We had sort of hoped that the mail would arrive to-day, but no luck. It's getting tougher waiting for one of your letters, but I know they're enroute, so I guess another day will not be too long to wait. I am CQ to-night, but have arranged to go on the night seeing train to Berchtesgarden at 6.30 in the morning. It's an all day outing with 3 meals supplied enroute. Am taking a couple of rolls of film along, and hope to have some swell shots of the madman's hangout before the day ends. The weather forecast is warm and sunny, and I'll be sure to hold your hand (in mind) as we make the tour.

I have spent most of the day waiting letters to the folks, Bob, Don, Pervus, Kay and you. I wrote Eleanor a long letter last night in reply to her last letter. The weather has been warm the past few days, but the evenings are delightfully cool. I guess the surrounding mountains and the river helps to cool the place off mighty.



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I am at present listening to the 10 P.M. news, but that important age announcement we are so anxiously and patiently awaiting is not yet forthcoming. The Henry Aldrich program has just come on but before I go much further I'll probably change the station. This stuff is re-broadcast from Munich, Germany.

Hope you and Jimmy are in perfect health and spirits, and that the weather is not too hot. I went out on my questions until I have read some of your letters since I know all the information will be contained therein. Little of note going on around here at present, but the rest of the various Companies are now taking basic training, since we are not running the railroads at present. I don't have to go there any of that so don't concern yourself about me. I feel fine and dandy, but since I have too much routine work to attend to, none of the clerks get this training. My diet is going great guns. I can now manage to hand over to tie my laces. a couple of more
