This battle flag was presented by Co. I to their Lt. Green at Covington, Ky., in 1863, on his enforced return home from their ranks because of disability, in 1863. Later he died, and last year Mrs. Green felt the colors should be treasured by his old comrades, and gave them back for safe keeping. Usually, they adorn the walls of the Keene (N. H.) G. A. R.
