Dear George,

Received your letter dated 2/24, and am glad that all goes your way. I'm really pulling for you to get that deal closer to home. I can well imagine how much both you and Florence want to see each other.

I guess I knew you would probably react to my letter, telling you that I would not be eliminated, the way you did. We can bitch with the rest of them. But keep down I know we want to stay in this until it's won, and by our team. I hope Morn and Pop aren't too disappointed by the strange turn of events. There's no two ways about it though, my eyes are in perfect shape.

There really isn't much to write about. I would have been shipping tomorrow, but instead I will be here for at least another three or four weeks. Fran and I are both rather happy about this. We've enjoyed our stay here very much.

I shall probably be in another squadron, (97) along with 200 men or so who didn't leave on this shipment. The schedule will now read details and more details. As long as I can get the week-end off, I won't complain.

Doing almost nothing for the past week or so has made me awfully lazy. Perhaps the next 3 weeks of details will do me some good.
