Sept 18th 1918

Soon after breakfast Jan was brought here and later in the day Bess with the balance of her clothes and things came and we've been kept busy for more than a day unpacking. All afternoon Jan and Jim played nicely in the house with the bottles, their toys and plenty of junk. We all had supper together and later on went to the movies and they drove off to Tallahassee. Bess and I just sat and relaxed all eve.

No mail from you today, darling and how I miss your sweet letters. I did get some more scraps from Fay and am enclosing one of the nicest ones. Also enclosed are more Robert's 2¢ stamps.

It's difficult to get some good music on the air or news because of the static up this way. No other news for to night so good-night, darling and may our wishes come true very soon.

I love you, as always, and think you're the sweetest, grandest and best sweetheart in the whole universe. Stay well, beloved and try not to gain too much weight on your furlough. But do have a good time. Kye and Bess from home, all my love and devotion to you and best wishes from the family. *Phyllis*

Wednesday eve -
Sept. 19th 1945.

My darling,

Jim and I are very well but just a bit tired from being indoors these past few days. Rain stopped in the early afternoon but the sun didn't even peek out for a moment. It'll shine real brightly for us, that I'm sure of and the time isn't too far distant.

We all arose quite early this morning, slept well all night and had breakfast at 8. While Bea did her room, I dressed Jan and Jim and Mom did the shopping. We straightened up all the closets before lunch time and then ate all together. Jim napped and I had a swell time reading your latest letters of Sept. 9th and Sept 11th. Also received two regular mail letters dated Aug. 30th with stamps enclosed Envelope #6 and Aug. 28th (pictures). Am so happy you're stay at Frank's is an enjoyable one and I do hope they weren't put out too much. I have many things to send them and I'll try to get some off this week from Monticello.

You requested more money several weeks ago so I sent you about \$30 or 40 more. You'll probably have some of it waiting for you at Lily when you return this week. Hope those moccasins also reach you soon. Anything else you need, dearest?

Too bad you couldn't relax a bit in Paris and have a good time. Love you even more knowing how faithful you are but darling, do try to have a little fun.

To-night we're sitting around in the living room talking, reading and knitting. My went out for a quart of ice cream and we all enjoyed this portion of your favorite dessert. Ruth and Juliet had their saucers full too.

I'm going to bed early to night and hope to dream of my sweetheart. The time is going so slowly but I do know that very soon in the future I'll be getting the wonderful news that you're on the way home. How I do love you, darling George and I miss you every moment.

Take care of yourself, dearest and soon I'll take over that job. Keep and kisses from Jimmie and Mommy and best wishes from all the family. Cleaver called from the city, is fine and is being "rushed" and "romanced" by her latest b. f. George. All my love and devotion to you sweetheart.
