

Camp of 11th Regiment
3 miles north of London ^{River}
September 21st

Dear Parents:

I received on our
arrival here Mary's ^{& Anna's} letters of Sept. 8th
I wrote you a letter last Sunday saying
I sent you two letters the week before
one containing \$2 sent to Mary the
other containing \$5.00.

We left Crab Orchard last Wednesday
morning and marched three miles
beyond Mt Vernon a distance of 13 miles
the last half of the day's march was of the
over the worst roads I ever saw it
has not been repaired since the war
began and contending armies with
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our baggage & supply train through
The country through which we passed
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The country through which we passed for the last 20 miles was the most like the northern part of NH. I have

yet seen out this way, it is all hills
and valleys as rocky and rough as
Hillsboro. Thursday we marched
10 miles further over a worse road
if anything camping just over
Wild Cat Mountain where Gen.
Scholf defeated the rebel Gen.
Lollicoffer we passed over the battle
field. Friday we went 8 miles and
camping here. This is a sort of
a military post or at least a
military post is soon to be
made here; we are here as guard
Burnside gets ^{port} most of his supplies
by this route immense trains of
mule white topped waggon are
continually passing down toward
Genn. Some trains contain 100
or 150 waggon taking hours to pass.
Yesterday a drove of 14,500 beef oxen
and steers passed down. Yesterday
and to-day as many as 2000 horses
which are ~~are~~ to be used for regiments
of Infantry called Mounted Infantry.

I did not finish my letter last night

it came, written the 11th mailed the 15th

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the 2200 Rebel prisoners which Burnside
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Regt and one Va. Regt. with the men belonging
belonging to a Geo. Battery these were tramp-
ing on foot escorted by a strong guard of
the 129th Ohio Infantry with several sections
of cavalry. They looked pretty much like
the rebel prisoners I saw in Jackson a
great many of them, bear foot ~~many~~
all dressed in their dirty gray ^{not uniforms} suits. They
were generally tough looking fellows and
seemed quite cheerful. We had a great
deal of fun joking with them they laughed
when a part of the Geo Regt were in the
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dirty looking hats pulled well down over the face as if to conceal their chagrin at their own dirty ragged appearance, or their contempt for us their clothes were a little nearer decent than most of the others I noticed on their hands neatly fitting gloves and they seemed to wear a dignified air. I readily ^{imagined} ~~construed~~ them ~~as~~ the sons of rich and wealthy planters. There were several small boys I should judge not over 15 years of age. I did not see a knapsack in the crowd nor but two or three blankets the rest had old ragged quilt, ^{pieces of} ~~conco~~ old shells and every ^{thing} of the kind you could think of. For hoversocks they used old bags made of every variety of cloth or old canvas in all imaginable shapes.
