This undercurrent (a clash of ideas and actions of individuals favoring certain organizations) is being combated but there is still room for a great deal of improvement.

The fraternities make definite contributions to our system of high education and they have definite values which should be conserved, but should not they improve their rushing strategy to an even greater extent around honor, sincerity, and fellowship (their most beneficial offerings) in order to raise their position even more as Keene Teachers College most influential extra-curricular organizations?

Last year we saw Rush Week begin with unneeded procedures and verbalizations that seemed to be a carry-over from previous years. To be indiscriminate with a person's group's ideals is unnecessary. If a person's mind cannot be liberal in his society's functioning, then there should be no room for him in the society he represents.

In rushing, students should not overlook the factor of spirit. The illustrious spirit which prevails contributes to success. It becomes the direct responsibility of the entire college to develop wholesome, ethical attitudes toward fraternity and rush procedures.
