We keep plenty busy and the days seem short from a military standpoint, but darling, every moment we are separated seems like an eternity. To-day as you no doubt will recollect completes my 10th month in this men's army, and even though I had hoped to be home long before this, please try to be of good cheer until this is all over. Stay well, try not to worry, and I think our little "Reunion in Brooklyn" will soon be a reality. I know you have the fortitude and courage to carry on, and the future will have to supply the joy and happiness we missed during my absence.

As yet I have received no mail since Monday, although there is a possibility that some may arrive later in the day. Suggest you continue waiting as usual and I'm certain all the letters will be delivered. I'll thank you to forward as

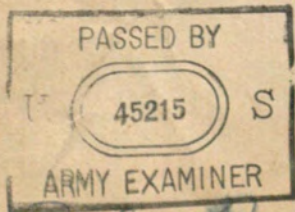
