Oct 13th 1863

Dear Brother & Sister:

Your welcome letters of Sept 5th (went Oct 5th Breckon) and Oct- came to hand last night. We have had no mail for nearly 10 days until last night, and I had been thinking every day I must write to you but did not get at it. Now I will write you this and send to-day which you will please send to Hillsboro. I have not heard from H. direct and don't know whether I shall get my shirts H. by the Gurlough men or not, expect they are between Cincinnati and this place and will be in camp in a day or two. I shall write home when Feltz Cogswell gets back to the Regt. I would not trouble you to send this to H. but I put on my last stamp and shall have to borrow my time Stamp

Your welcome letters of Sept 5 (ment Oct 5th I reckon) and Oct- came to hand last night.
