

Wednesday eve -
May 24, 1944.

George, dearest,

All's well in your little kingdom and we stayed in again to-day because of the rain. The weather for the past 2 days belongs to the month of April but it's always welcome so I can catch up with things. Jimmie is just finishing his supper and I started this letter so I can get it out by 7.30 p.m. There was no letter from you to-day so I'll expect two of them to-morrow, I hope.

There isn't much news to write except that I did go to the Farrugut last night and saw "Standing Room Only" with Fred MacMurray and Paulette Goddard. It was a very amusing picture and I laughed right out loud and had a good time. The other picture was a big scout killer diller with Henry Arick. When I got home, baby was fine and Ben and Betty talked with me for almost an hour. They send their best regards to you.

In the morning, I awoke to the patter of the rain and baby slept until 8.10 A.M. He had a nice breakfast, first said his usual good morning to you and then later helped me with the lunchbox chases. What a mess he makes of each room and to-day, while doing the linen closet he made sure to take out all my shoes, the hot water bag and my couch bag. He's a riot, looks like a little angel and is up to something new each day. The outtaus ~~is~~ ^{is} more appealing to him but when the sun shines again, will be out.

Spoke to Thelma and all is fine, under the circumstances. Joel looks healthier and enjoys the home life more than that of the hospital. Also spoke to Eleanor and my mother, who are both well. Danny called a short while ago and inquired about the transfer and the latest from you. His best to you. Also spoke to Mom and Uncle Harry, who was in the street at the time. The folks are well and Harry received a card from you which he'll answer soon.

The telephone bill came to-day and it's the highest we've had to date. Amount is \$13.35. I called the phone company about it and couldn't understand why we had 61 add. local calls. They'll check it and let me know by Friday. Out of town calls (min. 48¢. Per) amounted to \$3.90 + 98¢ tax - total 4.88. Your calls are not expensive but I'll have to cut down on the locals.

I've read one of your letters today and laughed to myself about your description of the men lined up for that "certain" inspection. Don't that short arms inspection?

How are your jobs coming along and what's new with the major and the transfer?

Remember that I always love you, darling, no matter where you are and I'll keep those spirits high until I see you again. All my devotion and a kiss from precious. Love from the folks.
