On board Steamship "44"
bound for Baltimore Mar 27th 1864

Dear Friends

I wrote you yesterday
saying we were to bid good bye
to Newport News & we did last
night just at dark. We are now
two thirds of the way to Baltimore
This is a big steamship the whole
of our Reg. & parts of the 88 Mass.
& 51st N.Y. are on this vessel. The
upper & lower decks are as full as
they can stand. Last night was
rather a rough night for us not a
space a foot square was left. but a
complete sea of grow blankets &
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Baltimore Md. Mar. 28th 1848

We arrived here last night at about 10 o'clock. I slept on the upper deck had the stars & a char. sky for a shelter was woke up quite suddenly this morning by the rain pattering in my face it is now raining in torrents (10' Ad.) Baltimore peddlers are thick as bees in a clover field. but I have had a good breakfast of Erakom bread & butter & eat the tomato last night. I guess I have got enough to last till I get to Kentucky. This box will do me a good deal of good for it has come when there was nothing else but hard tack & salt horse. Baltimore is a nice city to what I have seen in slave. It seems as though we had got into civilization again. to see back &

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war lasts long enough.

4 P.M. Have just got on board the
train. We marched through two
the streets of Baltimore for about two
miles. We thought it quite a nice city.
We found a few flags to cheer.

Sunday Mar. 29th did not get much
sleep last night we were rattled
along the Penn. R.R. most too fast
for us to get much sleep. We are in
baggage cars & they wiggle & jar a
good deal. We have just finished
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about 4 this morning. We have passed through a splendid country quite hilly but looks like good land. I see some nice fields of winter wheat. The buildings are very good all through the state and there are splendid residences. We find the people very patriotic all along the route. The stars & stripes is all that will bring out a cheer from us & if it is waved by a pretty girl, we give the flag some cheering cheers. The dogs & roosters in this state are patriotic. When the ladies are waving handkerchiefs from the windows the dogs are wagging their tails & the roosters crowing. The hogs are "screesh" don't mind us. We are now running along the bank of the Susquehanna. Mar. 30th.

We arrived at Altoona at about 4 o'clock. The people were just coming from church. This is a splendid place it is all new the streets regular & the houses elegant. They had a lot of nice coffee here with a sugar in it furnished by the patriotic citizens. We also got some coffee at York Pearson at 11. Last night we left A. at 4 & rode over the Allegheny Mts. It was a wonderful work building that took over the Mts. three engines were put on at A. two forward one behind in this manner we were shoved up a gradual rise of land for several miles taking quite a crooked course.

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
