Our wonderful months together in St. Paul will ever be a "happy interlude" in our blissful life together, and I will always remember every moment.

Your Friday letter arrived to-day, and thank you for all the information. I'm sorry to hear about Birdie's plight, and I sure feel



sorry for Charlie and her. It seems
a pity for such a young person to be
so afflicted, but such is life. Every
person seems to have his or her
little burden to bear, but I sure
hate to learn that their burden is
so large and heavy.

all goes well with me, the
weather is lovely, and I imagine the
trip will be pleasant. It is my
opinion that I may not be able to
write again from this camp, and even
this letter may be censored or delayed.
Don't worry, and I'll contact you as
soon as I know the score.

I'm glad Jim found the
letter's inspection, and I hope you
are not kidding about yourself. I
had about Eleanor's finger, and please
tell how sorry I was to learn about
her accident. Do the folks look well?



Have had a pretty busy day and evening, and everything is in order. There has been a great deal of hilarity about the camp as we admired some of the B-9 haircuts. Some boys have had their heads shaved, others have a V on their head; some are cropped close with just a tuft in front, and others are beyond written description.

I'm glad the car is O.K. and perhaps you'll get a chance to use it in the near future. My best to everyone, a kiss to my beloved wife and dearest son, and I'll be sure to write as soon as I can. All will be well, and the war will end soon; until then you find me loving you
