Dear George,

I think I've missed writing to you for a couple of days, so I better get right to work.

I am assuming that you are now at the range for a week. I sure hope it doesn't prove too rough. If the weather is as nice as it is here, it should be pretty nice. It should be almost a welcome change to be outdoors after so many years working in an office. Too bad it couldn't be under different conditions.

I really had a swell day yesterday. Played handball for about 2 1/2 hours with 3 lieutenants, and seemed to be on my game. I beat them at their own game. (4 wall) Then we went

outdoors and played straight wall, and I really did my self justice.

In the evening, I was one of a group to attend a radio broadcast in town. The show lasted 30 minutes, and was smelly. However, they had Joseph Cotton, and Rosalind Russell as guest stars. She's as thin as a dime, but she can wear clothes. They had nothing to do, and their talents were wasted. It did help to break up the monotony though.

This morning, I feel rather stiff, so I had no choice but to gold-buck off P.T. and drill. As you can see by the stationery, I'm in the Red Cross lounge. This afternoon I must visit the clinic, and meet Fran, so you can see that I've really got a good deal here.



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In fact, it is too good to leave. That's why I feel so broken up, for I'm almost dead certain that this will be my last weekend here. I expect to leave here some day next week. Probably Tuesday or Wednesday.

If I can possibly arrange to stay over for another 3 weeks or so, you can be sure I will. I have a chance, slight, but it may work.

You see, due to my eye trouble, it was necessary that I be dealt with by the flight surgeon. Last week I had to take another 64 (physical) well, at that time, he suggested that I continue my treatments at least several more weeks. However, since then, I think that the allergy ~~major~~ major (doctor) has turned in a good report on my condition. I



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don't know what the results will be.
But if I have any control over this
at all, I'll still be here when the
next shipment has left. This is really
too good a deal to leave. Oh, I'll take
what comes, but I would much rather
be held over.

Fran and I are in the
best of health and spirits. We're really
conscious of how fortunate we've been to
be together, and we're not complaining.
I hate like the dickens to leave her here
all alone, but it's best and we both
know it. I may be able to arrange something
in Las Vegas, but until such time, she'll
stay here. I'll probably be restricted the
first two weeks anyway. —

Hope you're getting along O.K.
and that you're getting the breaks —
with that Champagne Party always uppermost in my
mind. Bob
