Much Respected Sir

I have once more got into this part of the world the occasion by a very disagreeable Circumstance having been reduc'd by sickness at the Southward to a very low situation I obtained permission from the Marquis de la Fayette to come to the Northward; by not having Rec'd from the public any thing of any amount for the Services done in the Army & the Long March I am oblig'd to undertake & the very great Expence which attends a Journey has deprived me of every means of Subsistence has left me no other Resource to hope for present Relief but an Application to your Honour for the Return of that money Expended in the Service the Gentlemen of your State was pleas'd to order me to attend to four years ago with Sect^r Hoopes whose Directions I was to observe & Instructions follow this Sir I strictly attended to & every effort in my power for the good of this Country was taken the account of Expence arising from that Service is yet unsettled & what I humbly wish for my

present life; in this behalf I take the Liberty
of begging the favour that it may come under
your Consideration, one thing more I beg leave
to say before your honour my service in
Col. Peabody's Regiment in the year 1778 that
the Satisfaction of my pay may be attended
to as what I have receiv'd on that Service can
by no means be call'd pay or more than one month
of six years honour will be pleas'd to take
my situation with these Circumstances
in Consideration & be kind enough to intimate
the probability of a Settlement with the
Committee or State by a Line which I
wish to have sent by the Southern
post to Providence where I shall be
as I have some public business which
must be attended to I shall be forever
Obligat'd to your honour at being
the greatest favour can be from your
Obedt. & Very hum^{ble} Serv^t
