PARENTS DAY

KTC threw out the mat of welcome to parents of students on Sunday, June 5th. Over 100 parents attended. Highlighting the activities was the special concert of the KTC Glee Club under the direction of Harry W. Davis. Visiting followed in the respective dormitories.

Do you think that KTC should have a band? This question was asked the writer a few days ago, and when the answer was in the affirmative he was promptly drafted to give a reason through the college newspaper. Maybe the Editor, or perhaps he was Co-Editor, thought that nearly a half century of band connections made one qualified to pass judgment.

I am thinking back over the past ten years here at KTC, and I can recall so many instances when the band, then active, fitted into the college life with much color. Its membership was 97% students and that is the principle it should operate on. It played for chapel, basketball games, and other college functions.

One of the outstanding achievements was a bank skit built around the life in a country town and store. This program was repeated several times away from college, and several compliments from outsiders were to the effect that the skit was as entertaining as any picture they had observed. Much credit is due Mr. Bushnell for the success of that skit. Everyone in the band was thrilled and proud as they tuted a horn or played a drum for KTC.

At another time, the band made a tour of high schools in southern New Hampshire. It drove to Boston in the evening and attended a circus.

To cover these activities there naturally has to be rehearsals and many times this was a hardship as students are scheduled in many other programs. But it can be arranged so that any student honestly interested in band activity can fill that requirement.

So far as needing an instrument, if you do not possess one the college is equipped to provide one all the way from a piccolo, base horn (in two keys) to drums, and all toothers in between.

To have a good band we just need students who can play passably well and who have the will and desire to make a success of the organization. You will have a good time and a profitable one musically. To help put the band on top, I think there should be encouragement from non-playing students. Just a little lift once in awhile will work wonders.

Faculty could build up morale by encouraging the players. They could also attend rehearsals occasionally.

In the fall of 1947, an attempt was made to form a band at KTC. Twenty students reported. Rehearsals were held and it seemed to me that the best band the college ever boasted was in the making--and there have been some very good bands in the past. However, in a very few weeks it vanished. To this day, I am unaware as to the reason.

Having given my services in the past to different KTC bands, and expressing the same in the future, I would like to state in closing that 100% co-operation between faculty and students could result in the establishment of a colorful band at K.T.C. A band is definitely needed to round out college life.
