

Knowing that the Middlebury Invitational would not be without its challenges (25th ranked St. Lawrence University was also at the meet). Coach Thomas had the men pack run, a strategy where the front runners run a more controlled race. This allows the fourth and fifth runners to be closer to the action. According to Coach Thomas this helped the men turn in a "dominant performance."

The Owls placed eight runners in the top 15, including a 1-2-3 finish by Scott Jensen, Matt St. Germaine, and Mark Miller respectively. Godfrey Berger placed 6th followed by Paul

The Owl Harriers won the meet with a score of 22 followed by St. Lawrence with 46. The men have much to look forward to knowing that they have performed well without one of their most valuable assets. Two time All-American Wilson Perez has been sidelined with an injury, but "We expect Wilson to be back by the 1st of October," said Coach Thomas. With the return of Perez in the near future the

# Malaysian forest researcher pushes 'usable' forests

Wong, who addressed an audience of nearly 50 last Friday morning in Rhodes Hall, on Malaysian forest sustainability, was able to experience the forests of the Granite State on a morning venture into the forests of Troy with Keene State geography professor, Klaus Bayr before his presentation.

"You have a fine example of 'usable' forest here in New Hampshire. And I'm always interested in visiting different areas of the world because forest aesthetics are unique from one part of the world to another," Wong said.

Dr. Wong has always been interested in the forest and the outdoors as early as his involvement with the Boy Scouts as a

Through his involvement with the outdoors at a young age Wong was able to "get used to the forest environment." As far as Wong's work in Malaysia goes, he also focuses on what he refers to as 'usabili-

While the lifelong tree-enthusiast agrees that forests must be protected from destruction and

that researchers and naturelovers alike should attempt to make forests more usable and attract people to spend time in

"Especially in the summer, a Wong of the Forest Research forest's canopy acts as a natural air conditioner; I would think this would induce people to spend more time in the outdoors," Wong said.

Wong, originally from Malaysia, provided the audience with interesting, detailed information on the geography and natural setting of his nativehome via slides of statistical charts and photographs of the

This short album caught the eve of Geffen Records, and along with producer Mike Clink, Guns N' Roses released their first major label album, Appetite For Destruction in 1987. Songs like "Nightrain," "Mr. Brownstone," and "Rocket Queen" added a whole new flavor to the then striving metal scene. And monster successes like "Welcome to the Jungle," the power ballad "Sweet Child O' Mine," and Paradise City," turned the band into a household name overnight.

Eager to fill the need of the fans GN'R released GN'R Lies in 1988. The album was split into two halves, the first was a sampling from '86's Live Like a Suicide album including a cover of Aerosmith's "Mama Kin," and the second was four new acoustic songs, including a toned-down version of "You're Crazy," (off their major-label debut). Again, it was the band's ballad "Patience," which gained the most attention from fans

n September 9th, the last day of their Up tour, R.E.M. ushered the audience of the Tweeter Center into the next millennium. And no, it wasn't while playing, "It's the End of the World as We Know It."

"This gesture shows up a next song," lead singer Michael REVIEW Stipe said, and then stretched his arms in the air, palms behind him and pushed. "You figure out what it means." Then the band burst into the poppy, optimistic "Electrolite" from their 1996

album New Adventures In High-Fi. Stipe repeated the gesture during the lines, "Twentieth century go and sleep/ you"re plasticine/ that is obscene." Suddenly he switched, pressed his arms toward the thousands of people in front of him, and sang, "You are the stars tonight/ You shine electric outta sight/ Your light

eclipsed the moon tonight." And if anything, Michael Stipe is full of love. The whopping twenty-five song set was a R.E.M. fan's wet dream, from the mesmerizing beats of "Lotus," and the crushing "What's the Frequency, Kenneth?"

Although the karaoke pop hits of "The One I Love," "Losing My Religion," and "Man On the Moon" were the largest crowd pleasers.


On their albums R.E.M. sound tight and coarse. Their live shows on the other hand are blockbuster wide-screen explorations into the bones of energy with the volume cranked past eleven. The band played like speed freaks on fast forward. Buck and Mills pranced all over the stage, and occasionally ditched guitars for keyboards. All while crazy-eyed, bald-headed Stipe, who wore what looked like a hospital gown, controlled the finely tuned ship.

Between songs, Stipe was /calm and friendly, telling the stories behind the songs and reminiscing about late comedian Andy Kaufman. But as soon as the music began, the calm Stipe transformed into energizerbunny-Stipe: drunk on musical energy, zipping across the stage, and dragging the



Those words motivated Glenn to have the greatest rookie season of any wide receiver before him. Glenn finished the season with 90 catches and 1,000 plus yards. He single handedly was the catalyst to the Patriots making the playoffs and the Super Bowl. In his second season with Patriots he only participated in nine games which hurt them, and then last year he only played in nine games because of numerous injuries including a separated shoulder that ended his season.

Glenn stayed around all offseason to train with the New England strength and conditioning team, so that way he could be in the best shape of his life for the upcoming season.

Bledsoe and Glenn worked out together and ran drills through most of the off-season to make up for the lost time the last few years. Bledsoe to Glenn is one of the elite combinations in the NFL right now. If they want to become one of the greatest duos of all time, they'll have to stay healthy, but many experts compare them to Joe Montana and Jerry Rice or Terry Bradshaw and Lynn Swann. 
