and I'll try to
see it - occurs at 8 P.M. - astronomy
also fascinates me, dearest, especially when
I've got you as a satellite and baby as
a twinkling star. I sure do miss you,
darling, and still love you so very, very
much. Thinking of you all the time makes
me feel like a romantic kid of 17 but
