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Bucknell U. Starts New Scholarship Plan

Lewisburg, Pa. (I.P.)—Bucknell University is seeking \$300,000 for endowed scholarships to help outstanding students who are unable to pay the increasing costs of a college education, Alfred H. Fenton, director of development, has announced. The University's long-range program is designed to interest ten Americans in providing \$15,000 each, he explained. At four per cent interest it is hoped that each of these investments in American education will produce the \$600 required to meet tuition fees here.

"We at Bucknell are concerned about the diminishing value of income from our scholarship resources. Almost daily we are forced to pass over some outstanding youth who, despite a willingness to work in his spare time, cannot finance a college education," Mr. Fenton said. In addition, the University is seeking 20 equally far-sighted citizens who will give \$7,500 each for 20 half-tuition scholarships, he reported.

"The cost of a college education has increased approximately 300 per cent in the last 20 years, according to Bucknell's president, Dr. Horace A. Hildreth. 'Consequently, there is a growing trend in government to advocate that all qualified persons should be given an education. We do not agree.

"Education cannot be given; it must be gained. We here at Bucknell subscribe to the theory that in order to become educated a person must want to be educated. Furthermore, we feel that handouts are as objectionable in education as they are on the streets," Dr. Hildreth said.

"It is our opinion that deserving students should be helped but not pampered. At Bucknell, scholarship holders not only want to work in their spare time; they are almost forced to do so in order to pay for room and board even when tuition costs are met in part by scholarship aid," he added.

Information regarding the Bucknell program has been published in a folder entitled "Education—American Style," which has been circulated by the Bucknell Development Council, a group of friends and alumni of the University or independent colleges in general and Bucknell in particular.

of their senior year. Students are required to be on campus and attending classes at least one semester after they have completed their practice teaching. Practice teaching is done in two separate schools during two nine-week periods. After each nine-week period both the student and the critic teacher rate the student according to an accepted criterion.

The rules and regulations of the college are relatively few. Conduct in the Student Union is handled by student groups. There is, of course, no drinking permitted on campus.

Students graduating from OSTC receive a B.S. degree. Starting salaries range between \$2800 and \$3200. Some starting salaries go as high as \$3200.

The Student Council officers are elected directly by the student body. The Student Council includes members of all the major organizations on campus as well as the president of each class. The Student Council establishes the rules and regulations governing the Student Union and allocates the student activity fee. Last year the Council purchased a bus for student use. Any organization or campus group may use this bus merely by paying for the cost of gas and hiring a driver.

There are seven fraternities and six sororities at OSTC. The fraternities and sororities have their houses about a mile from the campus. Some of the houses have housefathers or housemothers, while others have no resident supervisor. Most of the rules and regulations governing the operation and conduct of the houses are made and enforced by the members of the house.

Oswego State Teachers College is quite similar to KTC in its corresponding curriculum. The campus of OSTC is a little larger and more spread out than KTC's and better equipped, especially in the industrial arts field. KTC on the other hand is more compact and has a larger variety of curriculums.

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IRC Conference to Be Held on Campus

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EDITORIAL

In a recent impartial inventory, it was found that on our campus there is a total of 27 clubs and organizations presumably dedicated to the purpose of serving the college. Theoretically at least, this should be more than an ample source of social life, activity, and school spirit. This supposition, however, pre-supposes that each club contributes its share to the overall picture — which is unfortunately not the case.

It takes very little alert observation to reach the conclusion that many of KTC's clubs and organizations are identifiable in name only. Many examples of non-cooperation can readily be unveiled. For example, recently each club and organization was asked the comparatively easy task of participating in a skit night. Participation in this entertainment required only the production of a ten minute act. Yet out of 27 requests, only six were met with acceptance. The equally simple undertaking of selecting a candidate for White Rose Queen was met with similar indifference.

Supposedly each club and organization has in its constitution certain objectives and purposes which guide its activities. These activities naturally enough should be molded to render some service to the college. Each year, you, the students of KTC, pour some \$650 into the coffers of these various clubs and organizations. Therefore it seems no more than fair that some dividend be received for this investment. Possibly some of the interests and purposes are similar between two or more clubs. If this is the case why wouldn't combining members and energy under one name strengthen the prominence of both organizations. It seems wise also, to have one central agency decide whether or not a club or organization is living up to certain standards — the student council could well act in this capacity. If these standards are not being met, this agency should have the power to see that objectives are met or to revoke the charter of the club.

It is not too much to expect that the majority of social life on campus should emanate from the various club units that compose the college. Each one should make its contribution to the overall picture. Yet the vogue seems to be blaming some intangible actor that no one is able to actually identify. This meting out of blame can be heard at almost any time or place around the campus, but when it comes time for attending the social committee meetings and doing something constructive, the enthusiasm seems to fade away. It is through the medium of the social committee that the clubs and organizations plan social life and activities for the college, yet at the last social committee meeting only four members were present. Attendance has been equally poor all year. When the question is raised, "How can we improve our social life if the clubs and organizations will not even be represented at a mutual planning committee?" there seems to be one glaring answer. Start at the bottom; improve the function of the base units, our clubs and organizations, before we attack the larger problem. Perhaps even, the larger problem will vanish if all of the smaller ones reach solution.

The school year is divided into three quarters of twelve weeks each. Each class meets for four hours a week, at the same time each day. No classes are held Tuesday morning or Wednesday afternoon. There are no Saturday classes. The marking system corresponds with that of KTC. The courses offered are: Business Education; Education and Psychology; English; Health and Physical Education, only as a minor; Industrial Arts and Vocational Instruction; Mathematics; Modern Languages; Music; Science; Social Science; Art; and Elementary Education.

Practice teaching is begun in the junior year. Juniors train each day for half a day for one term. Their senior year they practice teach a whole day every day for a term. There are three training schools connected with the college in the city.

There are many clubs on campus, one among them being the Student-Faculty Cooperative Government Association which has as its purpose promoting harmony and cooperation among individuals and groups of individuals.

The College Chorus consists of 86 members. They are required to meet twice a week. There are two athletic clubs, the Men's Athletic Association and the Women's Athletic Association. The College Theater is also an active organization. There are two honor societies, Kappa Delta Pi and Epsilon Pi Tau. They too have a chapter of the F.T.A. and Alpha Phi Omega. No fraternities or sororities are allowed.

The campus consists of Marcus White Dormitory, the main building and a new classroom building is expected to be ready for use by September. There are several other temporary buildings.

partment, administering the finances of the paper, collecting for advertising pledged by local advertisers and maintaining contact with student opinions and ideas.

Correlating with this idea is the academic credit given students for supervising sports, participating in the Glee Club, and managing the Campus Club. Now this is not to take away credit from any of these activities. It merely shows that services have been given academic recognition when the occasion calls for it. The Glee Club members put in four to five hours a week for the academic credit they receive. The Campus Club manager receives credit in Distributive Education for the time he puts in in the management of the Campus Club. The supervisor of sports receives gym credit for the time he puts in in supervising intramural sports. Therefore, it seems only logical that the members of the Managing Board of the MONADNOCK should receive credit accordingly.

In my past year as editor I have realized just how much time is involved in the editing and publishing of a college newspaper. Such a policy of giving academic credit to those holding a position on the Managing Board could of course only apply to future boards. The members of the Managing Board devote too much of their time to the college and student body without some form of concrete recognition, even if it's in the form of a single academic credit. Such credit would be no outgrowth gift. Those who receive it will earn the credit they receive by fulfilling the duties of the offices they hold just as the Glee Club manager and intramural supervisor earn the credit they receive for services to the student body and the college.

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Professor Anderson stressed that modern education faces a large task but that it is doing a good job in the face of inadequate facilities. Still, he said, American education has a long way to go.

He called for educators to encourage criticism as an aid to stirring interest in the very real problems that American education faces today. "Personally, I subscribe to the view that the right to dissent and the right to criticism are an essential part of our American heritage."

"A sound school, or school system, or college or university can justify itself in a free society," he continued. "If it is not sound, it should welcome criticism which is offered in a constructive spirit."

Plymouth opened its attack in the very first inning. Wilbur Hixson walked and advanced to second on a single by Marston. Bob Davis then let a double play ball go through his legs to allow Hixson to score. Day's infield out registered Marston. The game then settled into a good pitcher's duel until the 6th. 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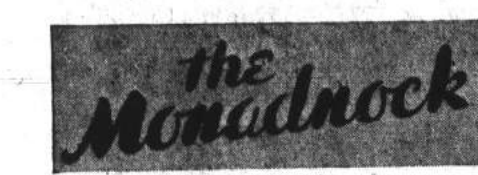

Niemela tied the Willmantic attack with two hits, scored two runs, and batted in three runs. Catcher Niemela had two hits and batted home two tallies as the Owls suffered their second straight loss.
