were in the room with us. Baby talks
to you on his toy telephone in his own lingo.

He's as sweet as a breath of Spring
 and is like his Daddy in many ways. To
 break the monotony of things he messed
 his clothes up with that brown stuff while
 I was out of the room and I smelled it
 rooms away. It was all cleaned up in
 a jiffy, he was washed and powdered
 and I guess I gave him too much powder
 yesterday.

Mom and Pop called and told me that
 they received your Sunday letter this morning
 I only got your Friday letter to-day so
 you see what I mean when I complain
 about the air mail service. The folks are
 fine and hope they can also get to see

You while you get your technical training. My sister Eleanor called also. her cold is much better and she's not working too hard. My mother left yesterday morning for the country, as I mentioned in yesterday's letter. Minnie Fisher spoke with me and all is fine except for little Joel who is getting over a cold.

To-day I gave our Dresden lamps a good washing and I could see those white angels smiling at me. They said "It's about time you gave us a bath." Also I packed up the bathette and put it down in the storeroom. I guess we'll

not have any use for it for some time.
Mr. Napoli definitely will not do more
than paint the kitchen and bath so I'll
not give it another thought.

Blanche's husband Joe Glikman (Walker family)
is being shipped real soon. He came in on a
24 hour pass and was sent to a P.O.E. Mrs. Walker
is getting better very slowly and complaining about
pains in her left side. Betty was just in and
sends her regards. Haven't seen too much of Winnie
lately.

I love you as much as ever, darling,
wish every second could be spent with you
but I'll keep on pushing and we'll be
happier than ever when it's all over.
