Dear Sq. Flo.

It's now 6:30 P.M. and
all's well. Had a pleasant,
fast trip back here. Got back
in Camp about 10:15 and was
shown to my barracks. Had a
time locating my bed; which
was disposed of during my
short stay at home. However,
a good time was had by all.
(in the dark)

Today, we had 3
honest. D. goodness meals. Each
was a decided improvement
over any of the others. I've had

since I arrived here. I had my first detail today; which consisted of shoveling some sand into a truck. This lasted about 2 hrs; after which time, we had lunch and the rest of the day to ourselves.

Things seem to be humming much more smoothly now. I feel like a veteran already.

Some of the boys I arrived here with last Tuesday have been shipped. Some are going tomorrow.

So far, I'm still here. I'm not so impatient to leave for a permanent camp any more; but I ^{wouldn't} ~~can't~~ mind knowing one way or another. If I thought I was going to remain here for a while. I could adjust myself more readily.



Should I be here next week.

 could come up to see me. However,
 let's not dwell on the
 future.

I hope Mom and Pop have
 gotten over my leaving. Mom
 seemed quite upset. Try to
 reassure her that I'm doing
 fine and dandy —
