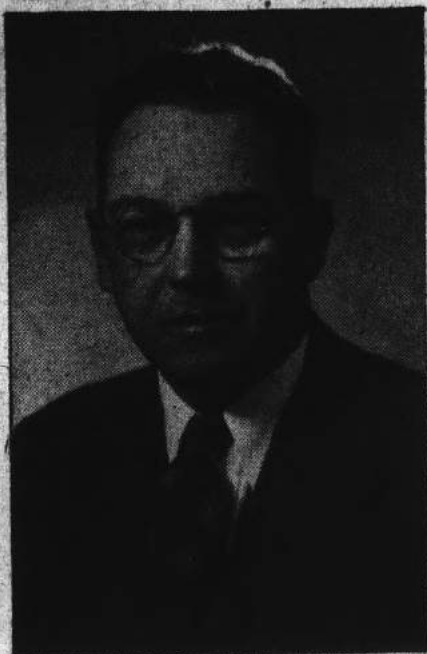

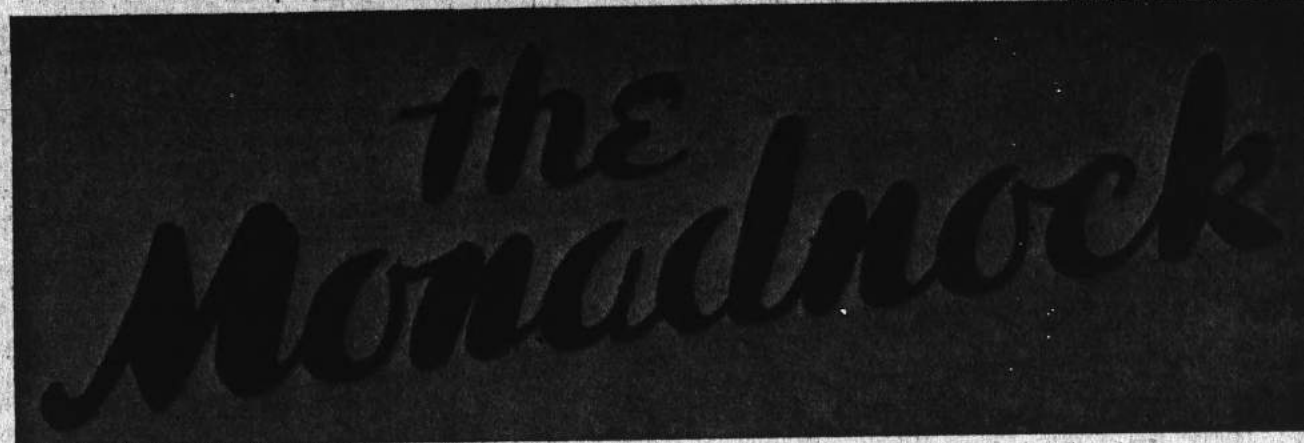

Frosh Orientation Sets Stage For School Year; 68 Select Elementary Field, 22 Secondary

Once again another college year opened, with one hundred and seven freshmen, plus fourteen transfers and four advance students beginning their college career at KTC. The first week, busy for both the entering students and the welcoming committee, contained everything from tests to tears.

The dorms were open Sunday afternoon, September 9, for early comers, and a reception was held for the freshmen and their parents in Fiske social room. A buffet supper in the college dining room preceded the fireside program held in Fiske social room, under the direction of the three religious clubs on campus.

On Monday, the rest of the freshmen entered in full force, and the new class registered in Hale Building. The additions to each curriculum were as follows: elementary, sixty-eight; secondary, twenty-two; home economics, six; and trade and industry, eleven. They were joined by fourteen transfers and four advance students.

In the afternoon after participating in group singing the new students were welcomed by our President Dr. Lloyd P. Young. Following this, Deans' meetings were held in Fiske and the gym, where Mrs. Randall and Mr. Carle addressed the new students. After dinner, a Freshman mixer, an evening of games and dancing, was enjoyed in the gym.

Shacklette, Perrodin Join College Faculty

This year KTC has the privilege of having two new faculty members in its midst: Mr. Phillip Shacklette and Dr. Alex F. Perrodin.

Mr. Shacklette is in charge of the Distributive Education course. He received his B.S. from Manhattan College in 1931, graduated from the School of Business at Columbia University in 1936, and earned his Master's Degree from Columbia University in 1950.

During World War II, Mr. Shacklette was an officer in charge of the United States Surplus Materials. He has had over ten years of business experience, and considerable experience in the field of advertising. Mr. Shacklette was once a teacher of commercial subjects.

Dr. Alex F. Perrodin, who is Superintendent of the Laboratory Schools, obtained his B.Ed. degree from the State College at Stevens Point, Wisconsin; his Ph.D. at the University of Wisconsin; and his Ed.D. in 1951 from the Teachers College at Columbia University.

Dr. Perrodin has had considerable experience in teaching in rural schools, as a principal of an elementary school, and as a supervising teacher in laboratory schools.

Mr. Shacklette is replacing Mr. Fiddler who is now in charge of the Distributive Education course at Western Michigan College of Education in Kalamazoo.

Dr. Perrodin is replacing Mr. Wolfer, now assistant in the educational department of Boston University, where he is working for his Doctor's degree.

We heartily welcome both Mr. Shacklette and Dr. Perrodin to our campus, and hope that their stay here will be long and happy.

Dr. Young Addresses Students at Assembly

Monday morning, September 24, Dr. Young addressed the college with the convocation message. His information concerning our program as a state institution was of interest to all, and Dr. Young presented a four-fold plan for providing a well rounded college education: 1. A broad, general, basic education. 2. Training in a specific field. 3. Professional knowledge and skill. 4. Inner urge to learn and help others. As future teachers we must plan our individual curriculum to include these points to develop our understanding as good citizens and teachers.

We know the standing of KTC and her possibilities are always expanding. The college can provide the facilities and even open the door to opportunity; however, the student body must have the spirit to use all this to the best advantage. Our own personal college spirit constitutes part of this success of the program. It is our responsibility. Let's take it!

The new tennis courts that have been in the construction process nearly all summer are now almost finished; they do, however, lack the wire fence around the court.

The reason for the delay in putting up the wire is that wire is one of the products that is now scarce on the market. The old wire will be used for the courts in back of the library, but because the courts are now regulation size and hence larger than before more fencing is necessary and an entirely new fence will be put around the courts between Huntress and Parker.

These new courts have many advantages over the old ones. First of all they are regulation size and so it will be possible for our tennis team to play matches here. Another important factor is in connection with the surface; it is an asphalt base covered with a bituminous seal. This combination gives a very hard surface which will become even more durable as time goes on. In another year the surface should be strong enough to withstand the pressure of high heels. Also important is the color of the surface. Red is not as glaring as black nor does it get as hot.

The college has been planning and saving for this project for a long time. It is expected that the courts should last for a long time without need of repair. Keene (Continued on Page 4)

Perhaps the next logical step is Saturday morning classes. As long as there is a mass exodus every Friday afternoon, there can be little interest created in campus activities. If enough students make up their minds to stay around campus, interest can be developed. And if they work at it, spirit can be assured.

The solution is really up to the students themselves. If you want a mediocre college life, it's yours. If you want a rich college life, that too can be yours. It's your decision. Make sure you make the right one.

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Owls Nip Lowell in Season's Opener; Good Season Expected

With a sterling last quarter drive, the KTC soccer team launched its fourth season with a hard-fought 2-1 triumph over Lowell Textile. The game Owl squad carried the attack to the fancy-footed booters from Massachusetts in the final period to pump home their two goal total. Up until this late game rush, the Joycemen were veritably on the ropes from the constant Textile offensive thrusts. But displaying determined soccer, the local squad scored the winning goals in the late stages of the game to emerge victorious. The winning counter was dumped into the nets by left-wing Frank Sorger, after Phil Hyde had scored only minutes earlier on a long try from outside the goal area.

While a strong wind swept across the athletic field, the Owl offensive was practically nil during the first three quarters, but in the fast-moving final period, the charges of Coach Joyce turned in an admirable performance and opened their seven game slate on the right foot. Marring the afternoon activities, however, was the injury to starting halfback, Nick Kontinos, in the third quarter.

Lowell's lone tally came midway through the second stanza, as Textile's inside left headed the rebound of a shot off goalie Russ McLaughlin's hands into the pay-dirt area. Other than that the stout defense of the Joycemen, including several fine saves by McLaughlin, prevented Lowell Textile from notching another counter. Then came the inspired drive of the Owls for the tying and clinching points.

This year's soccer squad began its practice sessions shortly after the opening of college, and Coach Summer Joyce had been drilling his cohorts for this opening test. With nine veterans on hand from last year's team which finished with four wins, one loss, and a tie, this season's club figures to be the best that Joyce has had in the three previous seasons that soccer has been played at KTC.

Led by Phil Hyde and last year's high scorer, Nap Benoit, the Owls should have a potent scoring outfit, but lack of reserve strength may hamper the overall efficiency of the squad.

The lineup for the opener of the seven game schedule read like this: Veterans Frank Sorger and Al Stevens at wings; Phil Hyde and Nap Benoit, also lettermen, at insides; and newcomer, Morgan Wright, a Keene High product, at center. Holdover Nick Kontinos, centered the halfbacks, with Harvey Derby and Gordon Durnford, first year men, flanking him. The inner defense appears sound as Bill Lafferrandre and Ray McLaughlin will fullback in front of goalie Russ McLaughlin. All saw service last year. Destined for plenty of service before the season ends are roll Warren, John Tierney and Mac MacKenzie. Gene Farrell, another veteran, was absent from Saturday's game, but will be available for the remainder of the season.

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Unusual Teacher Selection Program Voted In by Faculty at Florence

Florence, Ala. (I.P.)—The faculty of Florence State Teachers College has voted into operation an unusual program designed to screen and select carefully the students to be trained, graduated and recommended by the college for teaching positions.

This move is designed to attract into the teaching profession better qualified students and to screen out those whose level of scholarship and ability would weaken the teaching profession.

As set up after careful study, the plan requires that students make application for admission to teacher training courses not later than the last quarter of their sophomore year, stating their desired field of education, whether elementary or secondary.

Applicants for admission to professional training must be recommended by the department in which the student is majoring and by the Department of Education and Psychology. The prospective teacher must have at least a C average and must have made a satisfactory showing in tests used to measure ability in the use of English.

During the senior year, students will be required to take practice teaching under the supervision of experienced critic teachers. No student will be permitted to take practice teaching who has less than a C average in his professional training or major field. Cooperation with the placement service of the college in preparing the candidate's personal data will also be required.

A committee will be set up to hear appeals from students who are rejected because of a physical or personality difficulty. The committee will also act in an advisory capacity in helping the student revise his vocational plans if he is not accepted for professional training.

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Dr. Hill Speaks to Students at Assembly

In the first general college assembly of the year, Dr. Leslie P. Hill spoke to the students of KTC on "We and the World." Dr. Hill was President of Cheney Pennsylvania State Teachers College from 1913 until last year. The purpose of his talk was to give the students an insight on what they should try to learn from their college studies.

Dr. Hill advised the students that in order for them to take their proper places in the world they must become fully acquainted with it and with the people in it. He spoke about the prejudice shown by the white race towards the negro and yellow races, and reminded his listeners that the colored peoples comprise two-thirds of the entire world population.

To become acquainted with world problems, the speaker declared that the students must (1) know about the world itself through the study of the sciences;

(2) know themselves through the study of anthropology, history and geology; (3) know the extent of man's hopes by studying his literature, art and the humanities; and (4) know about the everyday lives, customs and manners of foreign peoples by personal study and contact.

On Wednesday morning, more tests were given to the freshmen. The upper classmen arrived during the day, and everyone got together at supper, which was held at Al Fresco on the campus. In the evening open house was held in the gym, where swimming, bowling, ping-pong, pool cards, and dancing were enjoyed by all.

Classes started Thursday morning for freshmen and upperclassmen, but the freshmen spent one hour in the morning at an assembly.

Clubs and Organizations Night was held in the evening where representatives from different groups informed them of the nature and activities of their organizations. A general meeting was held first, and then the freshmen attended the group meetings of their choice.

Another assembly program was held for the freshmen Friday morning. The Faculty-Student Dinner was held that evening in the college dining room. Heron's orchestra played for dancing at the President's Reception and Dance, held in the gym.

On Saturday it rained again and kept everyone from going to the College Camp on Wilson Pond but the edible portion of the picnic was still enjoyed in the college dining room at noon.

An informal dance and social was held Saturday evening in the gym. Wednesday evening, September 19, an At Home for all entering students was held at the residence of Dr. and Mrs. Lloyd P. Young.

College was "officially opened" at the Convocation for all college students at the Spaulding Gymnasium, September 24.

Milwaukee, Wis. (I.P.)—All freshmen at Milwaukee State College will be placed into a newly-created "general college" this fall. This action follows a decision of the State Board of Normal School Regents authorizing all nine state teachers colleges to set up four-year liberal arts schedules this year.

Besides freshmen, the general college will include students who do not meet requirements for admission to either a teaching or a liberal arts degree curriculum, and special students who do not want a degree. A 1.0 grade point average will be needed for liberal arts, compared to the 1.3 G.P.A. for teacher training.

We no longer will be able to take high school students from the top 40 per cent of their class as we have in the past, declared Dr. J. Martin Klotzsch, president. "Instead we will have to open the doors wider and admit more quantity instead of just quality."

The college was allowed to take the top 40 per cent on the grounds that the professional training offered necessitated students with higher scholastic abilities.

Except for students who have already begun work in curricula leading to teaching degrees, all students will receive a Bachelor of Arts or a Bachelor of Science. (Continued on Page 4.)
