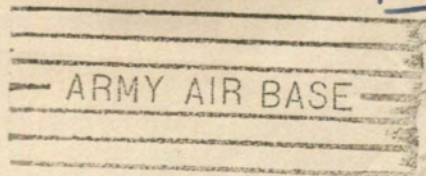
has essay, and advanced training
