

Keene State's Varsity Scores Season's First Win

Keene State's varsity basketball team, aided by a sparkling effort by high-scoring Freshman Wally Markham and converted guard Tim Brown's clutch shooting, registered its first win of the young season Friday night, a 105-100 decision over Johnson State of Vermont.

Along with Markham and Brown, Jack Putney added scoring punch. This in combination with fine rebounding by big Pete Stevens was enough to offset Johnson's second half all-court press and to overcome a flashing individual performance by Johnson's Mike Coleviro who poured through 35 markers, winning high-point honors for the game.

In the first half, with about nine minutes gone, the Owls were ahead, 29-19, but then the Vermonters came alive on the strength of baskets by Coleviro and Frank McWilliams to close the gap to 33-29. With four minutes to go before halftime, Johnson held a 44-41 edge, but then Markham plunked one in, and driving Jack Putney tied it on a foul shot. Markham's two free throws were matched by a Coleviro lay-up and with the score 50-48, Johnson leading, Keene intercepted a pass and Wally Basoulas on a drive under the basket tied it once again, 50-50.

After the start of the second half, the tempo of the game speeded up and the lead itself changed hands a number of times, neither team being ahead by more than a basket at any time. With eleven minutes to go, Keene tied the score on Markham's tip-in, 70-70, and a few seconds later Brown threw in a jump to give the advantage back to the Owls. Dick Coppola increased it, 80-77 on a short jump but at this point Johnson went into its man-to-man defense. The Keene lead was increased to five on a Stevens basket and a Putney free throw, 89-84, but then Coleviro started pouring on the steam, hitting three in a row, bringing his team to within one point, 91-90, of the home five.

Two foul shots by Brown and a lay-up offset Steve Zitter's hook shot and then Floyd Murphy stole the ball for a driving lay-up, and

Aside from the Portsmouth parish, he has served at New York City's Community Church, in Laconia, and with the American Mission Aid to Greece.

ROCKEFELLER TO BE HERE

Last Year's Student, This Year's Teacher

Mr. George A. Regopoulos, mathematics teacher at Keene State, underwent serious abdominal surgery last Saturday.

According to Dean Sarnier's office, Mr. Regopoulos is "re-cooperating nicely."

It is hoped that he will again be teaching a full load by the third week of the second semester.

Dr. Sarnier said that Mr. Regopoulos is already "sitting up and is anxious to see his math students."

The hospital visiting hours are from 2 to 4 and from 7 to 8 p.m. Two persons at a time will be allowed to see the patient. Mr. Regopoulos is in room 219.

Col. Robert C. Brown, USAF Ret., will conduct Mr. Regopoulos' algebra, geometry, and trig classes during his absence.

The Colonel attended classes at Keene State last year. He is a resident of Peterborough where he, his wife Sally and their three young daughters live on an old

farm populated half the year, not by chickens and cows, but fugitives from the Broadway stage. Mrs. Brown owns and manages the Peterborough Players Professional Summer Theater.

At the start of World War II Col. Brown was commissioned an officer from the US Air Command College. He remained in the service until 3 years ago. He holds an AB from UCLA and, prior to the war attended two years of Fordham Law School.

The Browns met and were married during the war. Mrs. Brown was then Sally Stearns of the Red Cross. They honeymooned down the Nile like Cleopatra except instead of a barge they were trans-

ported in an airplane. About two years ago Col. Brown decided to become an educator. He had been a constant student during his service years and has completed courses at the University of Louisville, Michigan State, and the Harvard Summer School.

Last year, in addition to attending Keene State, he taught mathematics at Nathaniel Hawthorne College in Antrim.

His future plans are to do further graduate work toward a doctorate.

Col. Brown will conduct classes at Keene State until Mr. Regopoulos is able to return, probably a few weeks after the start of the second semester. At that time he will finish the remainder of the semester as an assistant to Mr. Regopoulos.

Governor of N.Y. Will Be Speaker Next Thursday

Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller will be the speaker at an all-college assembly to be held at 11:00 a.m. next Thursday in Spaulding Gym. The Governor is one of the two announced candidates for the Republican presidential nomination.

Mr. Rockefeller has served in government in Federal, State and local levels, and has been the Governor of New York since 1958.

His service in the federal government began in 1940, when he was appointed coordinator of inter-American affairs by President Roosevelt. He later became assistant secretary of state for American affairs, and in that post organized the Inter-American Conference on War and Peace in Mexico City, and participated in the founding of the UN in San Francisco in 1945.

President Eisenhower appointed him chairman of the President's advisory committee on Government Organization, where he served from 1952 until he became Governor of New York in 1958.

He has served as chairman of the Governor's Conference Committee on Civil Defense and Post-Attack recovery, and was a member of the Executive Committee of the conference in 1959-60.

The Governor was born in Bar Harbor, Me. on July 8, 1908, the third of six children. He graduated from Lincoln School in New York City, and in 1930 from Dartmouth College, where he majored in economics.

His marriage to Mary Todhunter Clark ended in divorce in March, 1952. He has since married the former Margaretta Fitter Murphy, and now resides in the Executive Mansion, Albany, and Pocantico Hills, near Tarrytown, N.Y.

KSC Barracks Sold For One Dollar To Salvager

Dr. Lloyd P. Young, Pres. disclosed that the physical facilities known as the barracks have been sold to a man named Lynch for one dollar. Mr. Lynch has agreed to rid the property of the barracks and level the grounds surrounding the old buildings by July 1, 1964. The college is in the process of signing the official contract to this effect, however, Mr. Lynch has received administrative permission to begin work immediately.

Dr. Young also stated that Mr. Lynch hopes to make a profit on the salvaged material.

The contract to be signed by Mr. Lynch has been O.K.'d by the Public Works office in Concord, the State Controllers Office also in Concord, and the Treasurer of UNH.

The land on which the barracks are situated has been leased from Mr. Laverne Bushnell since the acquisition of the Barracks from the Federal Govt. in 1946.

The barracks were given to the college by the Federal Government in 1947. The first contract for the housing facilities was made with

the pentagon in 1946 and the barracks, designed as housing for veterans after World War II, were moved from Bradley field in Mass. to Keene in 1947. This transaction was similar to the program offered to other colleges and Universities by the Federal Govt.

The deal was made with the understanding that the barracks would be removed as soon as there was no longer a need for them. An agreement to this effect was signed by the college with the city of Keene.

For the first few years the college used the money collected as rent, to pay back the Govt. for the cost of moving the housing facilities to Keene. Since this time the monies have been used in general maintenance of the barracks and the college in general.

Dr. Young said that the students who have resided in the barracks over the years deserve a good deal of credit. He stated that the threat of fire was always a problem with the wooden structures, and that due to careful use of Oil Heaters only one small fire occurred in the years of occupancy.

MARRIED STUDENTS OBTAIN NEW LEASE ON GOOD LIFE

KSC's latest housing development, the new married students dormitory on Hyde St., has now been completed and a number of students and their families have already established residence there.

The dormitory consists of thirty-two apartments, eight of which have two bedrooms, and the remaining having only one bedroom.

Each apartment has a kitchenette area, roughly 9' by 7' in size, furnished with an electrical Frigidaire refrigerator, a garbage disposal unit beneath a stainless steel sink, and numerous cupboards above and below the counter area.

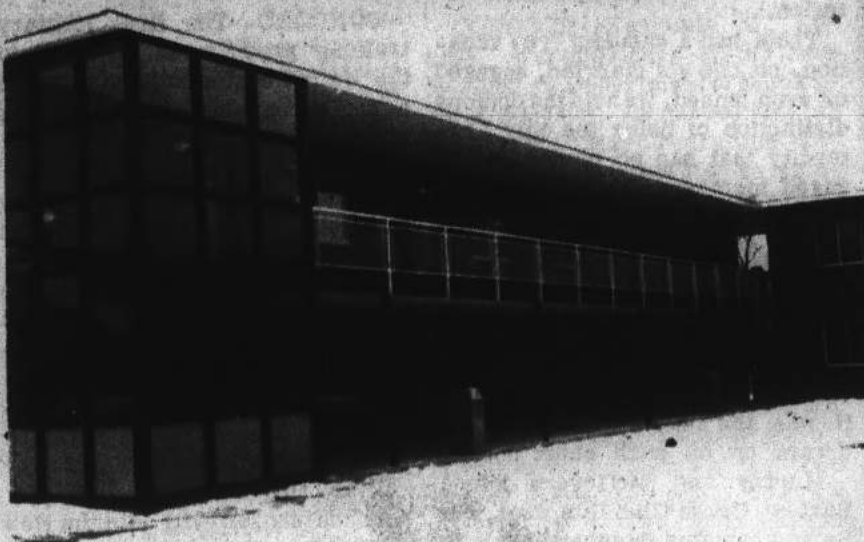
The livingroom is actually part of the same room as the kitchenette, yet considerably larger (14' by 12'), and is equipped with a TV cable outlet, a telephone outlet, and a 1/2' by 2' ceiling-height closet with sliding metal doors.

The bedroom, 9' by 14', has a 6' by 2' ceiling-height closet and a 4' by 4' window.

The bathroom is 8' by 56" in size, including the shower-tub area. One popular feature of the bathroom is a ceiling combination light, exhaust fan, and heater, each with individual wall controls. The walls are covered with 4" square ceramic tiles.

The walls of the livingroom, kitchenette, and bedroom are cement blocks.

The windows in each apartment are Milco aluminum horizontal rolling windows equipped with drapery hardware.

The floors are all covered with vinyl asbestos tile of a neutral shade.

In the basement of the dormitory are two large storage areas for the benefit of the students with excess furniture, a play area for the children, and a laundromat equipped with six washing machines and four gas dryers.

In front of the building will be a large lawn with a seven ft. diameter garden in the center with a birdbath and various types of flowers. Shrubbery will also be planted around the building to give it a domestic look.

In the rear of the building is a large parking lot for the students with a four foot fence separating it from the athletic field, and a large play area for the children which is surrounded by an eight foot fence.

The residence supervisor for the new dormitory is Robert Mac Gettigan, and the maintenance supervisor is Carl Lorette.

Waste barrels are placed in the rear of the building and are emptied each day by the KSC maintenance crew.

Individual mailboxes have been installed on each side of the building with the numbers ranging from 101 to 116, and 201 to 216.

Presently, there are 17 families living in the dormitory, and there are 15 apartments still available. Applications for residence are still being accepted by Dean of Men, Fred Barry. A small matter of a room deposit along with the requested apartment number is all that is needed to insure having an apartment for the 2nd semester.

The primary requisite is that an individual be a married student in good standing with the college.

The original waiting list for apartments was formed last April, 1963, and there were more applications than there are apartments, but a number of students thought that they could live elsewhere for a lower price. True, cheap quarters are always cheaper.

The college is charging \$75 a month for the one-bedroom apartments, and \$85 a month for the two-bedroom apartments. These sums include heat, electricity, hot water, modern appliances, convenient location, ample parking space, waste disposal service, among many other things, most important—cleanliness.

Candidate Shows Interest In NH And Education

Gov. Nelson Rockefeller, Republican candidate for the Presidency of the United States, spoke at Keene State College yesterday.

He aimed his speech at the students by centering it around the importance of education today.

"Never before in the history of man has the development and training of his mind been so essential to his life and work. It is in the classrooms, laboratories, and libraries that the capacity of free individuals for self-realization as well as much of the shape of tomorrow are being fashioned."

He mentioned his association with national involvement in education.

"When President Eisenhower was elected in 1952, he asked me to head up his Advisory Committee on Government Reorganization. Our first reorganization plan created the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare in 1953—bringing education and other human concerns to the highest level of government."

He went on to tell of the National Defense Education Act passed in 1958, and stated that Senator Barry Goldwater, his opponent, was one of the very few Republicans who voted against it.

"Senator Goldwater's opposition to the sound step by the Federal Government in the field of higher education of enacting NDEA in 1958 was underscored again only five weeks ago. On Dec. 10, 1963, Senator Goldwater voted against passage of the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963. The great majority of Republicans voted for the bill. Senator Norris Cotton (Goldwater's campaign manager for N.H.) voted for the bill."

"I do not need to tell you that the new Act could mean a new science building for this college."

When Gov. Rockefeller had concluded his speech, he allowed time for several questions from the audience.

By 11:45, he was on his way to give six other speeches in this area. He left for New York City at 9:30 last night from Greater Field, Manchester.

Jerry Britton, a junior at KSC introduced Gov. Rockefeller after a brief talk by President Young. Britton is a member of the Young Republicans Club on campus.

The assembly was open to the public, and several teachers from surrounding schools brought their classes to hear the presidential candidate.

Spaulding gymnasium was filled to capacity with many spectators left standing.

Two Bolivian Students Are Working In Keene

Keene's Intercultural Exchange Program has again added a little color to the KSC campus and to the community.

Susana Flores, a twenty-year-old girl from Santa Cruz, Bolivia, has temporarily joined the staff in the Registrar's office at KSC.

The purpose of her visit is to become more acquainted with the American office and to learn to speak English fluently and proficiently.

When Susana first came to the U. S., last November, she was unable to speak English, but now she is able to carry on a discussion with anyone with only minor interpretations.

Says Susana, "A girl who speaks English in Bolivia has, in a sense, her own profession."

Her father is a Gynecologist in Santa Cruz, and she is the youngest of five children.

Her education has consisted of

six years in primary school, six years in high school, and one year in secretarial school.

Before coming to the U. S., Susana worked for the Gulf Oil Co. in Santa Cruz.

Upon arrival, she lived with Mr. Roger Hunt, an engineer for the Public Service Co., at 65 Park Ave., Keene, and worked in the business office of Wright's Still-Cream Inc.

In December, she lived with Dr. David Sarner of KSC, and worked in the business office of Mac-Millin Construction Co.

Susana expects to go to Vermont on Feb. 4, for the remainder of her six-month visit, and tentatively she will be placed in one of Vermont's colleges.

When asked about her interests, she replied, "I love to study, to read, and to learn. I want to learn to speak English very well, and become a good secretary."

She went on to say, "I have enjoyed living in Keene very much. The people are very kind and I have made many good friends. I can only say I am very sorry that I must leave."

Nineteen Jordan, another 20-year-old beauty from Santa Cruz is presently located in the business office at the YMCA. She is also a member of the Exchange Program.

Nineteen was more fortunate than some of her colleagues in that she could speak English well when she came to the U. S.

Her education consisted of six years in primary school, and six years at the American Institute of Cochabamba in Bolivia. She graduated as a commercial secretary and has been employed

So she took up singing, relying at the start on the songs she had learned at Oberlin -- "mostly social protest ditties and folk ballads" -- caught on, and was on her way.

"If anyone needs proof of Judy's vocal versatility," the prospectus says, "a quick glance at the sampling of tunes on her album proves her diversification."

They range from "Lila Wine," a popular classic, through "Every Night When the Sun Goes Down" (jazz blues) to "Wade in the Water" (a
