## Newcomers hold the key for Keene State College

If there is one word to describe the Keene State baseball team it is young. This year's team is made up of 10 freshman, eight sophomores and is rounded off by five returning upperclassmen from last year's fifth place team (10-17, 6-8 NECC).

Although the team may be lacking in intercollegiate experience, many of the new players come from winning programs which the team hopes will help ensure a winning atmosphere.

"The freshman will be a big part of our team," second baseman and senior tri-captain Mike O'Neil said. "A lot of them played on winning teams and they know what it takes to win."

The makeup of the team will leave several positions up for grabs. There are five players in contention for the three outfield positions.

"All five players are extremely good," freshman outfielder Russ Schlip said. "Any one of us could handle the job and Coach Howe will probably go with whoever is hot."

The other four players, in addition to Schlip, are junior Steve Jarvis, who led the team with 16 RBIs and hit .321 last year, Brian Hamilton, a quick freshman and potential lead-off hitter, and freshmen Dermott Cassidy and Scott Ely.

Sophomore Scott Power, who hit .338 last year, will move from

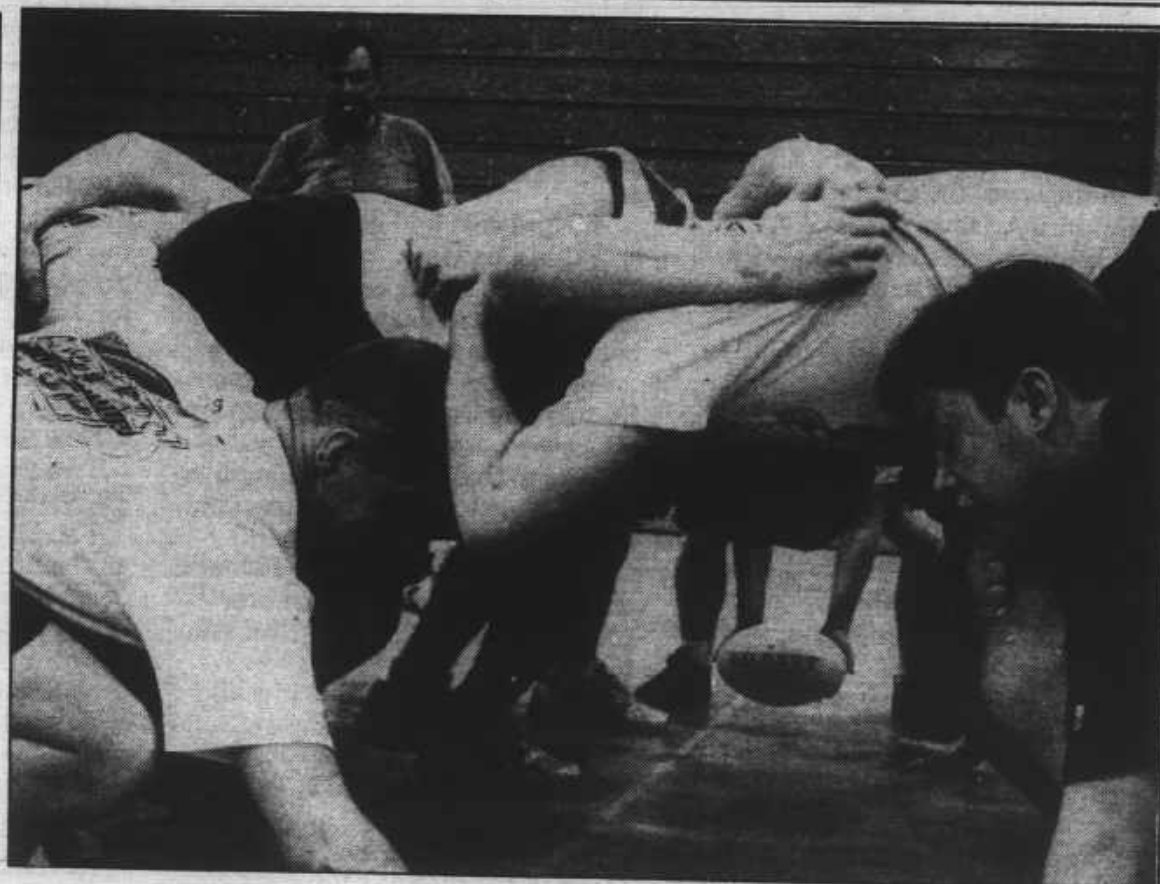
With losing such key hitters as Muir and Gerrior, who will the Lady Owls look to for offense?

## K.S.C. sues student and vice-versa

Keene State is suing a former student for his failure to pay back his loan, and the student is countersuing, saying he has suffered as a result of the college.

Stephen Flynn, 43, of Lempster, testified in court that KSC wouldn't give him his transcript which he needed to get a Vermont license to remove asbestos. Flynn started the business, Tri-State Environmental in New Hampshire in 1988, but there was more work in Vermont.

Flynn was unable to get the available jobs in Vermont because he could not get a license to do the work there. In order to get the license, he needed to show his college transcripts.

Keene State refused to give him the transcript he requested because he still owes money on his loan.

The college is now suing Flynn for his failure to make the loan payments. He owes Keene State approximately \$5,000, that is money which is now unavailable to needy students.

If one student defaults on a loan payment it makes it harder for other students to get a loan. If a student is leaving and they still have loans to pay, they are asked to sign papers.

Flynn did not sign these papers when he graduated, he did not think he needed to.

Also, one form asked for the names and addresses of his parents. He refused to sign this form because he says they abused him and he doesn't want any contact with them.

Jessie Wiggin, loan officer at Keene State, said that threatening to withhold transcripts is one way to get students to pay the money they owe.

If a student does not pay back a loan it is usual procedure for the college to sue. That is when Flynn decided to countersue.

Flynn said he could not pay back the loan because he had no income.

He claims he became severely depressed, couldn't finish sentences, had anxiety attacks, became anti-social, violent, and was unable to find other work.

Flynn, who is representing himself said, "I have no doubt that the loss of my job and the loss of self-esteem comes unequivocally and totally from the withholding of a transcript."

No matter what the judge decides, Flynn probably won't be able to pay back the money he owes.

That means the college will have to pay the money to the federal government rather than loan it to a student who really needs it.

Only 4 percent of KSC students default on their loans said John Halter, assistant business administrator at Keene State.

The case is being heard in Cheshire County Superior court. A decision on the case is expected soon.

## Tuition called not a bad deal

Keene State College is a 'good deal' in higher education. When the numbers are examined, the increases in tuition for the last four years at Keene State have not been all that drastic.

The way the University System works, tuition is established during each summer by the Board of Trustees of the U.S.N.H. Although it may be adjusted at irregular intervals, the majority of changes occur in the summer months, without additional change during the school year.

No matter what the tuition is in a given year, since the end of the 1980's, the breakdown of where student money is spent has been as follows: once all monies are collected from student tuition and state aid, they go into what is called the Education and General Expenses Budget (E & G.E.B.).

## Rabies epidemic hits southern NH

Keep away from wild, strange-acting animals and report any sightings to the Physical Plant Department or Campus Security. That is the message being relayed to the Keene State College community after a rabid raccoon and a second raccoon were sighted in the Owls Stadium area.

There has been a significant increase in the number of detected cases of rabies in NH between 1992 and 1993. There were over 14 times as many animals detected with rabies between the two years, 10 reports in 1992 and 148 in 1993.

"A raccoon got into some kind of fight with a domestic animal, a dog, over on Martel Court a few weeks ago... and ultimately the raccoon was found to have rabies," said Director of the Physical Plant Frank Mazzola.

Rabies is a viral infection that affects

the nervous system. It is transmitted from the infected individuals saliva, spinal or brain fluid into the blood of the other person or animal through an opening in the skin or through contact with a mucous membrane (the nostrils, mouth or eyes.)

"A student who was walking to the athletic field said he saw a raccoon [on Thursday] and we were simply responding to that [with a cautionary memo]," he said.

"I called up the N.H. Fish and Game Department; they said just to be careful. That was about the extent of their warning," Mazzola said.

The N.H. Fish and Game Department is not randomly testing raccoons unless they bite someone or have contact with humans or domestic animals," he said.

"I believe the family ultimately had to go through the rabies vaccination process because they did come in contact with their pet after the pet had come in

contact with it [the raccoon]," Mazzola said.

To test an animal for rabies, it must be killed and the brain tissue analyzed for presence of the disease. Results from the test are usually available within 24 hours.

Another raccoon was captured by the college near the footbridge to the South Athletic Field, across Rt. 101, on Friday. The present college policy is to remove the animal 5 miles outside of the city limits.

The Physical Plant Department has set traps for potentially rapid raccoons near the Ashuelot River by the athletic field footbridge.

Presently, post-exposure procedures are less harsh than in previous years. Instead of a series of close to 20 painful shots in the stomach, the exposed person is given a series of six shots in the arm on days 0, 3, 7, 14, 30 and 90, and

## Kappa beating update

The county attorney and Keene police will be meeting on Friday with Plymouth State College student Steven Szabo Jr. for more questioning into the investigation of the beating that Szabo received at Kappa Delta Phi's off campus fraternity house.

Keene police and county prosecutors are currently trying to decide whether to charge two unnamed suspects with misdemeanor or felony charges in relation to the attack on Szabo.

Keene police have said that one of the suspects is currently a Kappa brother, the second suspect is "not currently" a Kappa brother.

"We're in a hold pattern right now," said Detective Sgt. Fred Parsons of the Keene police. "The decision will be made hopefully with the answers Mr. Szabo gives during the meeting on Friday."

The attack occurred on New Year's Eve at the Kappa Delta Phi house located at 107 Davis Street.

In February, Keene State College placed sanctions against the fraternity for illegally distributing alcohol. Sanctions prohibit the fraternity from initiating new members, and holding open parties. The Kappa will remain on probation until May 1995.

## Co-eds by suite soon to be the norm

"It's a little more real life," says Jim Carley, associate director of residential life, talking about plans to make areas of Pondsides and Holloway Hall coed by suite for next fall.

The plan, approved by the college, calls for the second and third floors of Pondsides to become coed by suite, and the third floor of Holloway, with the exception of the north wing, to become coed by suite. The percentage of men and women living in either hall will not be affected.

"I have worked with coed apartments before and I think it will work out pretty well," Carley said.

"It takes a little bit of getting used to, but it's just like living in an apartment downtown," he said. "Apartments downtown aren't differentiated by sex or wings or anything. It's a little more real life, and I think people will like it."

Carley said that people who do not want to live on a coed floor will still have the option to live in either of the two residence halls on a single gender floor.

"We haven't turned the whole system over to a coed by suite," he said. "We have just done this in small areas to provide a different living environment."

"My belief is that people are going to want more and more of this coed by suite type of area," Carley said.

"Last fall, when the residential

life office conducted the community development surveys, this is one of the areas (coed floors) that students indicated that they would be interested in living in," said Dan Connelly, residence director for Holloway Hall.

"I think it should work out fine. It should give students a different experience," Connelly said.

Room Draw for next fall will be Monday, April 11 in Randall Hall, at a yet to be determined time, for squatters, displaced students, special interest housing, students with medical needs, singles, triples, and five and seven person apartments.

Room Draw for all other male students will be on Tuesday April 12 in Randall and on Wednesday April 13 for all other female students.

## Ruling of mock rape trial 'not guilty' but lesson learned

The mock rape trial, "A Question of Consent" offered students an opportunity to see for themselves what a real rape trial is like, held last Thursday evening in the Alumni Recital Hall.

The mock rape trial was presented by the Office of Residential Life, the Campus Residence Council, and Sigma Lambda Chi.

The intent of presenting the Mock Rape Trial for KSC and the Keene community was to maximize the understanding of our legal system and the issues involved in sexual assault trials.

Although this was not real, it was portrayed as a real trial. There were real attorneys and police. Prosecuting Attorney David Park of the Cheshire County's Attorney's office; Defense attorney Jan Peterson of the New Hampshire Public Defense Program; and New Hampshire State Police Detective Allen Welch.

The alleged victim was played by Amy M. Fischer, a senior education major.

The alleged assailant was Norman "Bingo" Brungot, a senior and a physical education major.

Other roles were played by Sara Gradual, and Spencer Galloway, both juniors.

Before the trial began, a 12 member jury was randomly selected from all interested audience members whose names were drawn from a box.

The jury deliberation was broadcasted in the lobby via closed circuit cameras.

This was to allow people to see that part of the process which is normally kept behind closed doors.

After the jury was selected, the judge read the indictment, explained how the trial would go on, and explained to the

audience about jury selection.

In a real trial situation any jury member could not be related to or know anyone involved in the trial, have any dealings with the council, be an employee of those involved, read or heard anything about the trial, be biased or prejudiced in any way in the situation, or be under any obligation to those involved.

If any jury member meets any of those restrictions, they must approach the judge and explain why they must be disqualified.

When Judge Brennan finished explaining the trial's background, the opening statements were presented and the trial began.

The trial was about Fischer's accusation of rape by Brungot.

They had known each other from accounting class and studied several times together.

After studying late one night, she slept over at his room on a mattress on the floor.

The next night they met at a fraternity party and left with Brungot's friend Spencer Galloway.

They returned to their room, and while Galloway was passed out, Fischer and Brungot watched movies and cuddled, finally falling asleep.

The next morning the three awoke and went to breakfast. Later that day, Brungot called Fischer, inviting her to another party.

She accepted, because she seemed to be interested in him.

After drinking some beer, the two left the party at about 11:30 p.m.. Fischer suggested they go back to her room in Huntress Hall, because her roommate was home for the weekend.

They continued to drink, although Fis-

cher did not want any more. She drank because the beer was already open.

Fischer and Brungot talked about their past relationships, and she explained how she had a shoulder injury from playing volleyball. He offered to give her a massage and she agreed.

As Fischer was wearing a heavy sweater, Brungot asked her to remove it, but she just moved it off her shoulder.

Brungot began to press against Fischer. She told him to wait, but he said there was no time to wait.

He started touching her, she panicked and began to cry. He had her arms pinned above her head with one hand, and with the other began to remove her pants and become sexually active with her.

Fischer was still crying when he was finished and told him to get out. He asked

her what her problem was.

That was the prosecution's case and the defense's case repeated the whole incident, and was very repetitive in questioning the victim.

She contradicted herself throughout the trial, because some of the questions asked were unexpected and she was unsure how to respond.

The trial was very long and there was no time for witness testimony, so after Brungot testified, the jury was dismissed.

When the jury went into deliberation, it was unanimous that he was not guilty. "He was not completely innocent," said Freshman Bill Abt, a member of the jury. "However, there was not enough evidence for him to be found guilty."

There was a reasonable doubt to his guilt and Fischer's testimony was weak, see TRIAL, page 19

## Yet two more presidential hopefuls visit K.S.C. campus

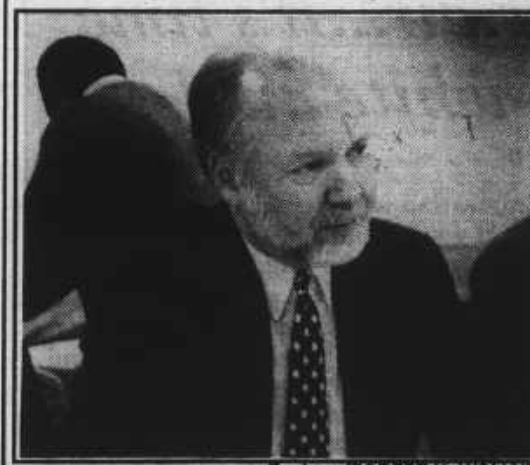

Three of the six presidential finalists have made their way to campus. The two most recent candidates were John Bardo and John Stockwell.

Bardo is the provost and vice president for academic advising at Bridgewater (Mass.) State College.

Stockwell took over the position of interim chancellor at the University of Wisconsin-Parkside within the last year. Before that he worked at UW-Parkside as the provost, vice chancellor.

Both candidates had the opportunity to meet with faculty and staff during their three-day visits to Keene State.

## Community relations

Placing an emphasis on community relations between the city and the college, Bardo feels that the new president needs to be a vital, positive and visible influence in the community.

"To me, you have to be a part of the town in which you are working," Bardo said. "You have a responsibility to that town and it's hard to have that responsibility if you commute from somewhere else," Bardo said.

Stockwell feels the need to improve relations between the city and the campus if he is chosen to be the Keene State president.

"I would start the day I arrived in town by building real working relationships with the community and the leadership in the community," Stockwell said. "I have done that in my year as interim chancellor at UW-Parkside."

"My commitment would be to be a real player in the political and corporate life of this part of the state," he said.

"So when there are difficulties with resident hall students or fraternity students or whatever and the town, you have a real strong basis of support and understanding to resolve those problems," Stockwell said. "I think your interim president (Richard Cunningham) this year has set a really good tempo in that regard."

## Athletics

Concerning Keene State's plans to move from NCAA Division II to Division III, both candidates agreed that Keene State has made the correct choice by choosing to move to Division III.

"If you are going to operate a [NCAA] Division I national-caliber athletic program like Oklahoma, like Michigan, like Wisconsin, like UMass' basketball team, then putting a great deal of money into intercollegiate athletics makes a heck of a lot of sense," Bardo said.

"I can guarantee you that Ohio State's endowment is based in large measure on the fact of the athletic program. Not because people are donating a lot of money to the football team, but because the football team keeps them visible," he said.

"At institutions like Bridgewater [State] and Keene, that's just not true. It's just not going to happen," Bardo said. "Even if you won a national championship within the sports you have, it is not going to generate that kind of publicity and that kind of investment of that kind of income for the campus," he said.

"So I think you have to take athletics in that sense out of the realm of the big public venture and look at it instead as to what other functions it performs," Bardo said.

"We are Division II on my campus, and there are good reasons for that," Stockwell said.

"We have examined Division III. We are Division II because the only opportunity for conference affiliation for us is within Division II," he said.

"When you take out \$250,000 for athletic

scholarships, which is what? A third of your scholarship packages? That is a monumental commitment of resources that are desperately needed for financial support across the institution," he said.

"So I look at that on one hand, and the philosophy of Division III and Keene State College on the other, and I think the campus has made the right decision to go to Division III," Stockwell said.

## Monadnet is new to region

Keene State College and several businesses in the Keene area are looking to expand the city's information access with a computer system called Monadnet.

Monadnet, which will potentially be up and running in six months, will allow several businesses to use a system similar to the Internet system that students are already using. Two local colleges, Franklin Pierce and Antioch, are interested in gaining access to Monadnet for their students.

Several weeks ago KSC hosted a meeting of over 100 individuals from the Monadnock area interested in gaining access to the "information highway" through Monadnet. There were people from the hospital, the public library, The Keene Sentinel and over 30 other institutions in the Monadnock region.

"The plan is to form a corporation made up of leaders from the community," said, one of the driving forces behind Monadnet, Dr. Jay Kahn, vice-president of finance and planning for KSC. The corporation will establish a technical committee to cover the software-side of Monadnet and will attempt to set guidelines for what rates will be charged for the users in the community.

The corporation leaders will be selected at a meeting scheduled for April 15.

A goal of the Monadnet system is to allow anyone to dial-in and use the system. A business would have to provide this service, as it isn't part of the Monadnet service, but if there is sufficient demand for net access someone will see the potential to make money and start a business.

The hardware for running Monadnet will be on the Keene State campus, with lines running to the contributing businesses.

One of the advantages for KSC is that installation of Monadnet will require a separate connection to the Net. The connection KSC currently has is for research and e-mail only. The new line will be a commercial carrier with no restrictions on the kind of data that can be transferred. This extra line will also reduce the amount of time the net is not working.

The cost of installing and running Monadnet is approximately \$150,000 per year. The cost will be shared by all the institutions and businesses who use the system. KSC will serve as the training site for many of the new users introduced to the net through Monadnet providing a link between the college and the community.

"The community could have waited for some business to offer internet use, but that could have been years away. This community pulled together for something they wanted and, because of it, are going to get it soon," Kahn said.

R. David Murray, UNIX program analyst at KSC said, "Everybody's talking about the information highway, but no one has access to it. Information is the most important part of the economy. Industrial production isn't going to change much in the coming years, but information technology is going to grow."

"Doing this will get a jump-start on the next phase of economic growth and attract high-tech business to Keene," Murray said.

If things go as planned, anyone in the Monadnock area who has an account will be able to register their car, examine the library's selection, find out the specials at a restaurant, find out if there is anything new at stores they like or any number of other activities from their home terminal that normally require a lot of time and driving around.

Monadnet is still in its early stages of development, but if things go well it will be installed by next semester.

## Promo video is a bad joke

Last week's *Equinox* editorial listed several ways in which the money lost through the presidential search could have been reallocated. It stated that if the \$186,000 had been reallocated it could have been used for scholarships, full-time professors, a new visitor's parking lot, increased campus security or the reduction of the college's \$480,000 budget short-fall quoted in January by more than one-third.

Once again, the administration at Keene State College is making some pretty serious and pretty unrealistic choices about where our money needs to be spent. Their latest investment is \$31,000 into a college relations sponsored college promo video.

The seven-minute video is the product of a year-long project by scriptwriters from Connecticut and a videographer from Westmoreland. It features the positive aspects of Keene State College through brief shots of things like academic classrooms, the quad, student athletic fields, students laughing, students being tutored, and graduation.

The purpose of the video, of course, is to attract high school seniors to the college. Although the idea of the video was all done in good faith, more thought should have been put in to how much the video was worth.

A first-year, full-time faculty member makes a little over \$29,000. We could have eliminated some adjuncts and replaced them with a PhD. (Once again, the college made the choice to put their money into something besides quality education.)

Another way the college has made a poor choice with the promo video is by robbing the students of a chance for real-life experience. Several film, journalism, english, and theater arts majors were interested in helping with the production of the video. Had the students been given the opportunity to work on the project, the video would have cost Keene State a little over \$1000.

Rather than working so hard to attract new students to campus, maybe the college should concentrate on creating a higher quality education for the students already on campus. Because, if the students here aren't happy, word will get around, and promo video or not, high school students will start sending applications elsewhere.

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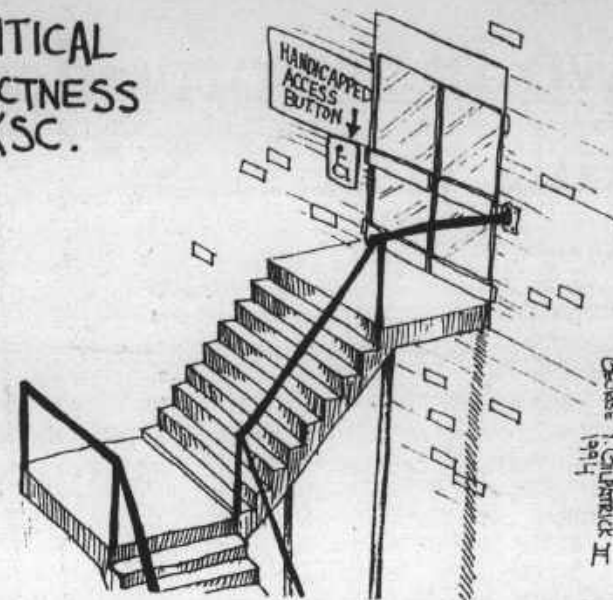

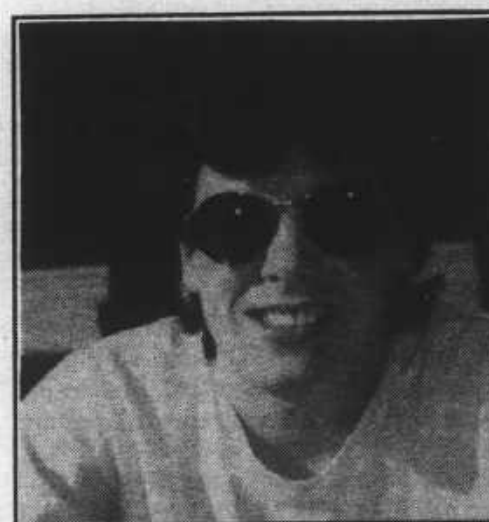

## Gainesville Murders

## Convicted college campus murderer Danny Rolling speaks

• "I regret with all my heart what my hand has done," Danny Rolling said.

GAINESVILLE, Fla. - On a day when authorities revealed that student killer Danny Rolling has admitted to three murders in his hometown of Shreveport, La., in 1989, five mothers told their stories to the judge who will decide whether he lives or dies. One pleaded for mercy; the others for justice.

Rolling has been convicted of butchering five college students in Gainesville in August 1990 and last week a jury recommended he die in the electric chair.

In Shreveport, Julie Grissom, 24, her father William and her nephew, Sean, were stabbed to death on Nov. 4, 1989, hours after Rolling was fired from his job in a Mexican restaurant blocks away. Julie was also raped and her body posed in a provocative manner like the female victims in the Gainesville murders.

"With his statements ... and other evidence," said prosecutor Rod Smith, "there is no question that he did those crimes."

Rolling won't be released to any other jurisdiction for trial, "because we don't want anything to interfere with the carrying out of this sentence," if he is given

the death penalty, Smith said.

"I regret with all my heart what my hand has done," Rolling told Judge Stan Morris in a 102-word statement. "However, I feel whatever I might have to say at this moment is overshadowed by the suffering I've caused," he said, gesturing toward the victims' families.

Tuesday's hearing was to allow victims' families to tell Morris what life has been like since their children were murdered and for Rolling's mother, Claudia, to plead for Danny's life via videotape from Shreveport, where she is gravely ill.

James Rolling, the father who was said to have repeatedly abused Danny while growing up, did not participate.

"Find mercy, and save my son's life," a tearful Claudia pleaded from a recliner in her Shreveport living room. "I've heard for a long time that children are products of

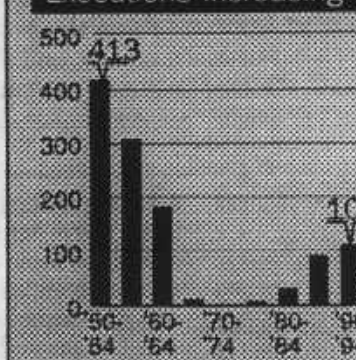

their environment. Then take me because I would be the responsible one that raised him. I'm the one that failed him somewhere."

Ada Larson, mother of Sonja Larson, spoke of parenting too.

"Just when my job as a parent was nearing completion," she wrote, "Sonja was snatched from me. I did my job of instilling values, wholesomeness and nourishment. All for nothing. The anger I feel sometimes scares me."

Each of the grieving mothers talked about what would have been.

"The lord gave me a miracle baby" Claudia said in slow, halting gulps of words. "I named him Danny. When I held this little baby in my arms, I had no idea, no thought that he would be anything except a doctor, a lawyer a president, anything big and wonderful ....

"I have prayed that if the death penal-

ty is upheld that my Lord will take him home in a gentle way and not in a cruel hard way that man would take him," Claudia said, wiping her eyes with a paper handkerchief.

But the statements noted that there was no gentleness in the final hours of the five students.

"My daughter was terrorized and suffered a great deal and I ... was not there to protect her," wrote Ricky Paules, mother of Tracy Paules. "Now I yearn to hold her in my arms, that small body I knew so well ...

"I yearn to tell her how much I love her, how much I cry for her, how much I miss her and most of all, to hear her say: 'I love you, Mom.'"

From Theresa Ann Garren, mother of Christa Hoyt:

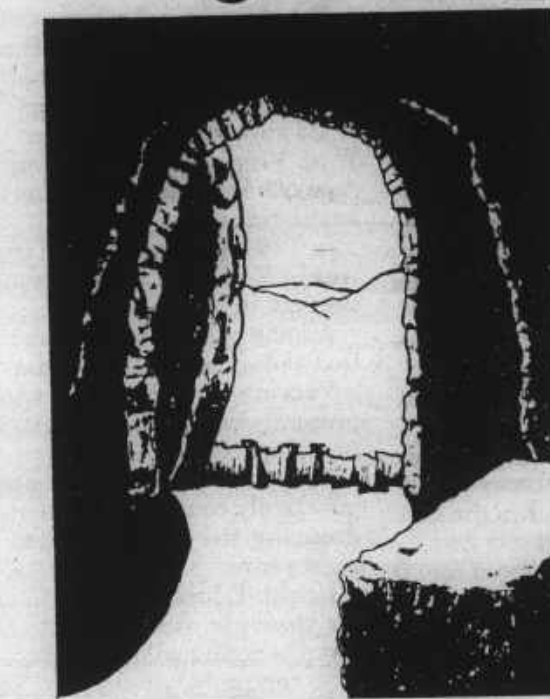
"I talked to Christa by phone on the night she died. She told me that if I ever needed her, just to call. I cannot do that. ... We will always have an empty feeling and long for the love, happiness and caring that came with Christa."

From Patricia Powell, mother of Christi Powell:

"I remember shortly before she went off to college, I was driving her home from her job and she reached over, took hold of my hand and kissed it. She said she just wanted to 'love on me' a little before she left home. That touched me so much knowing that she realized that I was going to be lonesome. We have an emptiness that can not be filled."

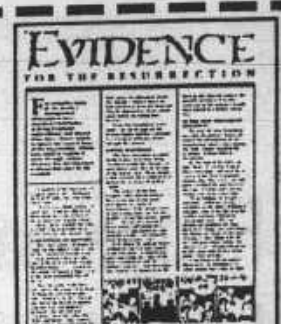

## Records show first lady involved in controversial investment

WASHINGTON - Hillary Rodham Clinton parlayed \$1,000 into nearly \$100,000 through highly speculative commodities trading in 1978 and 1979, according to records the White House released Tuesday.

Clinton was guided through the risky trades by James B. Blair, a friend who was the lawyer for one of Arkansas' strongest companies, Tyson Foods Inc., the nation's biggest poultry company.

The disclosure that a \$1,000 investment yielded a hundredfold return is clearly embarrassing to the Clintons, who have sharply criticized a national culture of greed during the Reagan and Bush years in the White House.

It was "a gilded age of greed and selfishness, of irresponsibility and excess and of neglect," Bill Clinton said during the 1992 presidential campaign.

Commodities trading is not like in-

vesting in stocks. Essentially, a commodities speculator bets that the future value of a commodity, such as cattle or pork, will rise or fall.

Such trading is among the riskiest of investments. By some estimates, more than three-quarters of all investors lose money. But a skilled trader can reap millions of dollars.

"Making the kind of money that she did at that time was possible but very difficult," said Chuck Levitt, senior livestock analyst at Alaron Trading Corp. in Chicago. "It just so happened that she caught the biggest cattle market boom in history and at just the right time."

Herds had shrunk for four years and inflation was soaring in 1978-79, said Levitt, who has tracked livestock markets for more than 30 years. Prices on virtually all commodities were "in a very strong upward trend."

"There were other people who made the money she did," said Levitt, but they were lucky, and their timing was

## Colosio Murder

## Cop questioned in assassination

MEXICO CITY - Mexican officials revealed Monday that a retired policeman hired to help with crowd control is being questioned about a possible role in Wednesday's assassination of presidential candidate Luis Donaldo Colosio.

The man being questioned, Tranquilino Sanchez Venegas, has not been charged with any crime in the slaying, which has plunged Mexico's political system into chaos. The ruling Institutional Revolutionary Party, or PRI, seeks a new candidate for the elections.

According to Attorney General Diego Valadez, Sanchez was hired by local PRI officials on Wednesday morning to help with crowd control during the candidate's planned rallies in Tijuana. Colosio was shot dead at his first campaign stop in a poor Tijuana neighborhood known as Lomas Taurinas.

The fact that Sanchez was being questioned was withheld from the public until Monday, when the attorney general released a statement about the matter to dispel rumors that Sanchez

had ties to the security guards assigned to protect Colosio.

Mexican officials report the assassination was the work of a lone gunman, 23-year-old mechanic Mario Aburto Martinez, who has confessed. Others who were detained briefly have been released and cleared of any wrongdoing.

Despite the government's attempt to characterize Aburto as the only person responsible for the stunning assassination - the worst in Mexico in more than 60 years - Mexico's leading clergymen have cautioned that there may have been a plot against Colosio's life.

Adolfo Suarez Rivera, archbishop of Monterrey warned that the gunman - who has told investigators he had contacts with mysterious "armed groups" - may have been working with others.

"There could have been a group of fanatics," Suarez said. "This must be cleared so Mexicans can have peace."

President Carlos Salinas de Gortari and leaders of the ruling party seemed no closer Monday to naming a presidential contender to replace Colosio. There were signs of a power struggle within

an additional shot of rabies immune globulin with the first dose.

Rabies immune globulin is a serum partially composed of blood that has built up rabies antibodies.

The cost of the treatment is from \$1,600 to \$2,000.

People previously vaccinated for the disease only require two doses, one on the initial day and the second three days later.

The virus inflames the brain causing fever, headache, loss of appetite, an intense thirst, hyperactivity, delirium, muscle spasms, and death within 20 days of the onset of symptoms.

The first rabies-related human death in 40 years in New York occurred last July.

The victim was 11-year-old Kelly Ahrendt of Sullivan County.

The majority of human cases result from dog bites. 15,000 cases of human rabies occur worldwide each year. Only five of those occur in the U.S. annually.

Dogs are usually confined and observed for 10 days if they bite a human.

This is the time period in which the animal may still be in its incubation period for rabies and the only time it can transmit the disease.

All mammals can be infected by rabies, although raccoons are the largest animal population in the U.S. affected.

Cases have also been reported of skunks, cats, woodchucks, dogs, red fox, sheep, cows, ponies,

deer, squirrels and coyotes contracting the disease.

An animal infected with the disease can either act bold or docile, or they may walk in circles like they are drunk, Mazzola said. They can pretend to be sleeping and then suddenly attack.

A nocturnal animal, such as a raccoon or skunk, seen during the day can also indicate that an animal is rabid.

The spreading of rabies north along the Atlantic coast began in the 1970s. From the 1940s to that time, a rabies epidemic had been contained in Florida.

Its spread north occurred when Virginian and West Virginian hunters imported rabid Florida raccoons because of a decline in their own raccoon populations.

In 1989, the disease had spread to New Jersey, was in New York the following year, and hit Connecticut in March 1991.

Among preventative measures are the vaccination of dogs and cats, mandatory in this state.

Vaccination of wildlife with laced oral bait is presently being considered by the Federal Agriculture Department.

European nations have used this technique to effectively combat the disease. Canada has been dropping the oral bait from planes for the last eight years.

Health Educator Karen Wilson advised caution for students. She suggests the avoidance of all strange-acting wild animals.

"I certainly would not recommend offering peanuts to squirrels," she said.

She also recommends storing garbage in containers with tight-fitting lids, so raccoons and skunks aren't able to rummage through it.

## Americans abroad: breaking the law may mean jail time

Over 1000 American citizens were arrested and held on charges of using or possessing illegal narcotics last year, as reported by the State Bureau of Consular Affairs.

The bureau is responsible for the protection and welfare of U.S. citizens working and traveling abroad.

People who get involved with drugs while overseas will face the harsh reality that there is little anyone can do for someone who has been arrested in a foreign country.

Many of the Americans who were arrested for drug possession had less than one third of an ounce of marijuana on them.

In many countries, the amount of drugs is of little importance. What is important is that an illegal substance was brought across their borders by an American.

Americans may discover while traveling abroad that, unless they stay near tourist locations and spend money, the citizens of many foreign countries don't particularly care for Americans.

Foreign police departments would like nothing better than throw a couple Amer-

ican spring-breakers in jail for a few years.

Once you leave U.S. soil, your constitutional rights remain on the tarmac.

Just because you are an American citizen doesn't mean that you are beyond a foreign country's laws of persecution.

Unlike the U.S., few countries have a judicial system that presumes innocence until proven guilty.

The burden of proof will lie on you and your attorney's ability to prove your innocence.

Your attorney will not be the family lawyer from the large law firm back in rural New England.

The U.S. consular will give you a list of local attorneys who will represent you.

Where this attorney's loyalties lie and how diligent they will be in your defense will be your next concern.

To the attorney, you are the foreigner who has been charged with possession of drugs in his or her country.

Can you see the scenario being shaped?

What can be done for you if arrested for possession of narcotics by the U.S. consular is, not a whole lot.

The consular can visit you and see to it that you are being treated humanely.

They can aid you in getting representation, but only from local attorneys. They

can also notify your family and let them know what has happened.

What cannot be done for you covers everything else. The U.S. consular cannot get you out of jail.

They cannot interfere in that country's legal system to aid you in any way. They cannot post bail or plead for leniency in your sentence.

Many foreign countries will have little sympathy or afford American visitors patience for crimes committed.

Mexico, Jamaica, the Bahamas and the Dominican Republic have enacted mandatory jail sentences of two to seven years without the chance for parole for possession of even small amounts of drugs.

It is common for individuals arrested for possession to wait months or possibly even years for a trial.

Then, once the trial finally comes the conviction and an extended jail term is almost a definite.

Don't think that Americans get treatment resembling that of home.

A prisoner's well-being in a foreign country is even less definite than that of prisoner's in the U.S. Primitive conditions and hard labor may become your way of life if convicted.

Mistreatment and solitary confinement

are extreme examples of what could happen.

Is that high worth taking such risks? Avoid putting yourself in this compromising position. Know the drug laws of the country before you visit.

Never under any circumstances carry a package, suitcase, or other means to transport drugs for someone who you do not know or know well.

Once the suitcase, or package is in your possession, it is your responsibility, regardless of what the circumstances as to why you are carrying it.

Ignorance is not a defense, only a hard lesson learned.

If for any reason you have medication or a prescription that contains a narcotic, carry with you a doctor's certificate explaining that the medication is necessary, and keep all medications in their original, labeled containers.

Foreign countries are not out to get Americans, but by no means give them an excuse to harass you.

Getting involved with drugs is dumb. Period. Do it while vacationing abroad and not only will it ruin your vacation, it will ruin your life.

From there, the bulk of the money goes to pay salaries. Faculty and staff, administration, operations people and student paychecks (work-study, student hourly, etc.) consist of 75 percent of the E & G.E.B., said Vice President of Finance and Planning Jay Kahn.

The above percentage consisted of various "fringe benefits" to these people as well, though what that means remains unclear.

Equipment, travel and supplies made up the next 18 percent of where our money goes. This is followed by an additional 6 percent toward financial aid, with the remaining 1 percent of our dollars going to pay miscellaneous expenses.

Kahn described this as repairs, renovations and such that occur in a given fiscal year. When the numbers for 1990-91 are compared to

the numbers of 1993-1994, this is where KSC fares well. In 1990-91, in-state students paid \$2,040 and out-of-state paid \$5,900 in tuition alone.

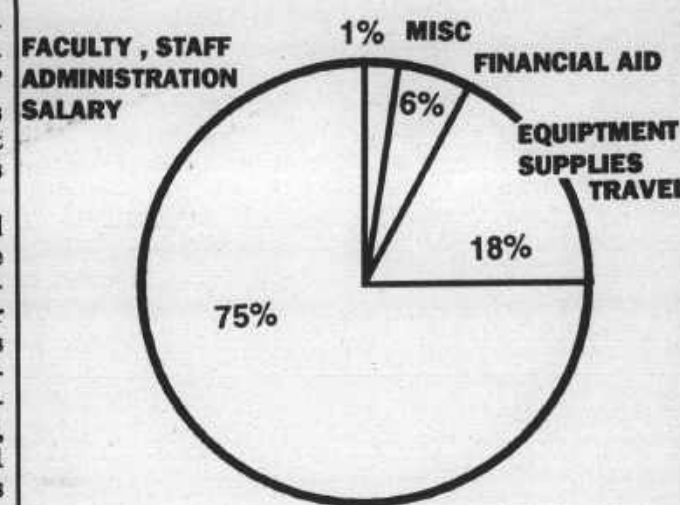
Four years later, these numbers increased to \$2,520 in-state and \$7,350 out-of-state. Though the increases have been more for out-of-state than for in-state students, both still remain bargains as compared to other things.

For example, according to Consumer Reports, four years ago the average price of a four-door, domestic family car was \$12,500. Today, that number hovers at just under \$16,000, or the average tally of a water bill for a single family home in Keene, perhaps.

In 1990, the average bill was \$490.00, according to City Hall records. Today, just four years later, that number has jumped to around \$873.00—close to doubling 1990's number. Additional comfort to tuition-minded students are

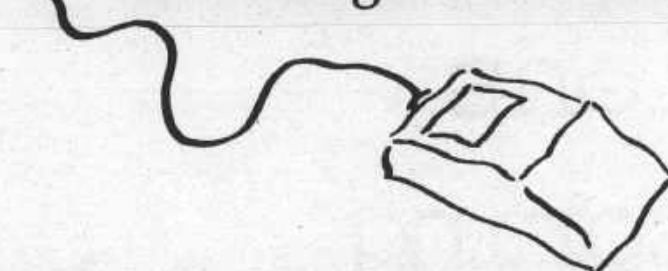
scholarships. The college itself offers no less than five KSC awards, in addition to Pell Grants.

When sophomore Kari Upton came to college two years ago, she never thought that she would be playing lacrosse for Keene State. And she definitely did not think that she would end up being a mid-fielder on the men's team!

"The next thing I knew I had a helmet, then I was on the A-field doing drills, then we were at Boston University and the coach (Jim Draper) asked me if I wanted to go in," she said. "I didn't really want to, I wanted to wait and watch a few games first."

"Then came Green Mountain, and the coach put my line in and I was like 'cool!' I was playing down at our end down by the goal and I was holding this guy back, the team was passing the ball, and we slipped and fell in the mud. The next thing I heard was the whole team saying 'Yea! She fell in the mud!' it was pretty funny. And I got to play in a few games after that," she said.

"The guys joke with me a lot and I'm getting to the point where I just laugh it off," she said. "They're just teasing me pretty much." "The new guys who started playing for us this year aren't too sure about me yet."

Upton says that other teams don't really have any problem playing against her, although she admits some teams were surprised when they realized Keene State had a woman playing on their team.

"The coach thinks it is really nice that I am playing on the team," she said. "I guess I tone down the guys jokes on the road for the away games." "The guys think I'm crazy to be playing on a men's team, because of all of the hitting, and the other teams are like 'Why are you doing this?'"

Upton says that her parents are split on

My dad thinks it is kind of good that I am doing something,'" she said. "I think it's great, it's a lot of fun," Upton said. "It's just one of those things."

"They [the men on the team] are all like big brothers to me," she said. "I can fool around with them like they are my brothers. I can't explain it, I look up to all of them, they take care of me and make sure I don't get hurt or anything."

When asked if she would consider playing on a women's team if Keene State were to start one, Upton was unsure. She said, "I don't know if I would play for a women's team if Keene had one, because of the hitting, it's a different stick, the rules, women's lacrosse has a lot more rules. You really can't hit, you can only check for the most part. So it would be really different."

"If we do go [NCAA] Division III, hopefully the coach will be able to work something out so that I can play. It would be really cool if I could play in Division III since those schools are mostly who we play now," she said.

Upton will not be able to play in any games this season because of a knee injury she received while skiing. She still attends practice and participates in some drills. Upton expects to be playing again in about a year. "I still go to practice to hang out with the guys and keep my stick work up," she says.

The lacrosse team plays tonight against Colby Sawyer at 6 p.m. at Owl Stadium.

## Blues Traveler a big success

Taking the sold-out Keene State College audience by storm, Blues Traveler, a four-piece rock band from New York City with three successful albums out (and a new one on the way), played in the Spaulding Gymnasium last Saturday night.

Led by rotund vocalist/blues-harp virtuoso John Popper, Blues Traveler worked the crowd into a moshing, crowd-surfing frenzy.

When Popper took the stage, it was slowly with the aid of crutches and crew members. Popper's leg is in the last stages of healing from a motorcycle accident.

According to Popper, in a post-concert interview, he was travelling at 70 m.p.h. on his motorcycle, hit a car and broke the femur in his right leg. He has been off the leg ever since, a year and eight months now, getting around in a wheelchair and, more recently, crutches.

Much to the delight of the crowd, instead of sitting on his stool, Popper tossed his crutches aside, saying "I feel like standing for awhile." It was only his second night on his feet since the accident, the first being the night before at UNH.

Blues Traveler are rounded out by Chandler Kinchela on guitar, "Brooklyn" Bob Sheenhan on bass and Brendan Hill on drums.

Kinchela covered the majority of his guitar duties without being overbearing, since Popper's harp is usually the lead instrument. Occasionally, Kinchela locked musical horns with Popper for some searing guitar/harp dual leads.

Blues Traveler's first song was a bluesy, groovy jam, followed by a rockin' blues-harp/guitar duet. Then they applied the brakes a little for the slower tune "Shotgun Shell," followed by a slow, laid-back pretty tune from their new record called "Smile In My Pocket."

Next up was "Follow," a tune off the as-yet-unreleased (and still untitled) al-

bum. It was the first time they'd played it in front of anyone, though it was tight enough that most would never had guessed otherwise.

Easily the most intriguingly captivating song of Blues Traveler's set was the slow, folksy number "Alone." Popper sat on his stool, removed his dozen-harp arsenal, (which he kept hung around his neck for the majority of the show), and took up a 12-string acoustic. A small Les Paul on a guitar stand was stationed at his side.

His facility on both guitars was impressive, especially the tasteful solo he played on the Les Paul. Popper said, "I like to think of myself as the Bob Dylan of the guitar. I just play a little thing in one key-no big deal." As frenzied as the KSC crowd was, Blues Traveler came back for two encores. They performed another new one, "Free."

Later, in an interview with Popper, he confirmed that the band's new album was "in the can" but won't be released until September 1. He also said that it was "easily the strongest we've ever done," although Popper stopped short of the cliché about all previous albums being poor in comparison to the newest album.

Popper also indicated that with the new album, "We have radio play in mind. We're always into trying out new stuff."

Popper admitted that the band will release three videos for the new record and said, "MTV is a sad reality. Videos are simply a way a way to sell yourself. We know enough to know that we don't know how to do them or go about doing them. Did you know that the 'M' in MTV stands for 'Monopoly Television'? You can quote me on that."

Opening act Allgood put on an incredibly tight, hour-long set of nine excellent tunes. Almost every one of their tunes was either a great straight-ahead rocker or a percolating groover, with the odd blues tune tossed in. If Saturday's set was any indication, Allgood won't be an opening act much longer.

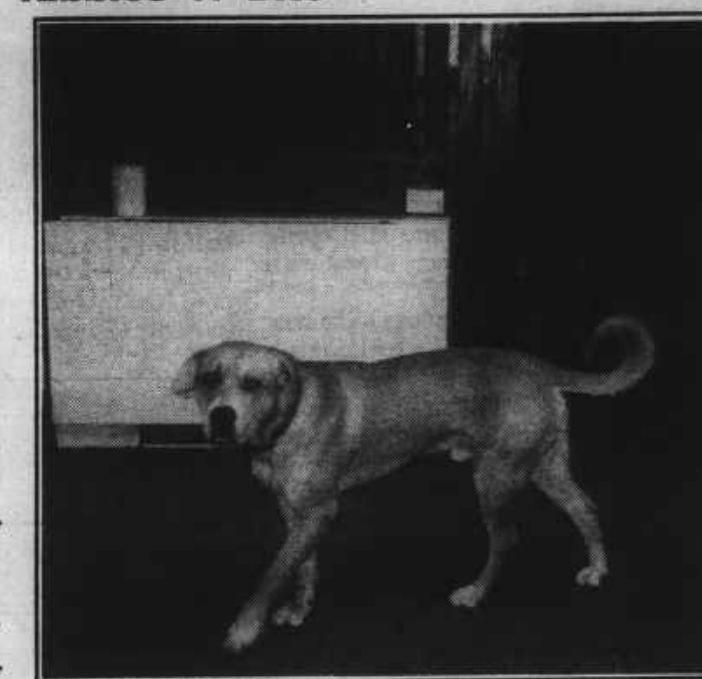
Members of Tappa Kegga Brew spin a different ver-

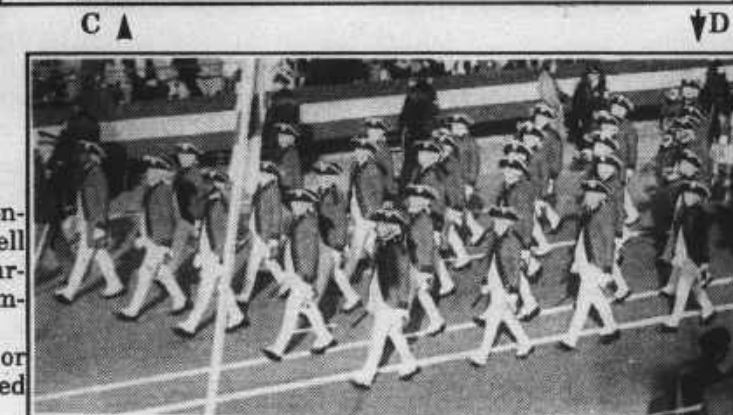
In Concord Governor Merrill-Stubbing has activated

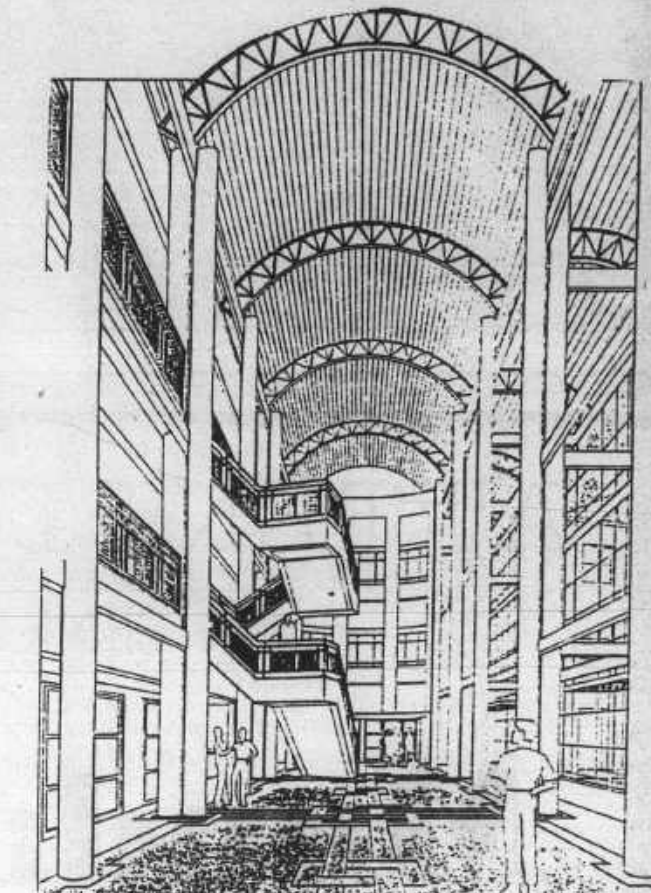


The Campus Center will serve as a unifying force in the life of the college

but it was understandable why he was on trial.

"The report and testimony was messed up quite a bit," Abt said, "Things were left out and the defense kept asking questions and Amy kept contradicting herself."

Brugot's testimony was more solid and he looked more comfortable on the stand.

"It was all acting, but in real situations, those involved have real cues and real feelings," he said.

"It was cool to be part of something on campus other than academics," Abt said, when asked how he felt about being on the jury.

The jury was randomly selected from the audience and the volunteers may have had varying opinions and debated the issues from many sides.

The jury members were individuals attempting to make the best decision based on the evidence, the law as it is written and their charge by the court.

Representatives from the Women's Crisis Services, the Counseling Center, and the Judicial Office were on hand for a question and answer period.

The event was made possible by contributions from the Campus Residence Council, Office of Residential Life, Sigma Lambda Chi Fraternity, the Pond-

side/Mini house staff and the Huntress/Fiske staff.

These are just a few statistics on rape:

- 1 in 4 women surveyed were victims of rape or attempted rape

- 84 percent of those raped knew their attackers

- 57 percent of rapes are date rapes

- 18 is the average age of either the perpetrator or victim of rape for both men and women

- About 75 percent of the men and at least 55 percent of the women involved in acquaintance rapes had been drinking or taking drugs before the incident

- 42 percent of rape victims told no one about their assaults

- Only 5 percent sought help at rape crisis centers

- Only 5 percent reported rapes to police

- 84 percent of the men who committed rape said what they did was definitely not rape.

Rape is a serious issue and must not be taken lightly.

The law in New Hampshire defines rape as "aggravated felonious sexual assault," the penetration of any bodily opening without consent.

The purpose of the trial was to make students, faculty, and community members aware of rape and its consequences, and to give a better understanding of this violent crime.

perfect. As a new player, he added, "she had to have one heck of a good adviser or one very good broker."

The White House released the information in part to rebut allegations in the April 4, issue of Newsweek magazine, currently on sale, that Hillary Clinton did not put up any of the money herself.

The White House has strongly denied that accusation, and Newsweek has backed off its story. "We wanted to set the record straight and get the facts out," a senior administration official said.

Clinton, who is on vacation with her family in California, was not present for the briefing. Her spokeswoman Lisa Caputo and John Podesta, a White House spokesman, said Clinton "put up her own money, invested it in her own accounts and assumed the full risk of loss."

Clinton's highly speculative trading dramatically boosted the Clintons' income at a time when Bill Clinton was earning \$26,500 as attorney general of Arkansas and Hillary Clinton she was making \$24,250 as a young lawyer in Little Rock. Her commodities trading began shortly before her husband was elected governor in 1978.

Hillary Clinton initially invested \$1,000 in cash in an account on Oct. 1, 1978. By Oct. 12, she made \$5,300 and reinvested the \$6,300 in several transactions. In a series of trades through the rest of 1978, she accumulated profits of \$49,069, offset by losses of \$22,548. The White House calculated her net gain at \$26,541 in 1978.

In 1979, Clinton continued trading in this account with profits of \$109,600, offset by losses of \$36,600. Her net gain for 1979 was \$72,996. She stopped trading in that account in July 1979 after she got pregnant

with Chelsea. "She couldn't stomach it anymore," an administration official said. "It was too nerve-wracking."

The combined net gain for 1978 and 1979 was \$99,537.

An administration official said Bill Clinton was "not involved in this account. This was her account. It was in her name."

Hillary Clinton opened a second account in October 1979 with \$5,000 in cash, and her trading resulted in small net losses in 1979 and 1980. She stopped trading in this account after Chelsea was born, and the account was closed in March 1980.

The disclosure of Hillary Clinton's trading came amid reports that her former broker, Robert L. "Red" Bone of Springdale, Ark., had been disciplined for trading violations in 1977 by the Commodity Futures Trading Commission and in 1980 by the CFTC and the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

The New York Times first revealed Clinton's commodities trading in a March 18 story that said the deals left the Clintons in the position of having relied on the financial advice of Blair, who represented one of the largest companies in the state.

"I think he was an important factor," an administration official said Tuesday. But the official also noted, "It was a good market."

Hillary Clinton's trades were on cattle, hogs, soybeans, sugar, copper and lumber futures, senior administration officials said.

The Times' story said Tyson Foods of Springdale, Ark., received \$9 million in government loans, favorable environmental decisions and placement of company executives on state boards during Bill Clinton's tenure as governor. Blair could not be reached for comment Tuesday.

Bill Clinton has said he treated the company with only the consideration due the state's top industry.

CHICAGO — Picking up the pieces, and putting them back together again.

North Carolina coach Dean Smith is in the Hall of Fame, and as Dick Vitale endlessly reminds, is also the Michaelangelo of college basketball. But freshman center Rasheed Wallace taking the late three-pointer that would have tied the Tar Heels' second-round game with Boston College? Off a designed play? After he hasn't attempted even one all season?

Good thing Michaelangelo didn't make a call like that, or he'd have picked up a can of spray paint and finished off the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel with swirling graffiti. Remember this late-season observation of Louisville coach Denny Crum: "On any night North Carolina can beat anybody. But they're going to struggle different nights. If (guard Donald) Williams doesn't hit threes, they're not a dominant team. One ingredient you don't have on a given night can kill you."

Now check out the line Williams, the Heels' only true outside threat, put up against BC: 1 of 12 overall and zip of 6

McIlvaine and 6-9 Amal McCaskill and 6-8 Damon Key. And despite the pressure it applies, the Cats' press can be broken by a slick, intelligent point guard. The Warriors have one of those in Tony Miller, whose assist-to-turnover ratio is an outstanding 268-95 (a 2-1 ratio is considered grounds for canonization). The big question about Marquette on Sunday was its mindset, and whether it would go brain dead when confronted by a, quote, name school, unquote, like Kentucky. "The way we approached that," Warrior coach Kevin O'Neill remembered Monday morn, "was by telling the guys that the Kentucky name is obviously big time, but they weren't playing the jersey. They were playing the guys in it. I think that helped."

"If you play tradition, a great coach like Rick (Pitino), you're going to lose. But if you forget that and make them work hard, you have a chance."

And how were your guys afterward? "To tell you the truth, a little more subdued than I expected. They were already looking forward to the next game (Thursday against Duke). We feel we've established our own identity in the specter of Al (McGuire). Now we just got to keep playing, and we'll see what hap-

pens. Crazier things have happened. Not many. But someone's got to win (the national title)."

Speaking of that great coach named Pitino: Marquette struggled all year with its halfcourt offense, and when confronted by an aggressive, man-to-man, halfcourt defense. Yet, on Sunday, Pitino used both his press and a zone.

The results? When they broke the press, the Warriors got easy baskets. And when they faced the zone, the Warriors' outside shooters got good looks at the basket. As Alice would have said if she had wandered through last week-end instead of Wonderland, things just get curiouseer and curiouseer.

That thought, appropriately enough, brings us to Michigan, which snuck by Pepperdine in overtime and by Texas by five. The Wolverines, to be perfectly clear here, could easily have lost either, and if that had happened, their goat would have been the enigmatic Jalen Rose. Through long stretches of both those games, he offered up little but reasons to deride him. Against the Wave, he went 2 of 13. Against the Long-

horns, he walked while showboating on a breakaway and charged while leading a 2-on-1 break. And then there was that time the Wolves were inbounding the ball against Texas. "Four! Four!" Steve Fisher, their coach, yelled from the bench.

"Two! Two!" Rose, their bad boy, yelled from the floor. But then, when those games were on the line, he transmuted and offered up reasons to praise him. Against the Wave, he went 6 of 6 from the line in overtime. And against the 'Horns, he went 4 of 4 from the line in the final 15 seconds.

Oh, Rose did one more thing that is good to remember when thinking of him and the Wolverines. Late in regulation against Pepperdine, as he awaited the end of a timeout, he leaned up against the press table, turned and said, "Play till we win and let's go home."

Call it confidence, call it cockiness, call it experience in the crucible that is the NCAA tournament. Call it whatever you please, but always remember that both he and his team have it. Over the weekend, Juwan Howard was 28 of 41 from the field and scored 62 points. Over the weekend, Michigan was 57 of 109 from the field and scored 162 points.

## Owls open season on the diamond; drop double header to Bridgeport

The Keene State baseball team (4-6-1) dropped both games of a double header, 2-0 and 5-1, Saturday against Bridgeport State College.

A strong pitching performance by sophomore Geoff Sylvester helped keep the Owls in the opener. Sylvester held Bridgeport scoreless until the sixth inning when they scored two runs on three hits and a sacrifice bunt.

Bridgeport pitching held KSC to three hits in the opener. KSC batters struck out a total of five times.

"We need to get our bats alive," Coach Ken Howe said. "It's been two or three weeks since we've faced live pitching."

The Owls didn't fare much better offensively in the second game. The Owls finally scored a run in the final inning of the second game on a single by Sylvester a wild pitch a walk and a fielder's choice to break a 13 inning drought.

"We had a total of six hits in the double header," Howe said. "That's usually not enough to win games."

Howe said he was pleased not only with his pitcher's but also with the way his younger players are fitting in.

"The older guys and the young ones are continually helping each other out," Howe said. "But then again they all want the same thing: to win."

Howe said he still hasn't made any final decisions regarding a permanent starting lineup.

"None of the positions are set," said Howe. "Some are more set than others, but it's still early enough in the season for me to experiment. I have four middle in-

fielders that I can make substitution with and not lose anything defensively." Howe said his is pleased with the adjustments the younger players have made since the fall baseball season.

"It's hard to put a timetable on youth and experience," Howe said. "The older guys have been around for awhile and know how I do things. It will just take some time for the newer players to learn my coaching philosophy, but they all come from good baseball backgrounds so I don't see any problems with that."

Since the Owls returned from Cocoa Beach, Florida they have been doing most of their practicing in the Spaulding Gymnasium.

"It doesn't hurt us to practice inside," Howe said. "It's better than not practicing at all, but it's frustrating."

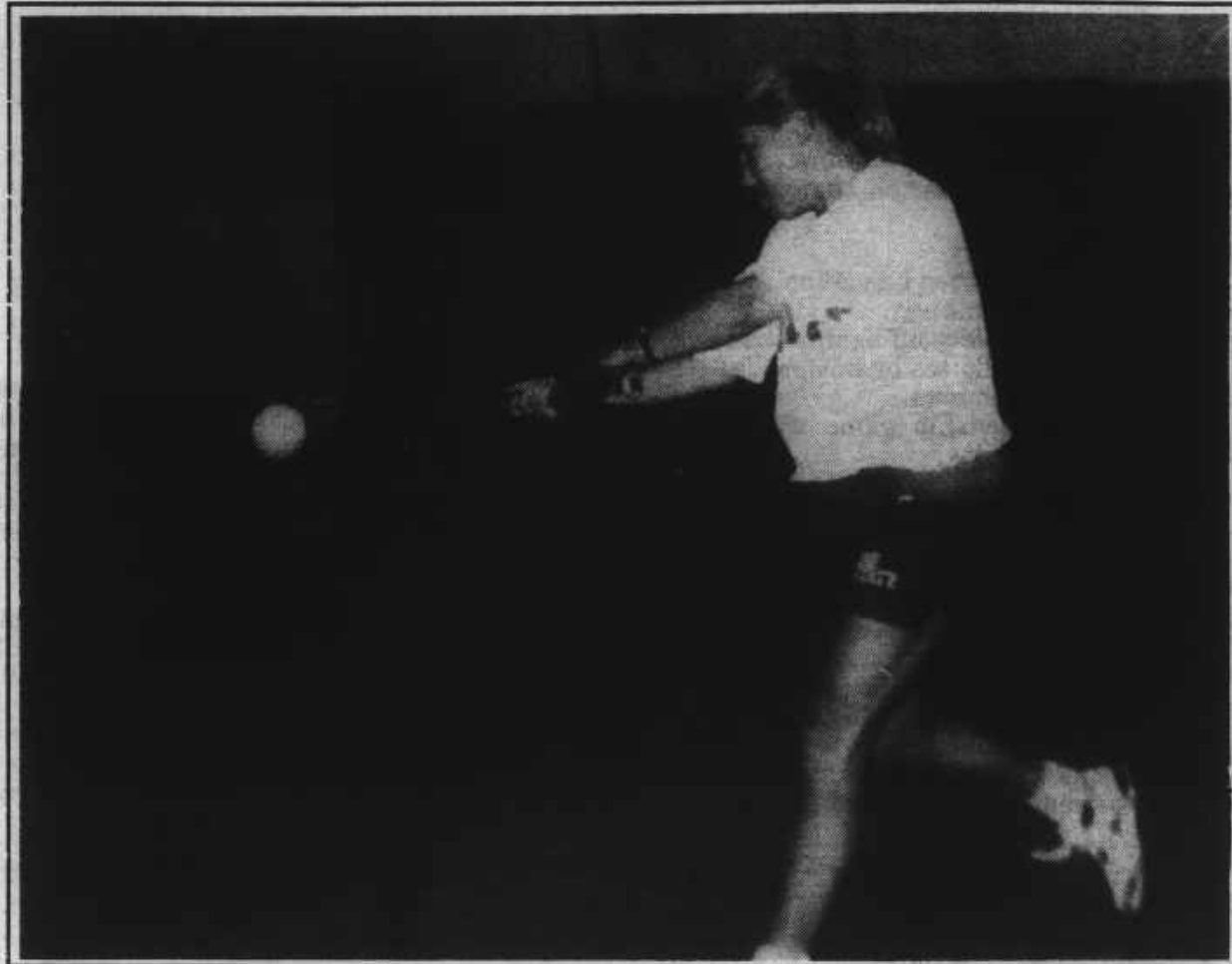
The team was able to get outside a couple of times last week, but Howe said that with the way the field conditions are now it may be a couple of weeks before they can play any of their home games here.

"We have the option of using the Keene High field," Howe said. "It's not something we want to do but we'd rather play there than on the road somewhere."

Howe said that despite the two losses over the weekend he is optimistic about the team's chances this season.

"I think we're going to surprise some people," Howe said. "Other teams have stopped thinking of us as an automatic win. We have a strong baseball program made up of quality student athletes."

## Young Owls team victorious in opener

The Keene State College lacrosse team opened its season Wednesday with a 12-8 victory against Johnson State College.

Due to foul weather and poor field conditions, the team was forced to cancel its scheduled season opener against Boston University on March 19.

Keene had trouble getting started against Johnson State and was tentative early on. Johnson State took advantage of early scoring opportunities and netted four goals before Keene tallied one.

The Owls tightened up their game in the second quarter and played more attention to ball control and defense.

At the end of the second half, Keene was trailed 5-3.

"We are a very young club... one never know what is going to happen the first game. We came out flat, did not pay attention to defense and dug ourselves a quick hole," coach Jim Draper said.

The Owls came out strong in the third quarter and attacked the cage. They took advantage of their scoring opportunities and spread out their offense.

"Their defense was playing our people very tight, we needed to recognize the one-on-one scoring opportunities with this defensive set," Draper added. "We exploited this advantage in the third quarter. I saw some very good things in the second half."

Keene hung on in the fourth to preserve a 12-8 victory.

Veteran Stefan Zwahlen netted three for KSC and rookie Jason Meny tallied four.

"For the first game, we played pretty well. There are some basic skills we need to focus upon, and our defense will get better, but I am pleased with our effort and the win. We have new goalies this year, John Barry and Jeremy McCutcheon, and they played better than I expected. Johnson State hit the post eight times so I will consider this one as a bit of luck," Draper added.

Barry and McCutcheon had 15 saves each.

The young Owls team will be tested tonight when they face off against a much improved Colby-Sawyer team. Game time is at 6 p.m.

## Room draw process painful

If students think that the whole room draw process is difficult, imagine what co-coordinators Sarah Wilson and Jenna Young have had to deal with, hundreds of college students demanding rooms in Pondsides and Holloway.

The process is an unfortunate necessity of campus life, but for all the chaos, Wilson, Young and the others who have

worked for and with them have done a fabulous job so far.

Wilson is a full-time staff member in the Residential Life Office at Keene State. Young is the Complex Director of Randall and Monadnock Halls; both know a lot about residential life on campus.

The room draw process begins when students return in the spring semester and housing contracts are made available. Despite the fact that students have from between January to mid-March to turn in the room draw paperwork, nearly 800 applications are turned in on the last day, and approximately 300 on the next to last day.

All of the applications coming in at once create a heavy workload for Residential Life. This year 1,289 returning students applied for housing for the 1994-95 academic year (813 were women, 476 were men.)

After all of the applications are handed in, each student is assigned a lottery number that will essentially determine his or her fate in room draw.

Students are divided first into men and women and then into class ranks, determined by the number of credits obtained by the end of the previous fall semester. First lottery numbers are released to students April 1, then the schedule is posted so students know when they need to select a room.

There are two types of lottery numbers that students must contend with. First, a student receives an personal lottery

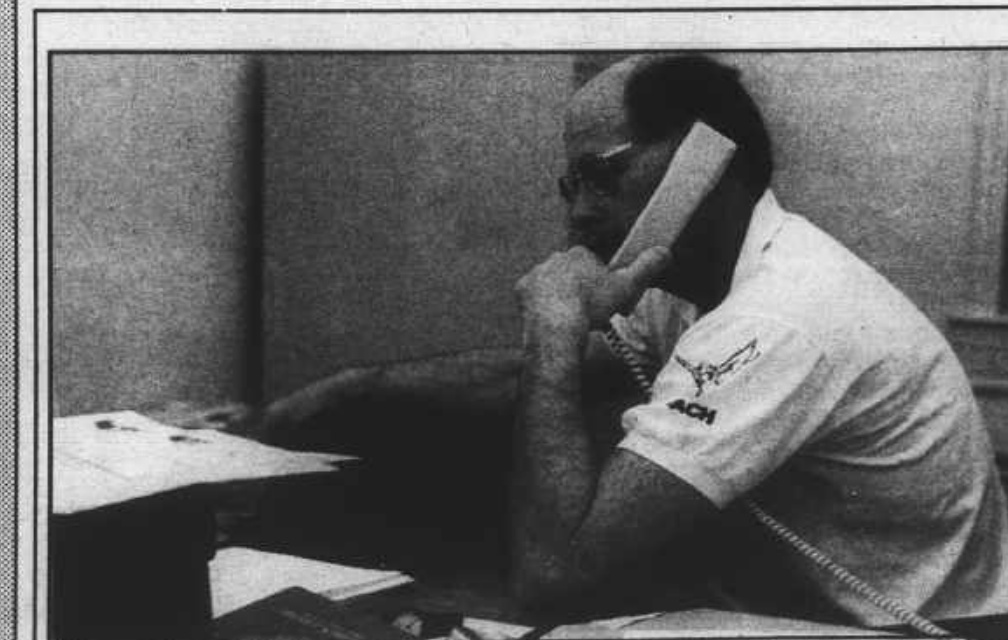
