To the Editors:

He never wondered whether a jet bomber might leave some foreign land and in a few hours wipe out half the country, with some atomic weapon. No, modern education can't be taught, nor can we try to teach today, using the principles and methods of our grandfathers.

Wow! I almost got wound up in my favorite sermon.

The thought I would like to pass on is, keep your editorials directed to the students. Make them things that they are important as prospective teachers. That teaching is a wonderful and proud profession. That parents and society as a whole, leave the responsibility of rearing the child to the school.

You have a responsibility to the students as the editor of their paper. It's up to you to keep them aware of themselves.

Study of Shakespeare at Stratford, an introduction to 17th century England at historic Oxford University, courses in English and European culture in the capital cities of London and Edinburgh—these are the study opportunities for American students at British schools in 1956.

Two weeks remain in which to apply for British summer study. March 26 is the closing date for applications for admission and award to the four British universities. Application blanks may be secured from the Institute of International Education, 1 East 67th Street, New York 21, or from the regional offices of the Institute in Chicago, Denver, Houston, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Washington, D. C.

Courses to be offered next summer are: Shakespeare and Elizabethan Drama, the course given by the University of Birmingham at Stratford-upon-Avon; Literature and Art from 1750 to 1850, including the intellectual background of the Romantic Movement, at the University of London; Literature, Politics and Arts in 17th Century England, at Oxford University; and the European Renaissance, given by the Scottish Universities of Edinburgh.

Mr. C. D. Schwinn has just announced that since the Keene Teachers College newspaper, the Monadnock, was kind enough to choose him as this week's Campus Wheel, he will donate the sum mentioned above to the college to be used as they see fit. This announcement was made one month ago but was not allowed to be released until after Dr. Still Older had formulated the plans as to how the money was to be used. This decision was reached, with the help of Dean Snarle and Mrs. Standstill, on March 31, and was immediately released to the AT News service. Dr. Still Older has released the following news item.

Massacre In Huntress

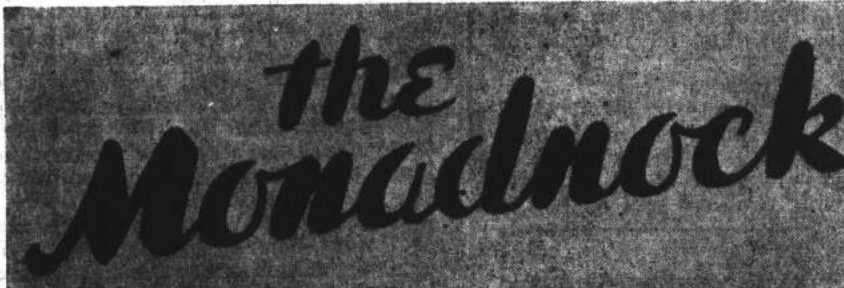
