

Monday eve -
Jan. 15th / 1945

Dearest sweetheart,

The day was quite a busy one for me but bed-time is almost near and I'm quite thankful. Jimmie and I are fine and we were quite happy to get two letters from you this morning. One was a long letter dated Dec. 31st and the other part 2 of a V. mail letter dated Jan. 2nd. The latter is the most recent letter up to date and I'm glad you're well and that you got out to see a movie. Hope you enjoyed the picture show and the contents of the package from the Fellowship Club. The New Years letter was swell reading and I do hope you had an enjoyable evening at your new friends' home.

We've been having plenty of snow and very little sunshine this last week. Jim and I went out doors before lunch, did marketing for the dinner to-night and had everything prepared and in ship shape order by 5 o'clock. My sister Thelma came during the afternoon, after visiting Joe, and is as low in spirits as anyone can be at the moment. I'm sort of giving up trying to cheer her because she

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doesn't make the slightest attempt to be brave
or even pleasant. It's a pity that Thelma is so
immature and can't adjust her way of thinking after
so many tough breaks. She's sure one individualist
I cannot understand or ever hope to reason with.

Now for the more cheerful part of the day.
Gimmie helped me set the dinner table, made
sure to kiss your photo above the table and
then started to re-arrange the plates and silver.
Before we started on this, one of the neighbors,
Kent Johnson kidnapped him for half an hour to
have him play with her little girl. Then at 6 o'clock
Bob and Frances came here, both look well and
Jim saluted Uncle Bobby and gave Aunt Frances
a big hello. He was in his pajamas then and
started to show off and go through most of
his new routines and a few old ones. This lasted
for almost an hour and, being that he had no
afternoon nap, I surely thought he'd be
asleep by 7 o'clock. Finally, I gave him his
milk and he fell asleep by 7.30 p.m. Meanwhile
my sister Bess called from downtown, had just
come off the train and was anxious to know about

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the family and Joel. She came here in a short
time, Mom and Pop shortly after and then my
mom came to see the movies. We all had dinner
together and I hope it was enjoyable to everyone.
Here's what I served with Bess's much needed
help. Choice of Apple juice or Grapefruit juice
Chopped eggs, celery and macaroni
Lamb Chops and Steak on a large hot platter
Masked Potatoes, sliced Beets, String Beans
mixed Salad - Root Beer and Cream Soda
Canned fruit and Fresh Fruit

There was plenty of food and some left over for
the next day. When we were finished, our friend
Stan came with his usual cheery disposition and
the movie projector. He ran off all our films
to a very appreciative audience and need I add
how thrilled and joyous we all felt to see you
moving about and looking at us during those
precious moments. Jimmie is adorable in every
shot and when you return, we'll be off to
Hollywood with him. Or shall we just keep
this little star for ourselves? Seeing you on the
screen awake such a longing within me that I
did all in my power to control the unshed
tears that are hidden since November 17th 1943.

But I'll be brave ⁴ and patient until that
next meeting and try to be half as good a
medium as you, dearest one. Loving you is still
the most wonderful part of my existence
and then I'm ever so happy and thankful
for you and our precious Jimmie.

For the balance of the evening we sat in
the living room, ate fruit and candy and Bob
and Stan had much to talk about. There was
also a bit of kidding and Stan tried to con-
vince me of all the French dolls around in
France. We had tea and cake in the kitchen
and while at the table, Stan made some inquiry
about Jack or Maurice and Thelma was more
than anxious to give him the details. He made
some notations and will get in touch with me
as soon as he makes contacts. It's possible for
Maurice to come in - only for Thelma's sake her
future health - Jack's condition he cannot help.
I'll keep you posted on the developments.

Bob looks very well and Frances hasn't
changed too much. She does dress a little nicer
than she did and she's also heavier since she's
married. I had a short conversation with her
and she's quite worried about Bob going overseas soon.

Mom and Pop looked well but they were just
a wee bit tired - they arrived home quite late
on Sunday night from the affair they attended.
Pop, upon a hint from Bess, spoke to Thelma
alone in the bedroom and I do hope some of the
advice helped her. Everyone but Thelma and Bess
left with Dan at 10:30 p.m. Dan was kind
enough to drive the folks and my mom home. It
would have been most enjoyable had you been
with us but I guess we just can't have everything
we desire. Bess and Thelma stayed overnight
and here it is Tuesday morning already.

It snowed again all night long, Jim again
awake during the night and I guess he's just
growing up these days. We all slept until
8:45 a.m., had breakfast at 9 o'clock and
Thelma and Bess left for the hospital at 10:30.
Jill is very low and is sinking daily. Bess
has to leave tonight, she has a baby too, and will
be in again in a few days.

Jimmiel and I are well, miss you and
love you every moment. Stay well, darling,
and I'll write again tonight. All the love that's
in my heart and a hug and kiss from Jim to
our sweetest Dad and Sweetheart. Love
