No news received from you since Saturday and I trust you are in good health. Jimmie and I are fine and in good spirits.

Yesterday was quite a busy day for baby and me. After his nap, we visited the doctor who gave a good report on our son. The little one is now 22 lbs. and 31" tall - he's thinner and taller than the average 15 monther. Dr. says he's fine and also gave him the stick test. It was then that baby knew where he was and let go with a fit of crying but later on the doctor played with him and all was forgiven. I was given a mimeographed chart on the "15 monther" and Jimmie bled up to every chapter plus a few extras of his own. Then we drove to Florence Brown and paid her a short visit. She's well, baby had a cold last week and Sam was transferred to Boston. Jim wasn't still for a moment and I had more eyes - we're running after him and keeping him away from - all the antiques than I usually have in our own home. He's as quick as lightning and managed to break our butter dish cover only last night. But I put it together again with glue and now it'll probably last another six years.

Arriving home, I left Baby with the walker while I put the car in the garage. He behaved like a gentleman and I understand little Tony tried to use commando tactics on him but her Aunt Esther rescued our little one from that female. Then for a good supper plus a cookie and baby was ready for bed. He's not really completely happy unless he puts the bedroom lights on and off at least one or two times so I have the job of moving his crib toward the center of the room almost every day. What a darling rascal we have, Daddy.

This morning I finally sent your package off and among other things I packed in 1 pair of rope sandals size 8 - toe-nail clips, a tweezer, the 1942 Roster and Yearbook. If the sandals don't fit, I can get the next size which is 9. (Sears Roebuck). Hope you get parcel real soon and in good condition.

Spoke to Mrs. Pincus and the folks to-day - they too haven't heard from you. I hope you got my letter of last week plus the \$10 bill.

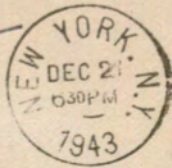
