KTC scored a single run in the first on a single, two passes and a fielder's choice. The Owls scored three times in the 6th with Al Niemela getting a clutch hit with the bases loaded. In the top of the 7th, a walk, stolen base, error and single by pitcher Willis temporarily tied the score.

Niemela tied the Willmantic attack with two hits, scored two runs, and batted in three runs. Catcher Niemela had two hits and batted home two tallies as the Owls suffered their second straight loss.

N.E.C. RALLIES TO
NIP KEENE 12-12

In a sloppily played game which consumed three hours, New England came from behind to score eight runs in the 8th inning to take out a 12-12 tie. Despite the slugging of first sacker Jim Bresnahan, who collected four singles, the Owls could not hold up either in the field or on the mound. KTC boasted an 11-5 lead going into the horrible 8th. Twelve men strode to the plate and eight of them scored. Starting hurler Joe Hall wilted and 2nd sacker Bob Davis had to come to the mound. A bad call at first hurt the Keene cause as the side could have been retired without losing the lead. This was easily the Owls' best hitting exhibition of the year. Seven regulars hit safely, being led by Bresnahan's four hits and three runs. Johnny Foster had three hits and Dick Labnon got two hits and batted in three runs for the winners. It was the third straight setback for the undermanned Teachers.

FITZBURGH ROLLS OVER
OWLS 7-2

Behind the sparkling five hit hurling of Ed Hill, Fitzburgh Teachers coasted to a 7-2 win over Keene. The locals now playing without the slugging Eddie Willis looked very feeble at the plate.

Fitzburgh raced to a 7-0 lead at the expense of Dan Metcalf who worked the first three frames. Only three of these runs were earned as the Keene defenses fell apart once again. Fitzburgh scored single runs in the 1st, 2nd and 4th, and more in the 5th. These were tallied off Metcalf on five hits, five passes, and three costly errors. Joe Hall, who worked the last four innings, showed his best form of the year in blanking the visitors.

KTC scored its two runs in the 6th on two hits, three passes, and two throwing errors. The Owls had several chances to score but left ten men stranded. This inability to get the clutch base hit has muffed their offense all season.

Marty Pollock rammed out three hits for the winners and Nap Bennett secured two for the losers. This is certainly one of the saddest starts that any baseball team has had. Just getting enough men to field a team has proven a problem in itself. It is hoped that with break here and there the Owls will come alive.

Mass sentiment and energy is a necessity for any movement.

The Monadnock is always open to the expression of any side of an issue, either through the writing of an article or through a letter to the editor. Social Committee meetings always convene with doors open to any visitors and welcome any suggestions which will help improve our social life. Other clubs also will gladly listen to new ideas. The most important organ of our expression is certainly the Student Council, the directive force of the whole student body. Their interest and sacrifices should spark the student body into activity — yet very few take the time or effort to attend the Student Council meetings or even to express their opinions to its members. The Student Council is the one body that can centralize the students' point of view and act on it. They can follow up student problems and take them through the proper channels to solution, but their success depends on your supporting, backing, and using wisely the privileges secured.

STRENGTH
Organizations are here for your service; the time to start using them is early in the year. Through cooperation and patience, benefits can be gained, but little can be accomplished if all are not united and clear in what they desire. We have one privilege from which all others stem — "the democratic process." Democracy loses all meaning when relegated to a mere word — Practice it.

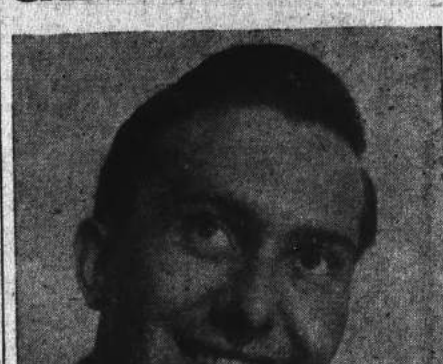

The statement prepared by the committee read as follows: "Because of the lack of interest among players, culminating in refusal to play certain games, the Athletic Committee has cancelled the remainder of the baseball schedule and will make no awards to members of the team."

Inability to field a team over the long Memorial week-end abruptly ended this 1952 Keene schedule. Coach Joyce had been forced to get by with about ten men all season and most of these planned to leave campus for the week-end. Spirit had definitely been at a low ebb all during the season. The committee's decision seems fair enough but it does deprive a few players of well earned letters.

OWLS DRUBBED BY GORHAM

Unleashing a 16-hit assault on Joe Hall, Gorham Teachers waltzed to a 15-6 decision over the winless KTC nine. These 16 hits were good for 27 total bases, a tribute to the slugging prowess of the Gorham club.

Gorham ran up a 5-0 lead in the first two innings only to have the Owls bounce back with four runs in the top of the third. Gorham then went back to work and ran up a 15-4 lead. Keene then staged a futile two run outburst in the ninth.

Page of Gorham proved to be the game's big stick with four for four, including a pair of doubles and three runs batted in. Cliff Hall, Gorham hurler, aided his own cause with a triple and a single. Darling also well remembered for his basketball ability, slammed out two hits and batted in three runs. For Keene, Eddie Main collected three of the club's seven hits, two of these being doubles.
