Exhibits

In the past few weeks we have had many exhibits displayed in our library, classrooms, and also at Wheelock School. Students and teachers take time out of their busy schedule to play and set up these exhibits. Yet, how many of us stop to look at them? We hastily glance at them as we pass by.

Well, classmates, if you are gully of this, you don't know how much you are missing. Especially interesting were the last two exhibits, which I have been given the pleasure to write on: Miss Prags's exhibit of her trip to Hawaii this summer and the exhibit at Wheelock School presented by Mrs. Hudson's Children's Literature Class.

As we can see by Miss Prags's exhibit, her trip to Hawaii was not only interesting but exciting. The articles in the case show much about the customs of the Hawaiians.

The articles displayed in the case include an Hawaiian dress of Polynesian design which is worn to visit families and also to feasts. It is interesting to note that the dress is made of grass skirts, and the stems make the belt. These skirts last three to four weeks and are worn by the Hawaiians with blouses made of cotton or satin.

Also in the case we find the coconuts, common to the island, both eaten by the Hawaiian people, and also used as beads which the women and girls wear. Shell earrings are an example of the many things Hawaiians make out of shell. Among other things we find the Liu, which we always associate with the Hawaiians. Most interesting is the woodrose corsage made of the natural flowers which are everlasting. To complete the display in the case we find two Hawaiian bowls. Displayed to the side of the case were colorful menu cards, pictures and paintings. These are original paintings from the Smithsonian Institute showing the history of the Hawaiians. We also find photographs of Miss Prags as she travelled from island to island. Anyone missing this exhibit might like to read about Hawaii in the November issue of the Saturday Evening Post.

The second exhibit was put on at the Wheelock School. It was entitled "Good Books Make Good Gifts." The exhibit was set up according to price, subject, and age level. It was displayed mainly for the P.T.A. to help them buy books of interest for their children.

Last year the quota was set at 120 plints and was reached. The Red Cross is concentrating on blood for Polio victims because of the Korean war being over. However, there are still wounded soldiers in our hospitals that need blood.

A physical will be given to all who desire to give blood and the only other requirement is that you fill out a pledge card and have it signed by a parent if you are under 21. Those giving blood will be excused from classes missed on that day. There will be a representative from Alpha Phi Omega or the Women's Service Club in each house and dormitory to ask you to sign a pledge card and have the necessary papers signed by your parents before vacation. It is hoped that we can get 100% of all eligible people to donate, so let's get behind it and push it as much as possible. There is nothing to be afraid of in donating blood; if there are any questions ask any member of A.P.O. or other persons who have given blood before. Co-chairmen on this committee are David Staples and Ken Hewitt. Remember—Give a pint—help a half-pint—grow into a ten gallon hat.

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
