Biographical Sketch

Ethel L. Heins was born in New York City and worked as a librarian for many years; at the New York Public Library from 1938-1943; at the Boston Public Library from 1955-1962 and in the Lexington Public schools between 1962-1974. She was editor of Horn Book Magazine from 1974-1984, co-founder and board member of Children's Literature of New England from 1968-1971 and adjunct professor at the Center for the Study of Children's Literature, Simmons College, MA.

Scope and Content Note

The collection consists of a draft, a computer printout and first galley for "The Quartet". This story is one of twelve fables included in her book *The Cat and the Cook and Other Fables of Krylov*, published in 1995. Ethel Heins was a speaker at the Keene State College Children's Literature Festival.
