Received post card and carton of cigarettes you sent. Thanks for thinking of me, I sure can use cigarettes - all the time.

George, there isn't much to write about. I guess I've covered most every thing. All I have that is a little new is this.

Fran has a swell, really swell setup. She's working over the officers' club doing next to nothing. \$4.50 daily and all she can eat. So you can see what I mean. She's put on at least 10 pounds, and she looks like a million. Besides all this, she has a lot of good stuff.

For instance it is true that the big majority of washouts are being sent overseas. The training they have had prior to washing out, or after washing out, is of no

great consequence. Training will be
continued on the other side. Now,
I'm up a tree. Now I guess, it's just
a question of the fates deciding my
case. If I could only work a C.D.D.,
but this seems so impossible. My
eyes are really bad, and I don't
know whether these injections are
going to help. If I stay in California,
I will have my worst season. I
showed up highly allergic to 9
types of grass.

George, my sense of
humor is still unimpaired, and all
this is just so much nonsense
to me. All I want is to be a
civilian again, and everything in
between me and that is just a
waste of time. My spirit remains
unbroken, and I'll always hold out.
Hope you're of the same mind,
and that you are having it
easy -
