If we had the money, I suppose; in fact I'm sure, we would not be home now knocking our heads against the wall doing nothing, but after going out once we find there is nothing left to do anything with. The whole trouble is that the more you go out the more you want to go out. I know the answer to that one; but one must do something from going batty. I really wish the boss would come through; but then again we are not worrying about that too much. They will come through in due time, I hope.

We really had some crazy weather today, for a while I thought we were going to have another snow storm; but it managed to pass us somehow. His car is getting older and we must conserve it as much as possible if we expect to make N.Y. and back without too much trouble.

At any rate we have managed to see a good part of the neighboring towns. There is no question about the South being poor; but I don't think that Pa. is any better in that respect. This is definitely a poor town town. The people actually are just living from hand to mouth. Those that do work, and that is the small majority, make very little; and those that don't work find their only refuge in the very small allowance that this state allows. Believe it or not, we have had job seekers telling us that all the compensation they receive is 2.50 weekly. We have had this confirmed by a reliable source as the absolute truth; and it seems as though half the town is on relief.

Most of the houses look as though they weren't nice even when they were new; and I have yet to see a new house out here; so I guess you know what I mean. We have ridden throughout the entire town and have very forcefully felt the lack of paving over same.

So far every girl we have had the pleasure of meeting or of taking out, has elucidated to us quite vividly the lack of anything to do out here. This is positively the deadest town I thought was ever possible. The fact that we have different ideas in N.Y. must have a lot to do with it. The people here just don't know any better; you work all day, that is if you are lucky enough to have a job; then the usual thing done is to eat and go to bed. This just is not my idea of a well spent day. I guess you agree with me on that.; n'est \*\*\*- pas? (that did not come out so well, did it)

George, ISthink if I don't stop this balogna now I never will; so, after having written all this crap it would prabably be better if I just through it away; but it took me so long to write that even if it is a lot of crap I am going to send it any way.

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
