The Acts pass'd by your Legislature appear well calculated to accomplish the valuable purposes for which they were intended.

From what has been already done in consequence of the Powers vested in you, and the explicit assurances given us of your continued vigorous exertions, the Committee have no doubt of their success.

Such decisive measures afford us singular satisfaction, and demand the warmest acknowledgements of every friend to his Country.

We flatter ourselves from the disposition manifested by your State, in so cheerfully acquiescing in the requisitions of this Committee, that an entire confidence will continue to subsist between the Executive authority of that State and the Committee. Be assured Sir we shall most sedulously cultivate it on our part.

The absence of the Comptroller Genl from Camp, prevented our giving him direction with respect to sending forward the necessary orders to receive the supplies, but this difficulty is now

removed.

Your interpretation of our letter of 4th.
with in the liberal manner you have done
evinced a generosity of sentiment, and true re-
gard to the interest of the Union; that ^{ought not upon} ~~this~~
