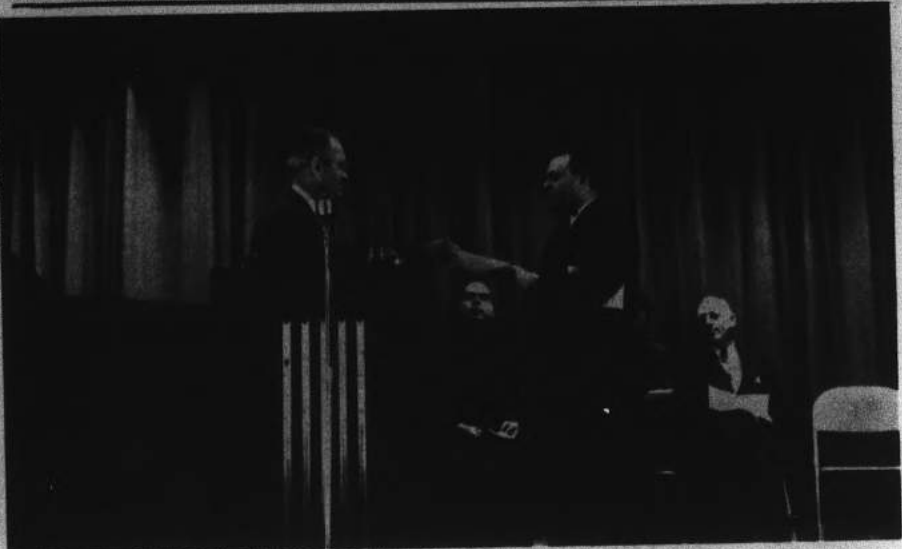

Bostate Beats Owls, 93-78

Faced by the fine two-way play of John "Beaver" Buckley, the Warriors of Boston State ran over the Owls of Keene State 93-71.

First half play was very slow as both teams looked a bit ragged passing and extremely off shooting. Both coaches, Sumner Joyce of Keene and Jim Loscutt of Boston, former Boston Celtic stringman, substituted freely after the first five minutes. With no particularly outstanding play from either team, the score stood 37-28 in favor of Boston at the half.

In the second half Boston ran up a big 20 point lead behind the outstanding play of Buckley, Freshman Steve Karll, and Charlie Hayes. For the remainder of the game the teams exchanged baskets, Keene unable to make up any of the earlier lost ground. Buckley, with a tremendous display of jump shots and driving layups had 29, while Karll with 16 and Hayes with 10 all contributed greatly to the win.

Playing a commendable game for Keene was junior Joe Giovannangeli who was high with 17 points.

Keene State Five Bows To JSC Indians, 124-101

The Keene State College Owls traveled to Johnson, Vt., Friday night for an 8 o'clock encounter with the Indians of Johnson State. Johnson won, 124-101.

Johnson, displaying fine ball control and amazing speed, jumped off to a quick 8-0 lead and never relinquished it.

With guards Woods and George stealing the ball constantly, Johnson scored almost unbelievably on a combination of fast breaks, jump shots and long set shots making it 64-48 at the half.

The second half ran the same pattern as the first as Johnson outscored Keene 60-53, hitting for a better than 70 per cent average from the floor.

Leading Johnson to the win were sophomores Mike Calevo with 45 points and Jack George with 27. For Keene it was junior Tim Brown with

32 points and senior Captain Jack Putney with 21 points who lead all scores.

With these revisions Dr. Zorn hopes to get more continuity to the schedule while allowing students the same vacation time.

College Space Rearranged

A few small changes have been made at Keene State over the long Christmas and New Years vacation.

The former Coke room of Monadnock Hall has been converted back into a normal dormitory room to permit two more male students to live in the dorm next semester, the house mother said. Five new vending machines have been set up in the Social Room of Monadnock and the telephone booth has been moved into the entrance hall.

In Hale building the long counter in the front office has been removed and a L-shaped counter has been put in front of the door. Mr. Pearson said that the change was made so that another secretary could work in the room. The new counter leaves more working space, he said.

The Campus Club has had a new section counter too. This has been built to hold cream, sugar, stirring sticks, mustard, ketchup, and relish. One of the waitresses also said that the Campus Club now has 145 new china cups and saucers for coffee.

Morrison Hall is to have a new coffee machine on the first floor and the pipes are already in but the machine hasn't arrived as yet. Mrs. Doris Stewart, the faculty secretary, said that it had been scheduled to arrive during the first week of vacation.

Speaker Policy

On Nov. 19, the Monadnock published an article which stated KSC's policy concerning non-college speakers. The policy was drawn up by the Keene State College Senate.

The College Senate decided that all future speakers would be cleared with the dean of men, if speakers were to speak to the entire student body. The dean of men will be guided in making his decisions by the University of New Hampshire's policy governing political activity.

The University of Washington has recently released a similar policy. Here is the policy as written by the Board of Regents and the reasons why the Board enacted the policy as reported by the Intercollegiate Press Association.

The University of Washington's Board of Regents has issued a statement concerning student invited non-university speakers.

The Board decided upon a policy which would allow students to invite speakers of their choice to the campus

William T. Bridgman, Keene Chief of Police, blames the news media for many of the problems that arise with modern youth.

"The students at KSC are basically a good group of kids. The only trouble they give us has to do with little sins we all commit," he said today.

West to East

Peace Corps Placement Test To Be Given

A Peace Corps Placement Test will be given at the Post Office Building in Claremont, on Saturday Jan. 29, at 8:30 a.m.

Approximately 800 other Civil Service testing centers throughout the United States will be administering the test on this same day, at 8:30 local time. It makes no difference where the Peace Corps applicants take their test and there is no need to register ahead of time.

Applicants should bring along a completed questionnaire unless one has already been sent in to Washington. The questionnaire forms are available at most post offices, from the college placement office, or they can be obtained by writing the Peace Corps, Washington, D. C. 20525.

There are two parts to the Peace Corps Placement Test: a general aptitude test and a modern language aptitude test—for which knowledge of a foreign language is not necessary. Applicants should figure on about one and a half hours at the testing center, unless they wish to take the Spanish or French achievement test. For this optional test, another hour should be added.

No passing or failing marks are given out, nor will the applicant ever learn their scores. The results are used, with the character references and questionnaires, to estimate the applicant's potential for completing the intensive training program and their ability to be effective Volunteers overseas.

Peace Corps applicants must be American citizens at least 18 years old. Married couples are eligible if they have no dependents under 18. A college degree is not necessary, but it is advantageous to complete college unless one has acquired a special skill. Many blue collar skills are now being requested by foreign countries.

Normal Raid

"Take what happened at Monadnock Hall in 1963," the chief continued. "It started as a patty raid on Fiske Hall—which was normal considering such raids had occurred at UNH and other colleges."

"The mass media, however, blew it up until it became a full scale riot." The newspapers made it seem as if the police were to blame for the affair," he said. "In this way they paved the way for hard feelings between the students and the police force. Under such conditions further 'newsworthy' problems are more likely to occur."

Bomb Scare

"The bomb scare at Monadnock Regional is another good illustration of the influence the mass media has on youth," Chief Bridgman said. "The first day one person called to tell us he planned to blow up the school. That night it was publicized. The next day we received 30 calls and the next day 50. All kids like attention and getting their names in the paper is one way of doing it."

Sees Decline

Bridgman believes America is experiencing a decline similar to that of Greece. A high economy is usually accompanied by moral decline, he commented.

"There is more juvenile delinquency today because there are more teenagers and social regulations aren't as strict as they were 50 years ago," he said. "In my opinion, the adults are responsible for much of this decline because they are the ones who should make and enforce these regulations."

Transfer Dislike

The police are too busy to be involved with personalities, he added. People who "hate cops" are simply transferring their dislike for restrictions to the person whose job it is to enforce them.

As Chief of Police, Bridgman has been responsible for handling many situations involving juveniles and for smoothing relationships between the college students and townspeople.

His own son, William Jr., was graduated from KSC in 1962.

Once KSC was green, with leaves and grass all around. With the coming of winter and snow all the greenery has been forgotten. Out of sight, out of mind.

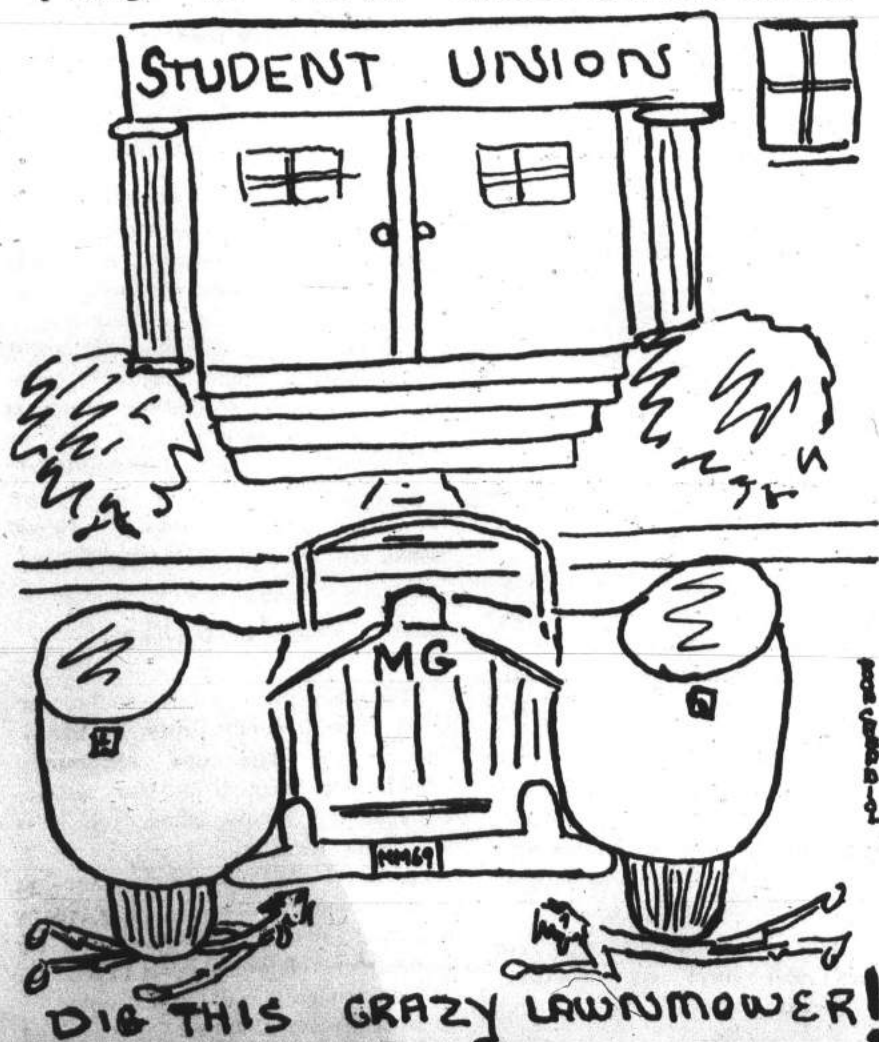
But the grass should not be out of mind.

So Who's Cheating?

Editor:

Having worked for the telephone company and wasted several years in the United States Army, I was aware that 67 per cent of the population is an assortment of thieves, liars and mountebanks; however, strangely enough, it never occurred to me that this might be true, to a small degree of course, in college, that the sins of the father infiltrate the sons (I thought all college students were honest and never cheated). Thus these first twelve weeks caught me with my guard down, exposing my naivete.

Shaken, I searched my high school memory for old cheating incidents. Sure enough, we cheated, promiscuously. But the college cheat has so much more expertise, although he is not as efficient a pirate as—say—the average real estate broker.

In the spectrum of human endeavor and accomplishment, college is a bridge between amateurish, guilt-ridden high school cheats and highly organized cutthroat robber barons.

In our society today stealing from insurance companies, the government, grieving widows, large corporations, business competitors, Las Vegas, Negroes and the American Housewife is accepted. But it is unethical to burn churches (except in the South), mug persons over 80, burglarize neighbors and hunchback on the Jersey Turnpike.

Also, if someone is getting beaten, raped or murdered don't get involved, mind your own business. With standards like these to emulate, it's no revelation that college students have no scruples about cheating in school.

After careful observation of cheaters in Keene State College I have categorized, given pseudo-Latin names to, and made brief resumes of the various types.

Number one: the Didus Ineptus. He is a potential "F" or "D" student, so for him cheating is a necessary tool for survival. 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Win One-Month Free Trip First Prize As UN Essay

First prize of a month-long, all-expense paid trip to Europe, including a special summer-school session about the United Nations in Geneva, will be awarded to the winner of a college essay-writing contest sponsored by the Collegiate Council for the United Nations. CCUN is basing the contest on the first of a series of 90-minute television entertainment programs about the UN that are being developed by Telsun Foundation, Inc.

The contest is designed to inspire better understanding of the UN by stimulating greater interest about the world organization among college students throughout the United States. That is also the primary purpose of CCUN.

Undergraduate students enrolled in any accredited college or university are invited to submit entries. They must compose an essay of 3,500 words or less after watching "Carol for Another Christmas," the TV program which was televised on the ABC network on Monday evening, Dec. 28, at 9:30 (EST). Peter Sellers headed an all-star cast in the gripping, dramatic story about the need for all men to become involved in today's world. Xerox Corporation is providing \$4,000,000 to underwrite the series of special TV programs.

While preliminary winners will be judged regionally, the top five finalists will be selected by a blue ribbon panel of national judges. The panel will include:

Clark M. Eichelberger, vice president, United Nations Association; author John Gunther; Arthur Larson, director, World Rule of Law Center at Duke University; Henry Cabot Lodge, until recently U. S. Ambassador to South Vietnam and former U. S. representative at the United Nations, and Ambassador Marietta Tree, U. S.

Mission to the UN.

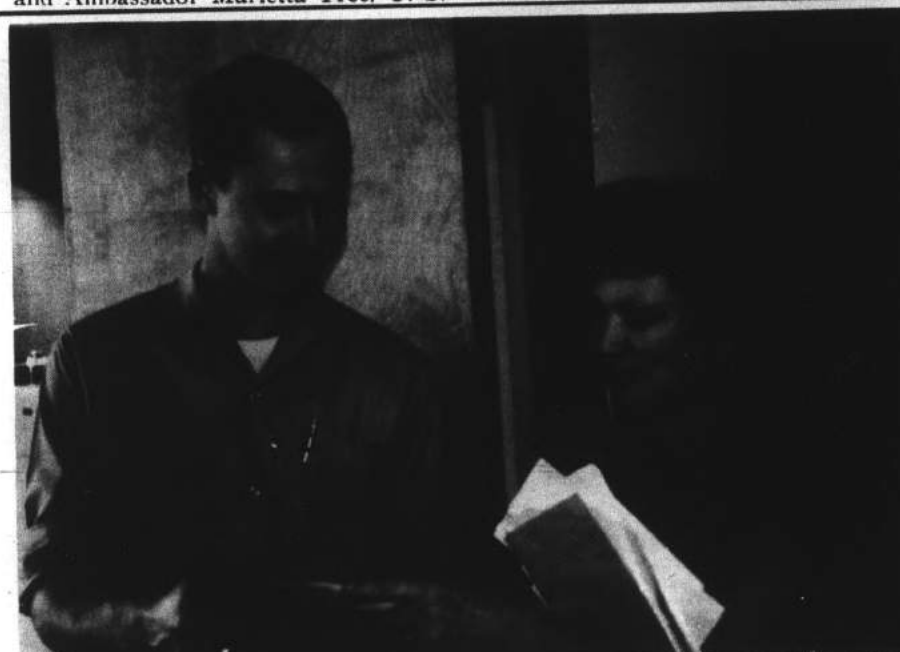
Each essay must concentrate on the same theme on which writer Rod Serling based his script for "Carol for Another Christmas"—the idea that today, more than ever before, no man can live as an island. From this, each student may point his essay in whatever direction his intellect and fancy may take him.

The grand prize winner will be flown from his home anywhere in the U. S. to Europe. Upon completion of the summer-school session at Geneva, co-sponsored by the World Federation of United Nations Associations and the International Student Movement for the UN, the student will be provided with the necessary funds for several weeks' travel in Europe.

Second prize is an expense-paid trip to New York to attend intensive briefings about the UN at a special summer session. The third prize winner will receive a trip to San Francisco in June to take part in the 20th anniversary celebration of the signing of the UN Charter. Fourth and fifth prizes are complete 24-volume sets of the Encyclopedia Britannica, 1964 Edition, while 12 regional winners will receive two-volume sets of the Britannica World Language Dictionary.

Preliminary judging of all essays are to be conducted regionally by a board comprising the CCUN regional director, appropriate faculty members and representatives of the United Nations Association of the U. S. The top five essays from each region will then be forwarded to CCUN headquarters for judging by the national blue ribbon panel.

All students intending to enter the contest must notify the CCUN, at 345 E. 46th Street, New York City, no later than Jan. 15. They will then be mailed complete rules and details.

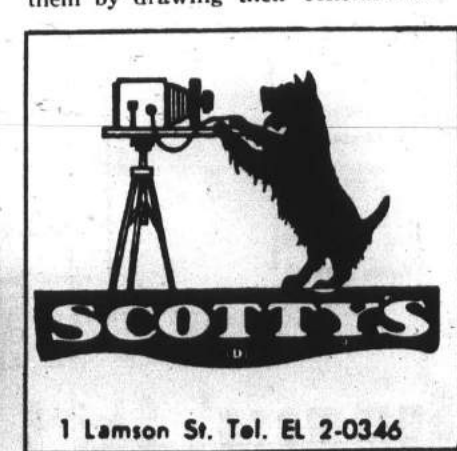

The Keene State College Journalism class toured the Keene Evening Sentinel building Wednesday to see the actual operation of a newspaper.

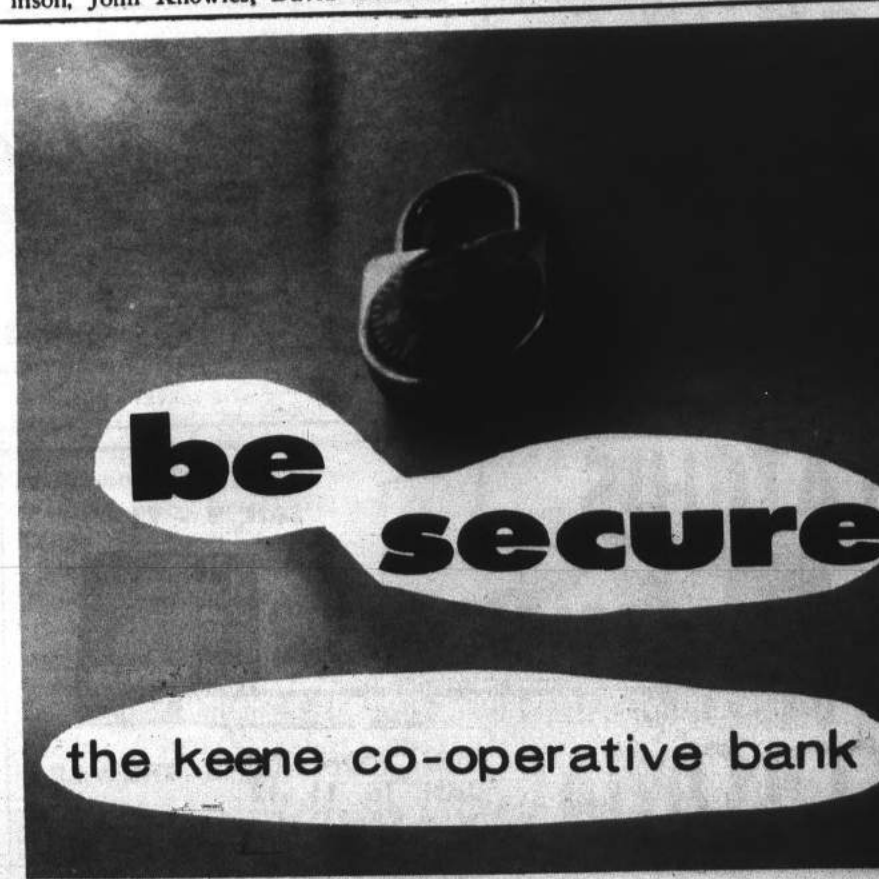
Class members met at the Sentinel at 8 a.m. and were guided through the various departments by Kenneth F. Zwicker, assistant publisher of the paper.

At the outset of the second half, Keene, paced by 10 quick points by Kern Claffin, grabbed off a quick 6 point lead which it never relinquished until just under the two minute mark of the final period.

Outstanding for the Owls in this heart breaking loss were Claffin with 19, Joe Giovannangeli with 16, and Tim Brown with 16.

Wild Life Film Will Be Shown Here Tonight

William Jahoda, professor of Biology at Willimantic State College, will speak at the Spaulding Gymnasium Friday, February 5 at 8:00 p.m.

Jahoda is being sponsored by the KSC Biology Club, as the 4th in a series of National Audubon Lecturers. Graduated with a B.S. in forestry from UNH, Jahoda's plans for graduate study were temporarily interrupted by World War II, while he served as a pilot in the Army Air Corps.

Later he earned a Master of Science degree in Zoology and then a Ph.D. in Hydrobiology at the Ohio State University.

Dr. Jahoda has served as Chief of Information and Education for the Connecticut State Board of Fisheries and Game. As a wild life photographer, he has had numerous photographs and illustrated articles published, and has produced several educational natural history films.

Dr. Jahoda's film, Nature's Ways, which was produced by him is certain to arouse a keener interest in our near horizons, so that we may better understand, interpret, and appreciate what we behold just beyond our doorsteps.

More than 125 animals appear on the screen in the film and we will be able to investigate the various forms of life to be found in four different habitats — dry land, fresh water marshes, seashore, and finally the sea itself.

Through the seasons we follow the pangs of animal activity, as creatures from microscopic protozoa to big game animals interact in their natural environment, struggling for survival, preying and falling prey, in the fantastic design of life.

Students are reminded that admission to the Audubon lectures are free and tickets may be obtained at the door Friday evening.

Judiciary Board Given Outline To Zorn By Student Council

The Student Council last week submitted a proposed outline of the Judiciary Board to Roman J. Zorn.

If approved, the Judiciary Board shall be composed of six justices and one chief justice, five will be student members and two will be faculty or administrative members. This arrangement will be in effect if the offense is of a non-academic nature.

Should the offense be academic in nature, the set-up would be reversed and the board would consist of five faculty and two student members.

Academic offenses include cheating and plagiarism.

The Judiciary Board would have jurisdiction over the following:

1. Determining the constitutionality of all Student Body legislation, when the offense is of a non-academic nature.
2. Interpreting the Student Body Constitution, by-laws, statutes, and policies passed by the Student Council.
3. Supervising elected and appointed Student Body personnel.
4. Administering school rules and regulations affecting individual stu-

dents and groups when the offense is of a non-academic nature.

5. Considering all individual and group violations of regulations.

6. Imposing penalties which the Student Body Judiciary is authorized to determine, or when necessary to recommend appropriate disciplinary action to the school administration.

Exceptions to the jurisdictional authority will be considered only when the individual submits a written request that his case be considered by an authority other than the Judiciary Board.

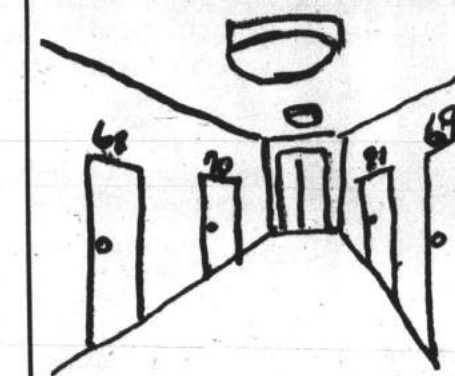

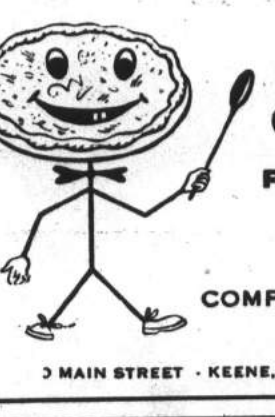
