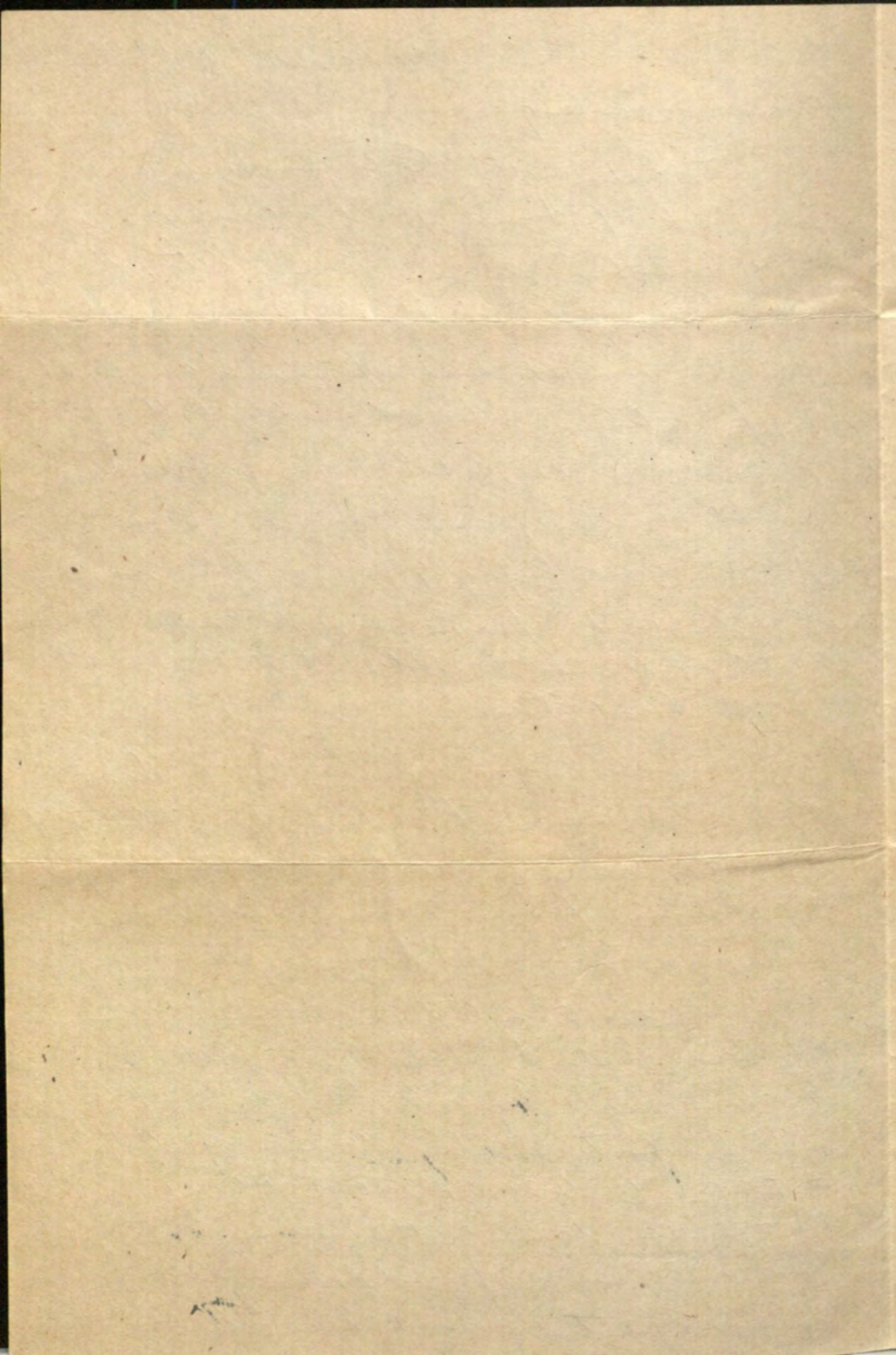


Monday Sept. 18, 1944.

suppose it will be here in due time.

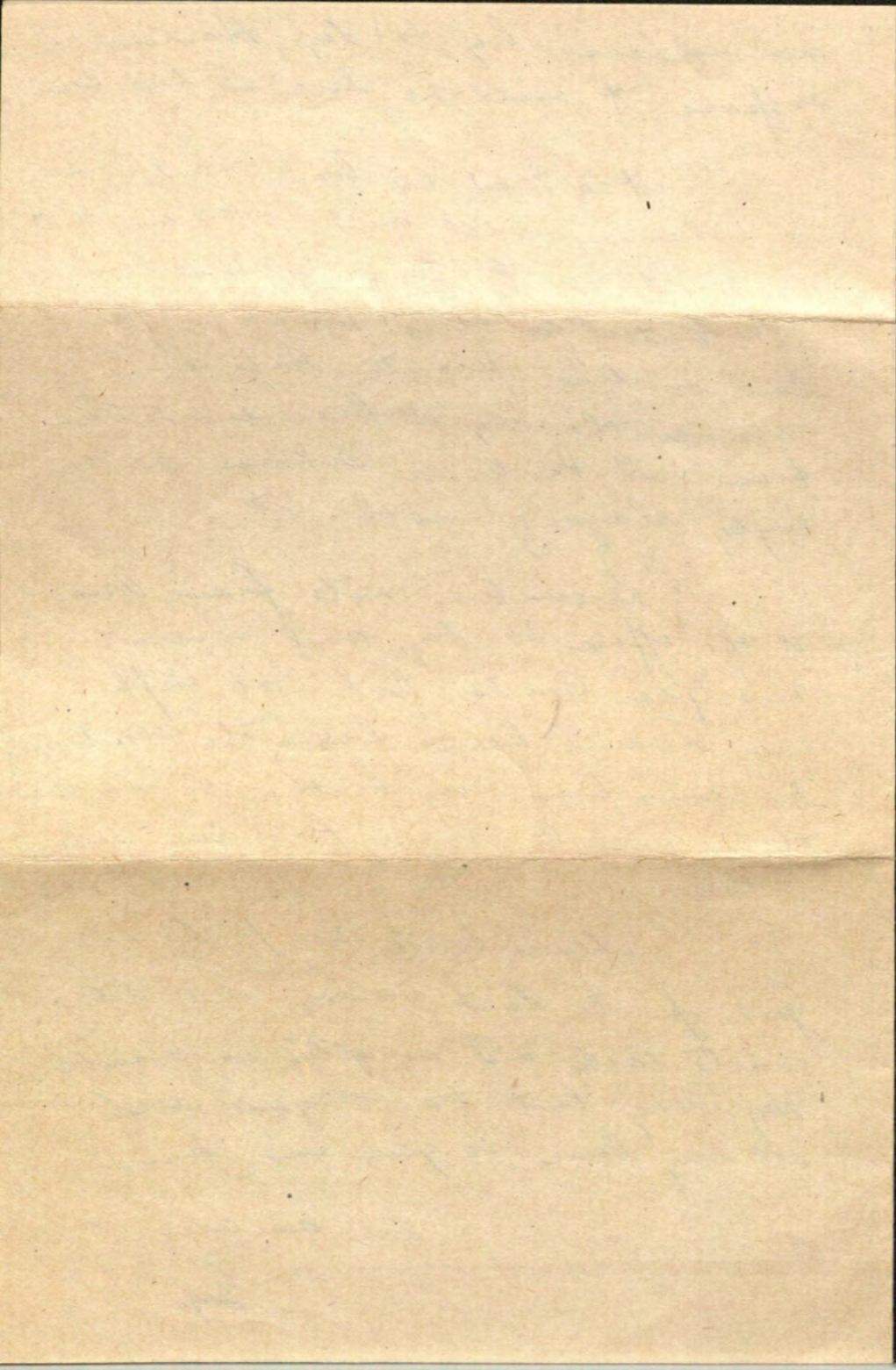
It is good to learn that Jim
