Received your Friday and Saturday

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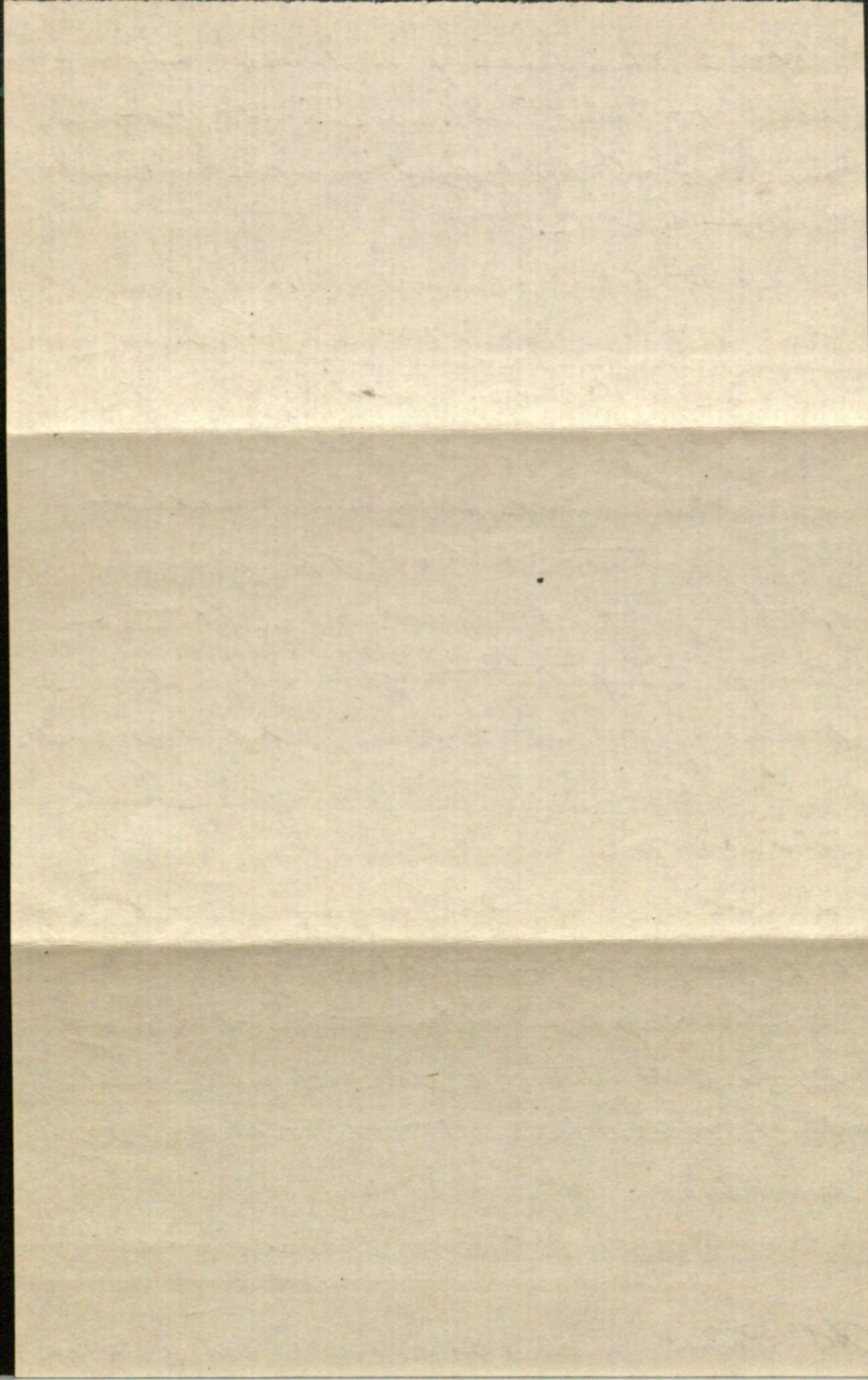
letters this morning and also the

Ernest Marshall.

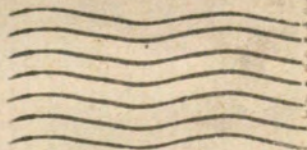
I still love you ever so dearly, my
