Flavence, dearest:

Each day that passes by brings us closer to the day when you and I will once again be heartened and reunited by each other's presence. As the weather improves, and the sun shines more brightly and more warmly I look forward impatiently when we will be able to bask in its glorious rays together and with our Jimmy, our darling, with this is over and my time belongs to us, I promise we are going to spend more sunny days together loving each other than we ever thought we could spare in the past. After this experience I know what I want and what I want to do in the future, and I will permit nothing to change my mind. We are losing many valuable moments now, but we will make them up, or at least spend the balance of our lives doing so.

Your Thursday letter and Friday post card arrived this morning, which accounts for my having mailed Sunday's letter here to Bess. I presumed that you had gone away for the week when I was unable

to get you on the phone yesterday, and although I missed conversing with you. I am most happy you are making an attempt to change the scenery. With any break in the weather you and Jim should have a delightful week in the country. Tell Jim he is going to see plenty of the country in time to come, so he may as well get to liking it now. If he enjoys it half as much as his loving parents I'm sure he will be o.k.

As soon as you return home make an attempt to obtain R.R. accommodations, and although I suggested leaving on a Thursday it really has not matter, as I will almost surely be able to get off every night. However, be absolutely certain to advise me as soon as possible when you are to leave N.Y. as I must obtain living accommodations for you and Jim. I will forward to-morrow's letter and all subsequent mail directly home, and will phone you Sunday about 1 P.M. If you decide to stay on longer please advise. Should you be home to receive my call, please have my facts over too.

I wrote New Orleans about Jimmy's dues, and please advise when you receive the Candy I sent you for Baxter. To-day I received a box of macaroons from some "CANTOR PESKIN FAMILY CIRCLE" whom I do not know, as well as a box of Peppermint sweets from Bees, which was sticky and delicious. I will thank her in a letter shortly. Also received a letter from Ben who did not see the stock yet, as the price on it has improved. Please be careful of the

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Certificate until disposition is made.

Technical training usually lasts from three to five months. We expect to be here at least three months, and I think we can count on at least that time, after that a number of things can take place. We may be split up and sent to another outfit for additional training. A group may be selected from this battalion (about 75 men) to train another new battalion; and we may be shipped overseas for further training and seasoning before getting in or near a "theatre of operations". With the war news and draft news improving, I feel as though we can remain optimistic. My feet bother me very little, but one of these days I'm going to visit the doctor and really complain; when I think it will do me the most good.

I feel fine. Hope you and Jim are having a wonderful time, and how I know you'd love for me to be with you, but that too will be soon. You and Jim kiss each other for daddy. Give Bess, My and Jim my best, as well as Eleanor, and I trust you are not causing too much trouble,
