

Wednesday eve -
March 22nd 1944.

Dearest beloved,

It's been quite a day for me and I will have plenty to do after I finish this letter. Baby and myself are just fine and handy and hope you're the same.

So happy to get three letters from you and also that snapshot. Your Fri. Sun and Monday letters came this morning with a Reader's Digest and also an Annual Report of the Equitable Life Assurance Society. If you want the latter, I'll mail it but I don't think it's important. Thanks a million for the snapshot and you really didn't have to bother about my gift, darling. When I see you that will be enough for me.

The weather was nice this morning so
 out we went for some fresh air and
 sunshine. Baby napped outdoors (11-12.30) and
 during that time I got the car and man-
 aged to dust it off a bit. The tank is full
 (10 gal. gas) and the car is in good condition.

After lunch, we went outdoors again and
 later in the afternoon I took baby to the
 doctor. Betty and Lawrence also came with
 us and I dropped her off at a relative's in
 the section.

Baby now weighs 22 lbs. 7 oz. and is
 31 $\frac{3}{8}$ " tall. He only gained 7oz and grew $\frac{3}{4}$ " of
 an inch. During the examination that son
 of ours fought like a Commando in battle
 and the doctor, nurse and myself

had to hold ² that rascal down. All he
had was a check up and nothing more, and
he's just fine. His molars are not out yet
but his gums are swollen. Before we left
the office, Jimmie got quite friendly and
finally sat down in a little rocker.

Later, we paid Sonny Shwin a visit
and she's much better. Her regards to
you. We all got home about 5:45
and after being in the apt a few
minutes Pop called. He and Mom are
feeling fine and got a letter and snap-
shot, too from you. Uncle Harry was
in the store then and spoke to me. He's
feeling stronger and is glad to know that

You're well. His best to you. Mr. Quinn
also called during lunch time and is quite all
right again. The market is moving up a bit
and it's a little busy downtown.

Al's well on the home front and my mom
will be here to-morrow to help out with
Baby. And I'm going to a show to-morrow
night with Winnie. We'll see Margaret
Sullivan in "Voice of the Turtle" - a solid hit.
The tickets are really Ben and Betty's but they
had to appear at the Board so they offered them to
us - I paid them last night. Will tell you
all about it in to-morrow's letter.

To think that my darling is getting a medal
for shooting - now I do believe in miracles. But
who wants you to shoot so well?
