Haverhill 9<sup>th</sup> Feby 1760

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Since I was appointed to wait on  
you I received a Letter from General  
Green by which I am desired to attend  
the Quarters business in this District  
which Business requires the closest  
attention untill march, Maj<sup>r</sup> Hale will  
bear this as well as the Committee  
Letter, I wish I had Time and a Capacity  
to represent our affairs in a proper list  
this I can say the People for our  
Wills are exceedingly alarmed, and that  
I think for good reasons, Torps from  
Canada has about one month ago been  
with the Tory at Clarrmont Brook, letters  
which inform their Friends of great  
Preparations for a descent on this River  
this Winter the Tory are lively and about  
Ten Days since stole the Town Stocks of  
ammunition from Hartford, the People  
at our loss I am afraid will more of be  
we have raised one thousand and twenty  
men and placed them near Halfway to  
Canada and the Lake to make discovery  
we suspect the Enemy either this Moon  
or the next so that if you should think  
best I send men to our assistance they  
will not be wanted after the first of April  
but the sooner they are sent the better

Ten Days Since Stole the Town Stark of ammunition from Hartford, the People at uper Coos I am afraid will move of by we have Raised one Hundred and twenty Men and Placed them near Halfway to Canada and the Lake to make Discovery we Expect the Enemy Either this Moon or the next So that if you Should think Best to send men to our Assistance they will not be wanted after the first of april but the Sooner they are Send the Better
