

ACTIVITY FEE?

Last June the student body voted to approve the activity fee allocation as submitted by the Student Council. This money was allocated on the basis of an enrollment of 450 students. This year though, the enrollment has suffered a little setback. The 525 of last year has been reduced to 431 this year. Therefore the activity fee must be re-allocated and shaved \$351.50 in the process.

The logical place to cut this amount is item VIII of the Activity Fee Budget; that is Clubs and Organizations, which had been allotted \$730. This is the logical place to cut because it is here that the money is being ill-spent and even wasted.

The ten or fifteen dollars allotted to some clubs is of little or no value to the success of the clubs' socials. Nine times out of ten this money is spent for refreshments. And the refreshments don't help the socials. It certainly doesn't attract students to the clubs' activities. Besides, the students go up street to eat afterwards. So it can't be too filling. The clubs which spent the money allotted them in this manner should have their allocations reduced to nothing. This includes Huntress and Fiske, the Canterbury Club, the Keene and Manchester Clubs, Sigma Pi Epsilon, the Women's Athletic Association, and the Women's Service Club. Cutting the allotments of these clubs would eliminate \$125. Add to this \$30 from Nu Beta, \$10 from the Elementary Club, \$10 from the Newman Club, \$10 from the Student Christian Association, \$40 from the Outing Club, \$20 from Kappa Delta Pi, \$40 from FTA, and \$20 from the International Relations Club. This, plus \$50 from the Assemblies' budget, brings the total to \$355.00 to be cut. Eliminate these useless expenditures and maybe, only maybe, there will be wiser spending of the little money we have.

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Owls Split, Win Over Rhode Island Defeated by New Bedford Textile

NEW BEDFORD TRIPS OWLS ON LAST PERIOD SURGE

Continuing to show their ability to come from behind, the KTC soccer team nevertheless was handed its first defeat of the season, 5-3, by a fine New Bedford Textile outfit. Trailing 3-0 going into the second half, the never-say-die Joyemen rammed home three goals to tie up the contest, only to have the visitors boot in two quick scores and take home the victory. This exciting, high-scoring tussle was featured by some amazing saves by goalie Russ McLaughlin, as New Bedford swept in time and again only to be thwarted by McLaughlin's brilliant work.

After a slow, scoreless, first period, the Textile lads flashed their offensive power to get three goals in quick succession to take a commanding lead by half-time. But demonstrating their spirit and fight that was prevalent in their opener, the Owls came roaring back to finally even the score on a long drive into the nets by Gordon Durnford. Before this early fourth quarter tally, Keene's scoring was done by Phil Hyde and Morgan Wright in the previous canto.

But, alas, this tie was short-lived, as New Bedford surged back to pour in two quick goals and end this well played game. Plenty of thrilling moments occurred in this encounter, which evened the record of the Joyemen at one win and one loss. Nick Kontinos, injured in the first game, made an appearance and re-injured his nose.

BENOIT'S THREE GOALS PACE WIN OVER R.I.C.E.

Nap Benoit displayed his prowess at scoring, as the Owl soccer squad journeyed to Providence to play Rhode Island College of Education and came home with an easy 4-1 victory. Opening up early, Benoit started his "hat trick" shortly after the opening kick-off, as he scored once in the initial canto and twice in the second. After that spree, the Joyemen were well on their way to their second win of the young season.

Although it was a loosely played contest throughout, the Owls showed flashes of brilliant passing and completely outclassed the hapless R.I.C.E. crew. Starting with Benoit's potency the Owls had a cozy 3-0 lead at half-time. Nap's tallies came on two kicks from close in

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College Qualifications Tests for Draft Deferment Now Available

All students who are eligible to take the College Qualification Test for deferment from the armed forces are asked to file their applications as quickly as possible. Applications are now available at the local Selective Service boards throughout the country. Also, available are bulletins containing information which pertains to the examination.

Following the instructions in the bulletin, each student should fill out his application and mail it immediately in the envelope provided.

The examinations will be given on December 13, 1951, and again on April 24, 1952. Applications for the December 13 test must be postmarked no later than midnight, November 5, 1951.

According to the Educational Testing Service, which prepares and administers the College Qualification Test for the Selective Service System, it will be greatly to the student's advantage to file his application at once, regardless of the testing date he selects. The results will be reported to the student's Selective Service local board of jurisdiction for use in considering his deferment.

This same type of Qualification test was given last spring to many college students, and results proved to be quite successful.

For further details, the local Selective Service board should be consulted.

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Teacher Training

These will be awarded with or without teacher certification. The B.A. will entail a minimum of 18 credits in one language or 20 credits in two, with high school language being accredited four credits for one year.

The B.S. will not require any foreign language. Both, for the present, will require 132 credits, which is the same as Bachelor of Education. The B.S. will require 17 elective credits while the B.A. will require no electives beyond the basic curriculum, the major, minor, and the foreign language.

The basic curriculum to be followed for both degrees includes six credits in the humanities (English and history), 10 credits for social studies, 8 to 10 credits for science, and 21 credits in special requirements. The latter would include freshman English, six credits; fundamentals of speech, two credits; physical education, four credits; physiology and hygiene, two credits; art aesthetics, two credits; music aesthetics, two credits; and general psychology, three credits.

Departmental majors of 30-40 credits and minors of 15-22 credits or larger interdepartmental majors would be required for both degrees, according to the recommendations of the college curriculum committee. Secondary education majors will be allowed majors or sequences since they have two academic minors besides their major. The departmental major of more than 40 credits will not go into effect until it has been reviewed further by the committee.

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U. of Houston Gives New Courses to Fresh

Houston, Tex. (I.P.)—Three new

courses have been made mandatory for most incoming freshmen this year at the University of Houston. The courses are communication arts, replacing freshman English, a course in biological or life science, and a social science course. Designed to teach students to express themselves in all forms of communication, the communication arts course will embrace reading, writing, speaking, and listening, and will require one lecture and three seminar periods a week. The course, although listed as English to facilitate the transfer of credits, will contain no literature, but will be pointed toward the development of skill in communication. To this end, such devices as Harvard Reading Films, which have been known to increase a student's reading rate from 80 to more than 600 words a minute, will be employed.

The social science course is planned to integrate material relative to the science of government with the history of the United States, so that a student will better understand the machinery and background of the government. Commenting on the addition of these new courses, Dr. Terrell Spencer, vice president in charge of student affairs, said, "We feel that the first two years of college study have become too specialized and that students should be given an opportunity to investigate those things in his environment that satisfy the myriad questions a young person always has and to learn the proper exchange of ideas."
