

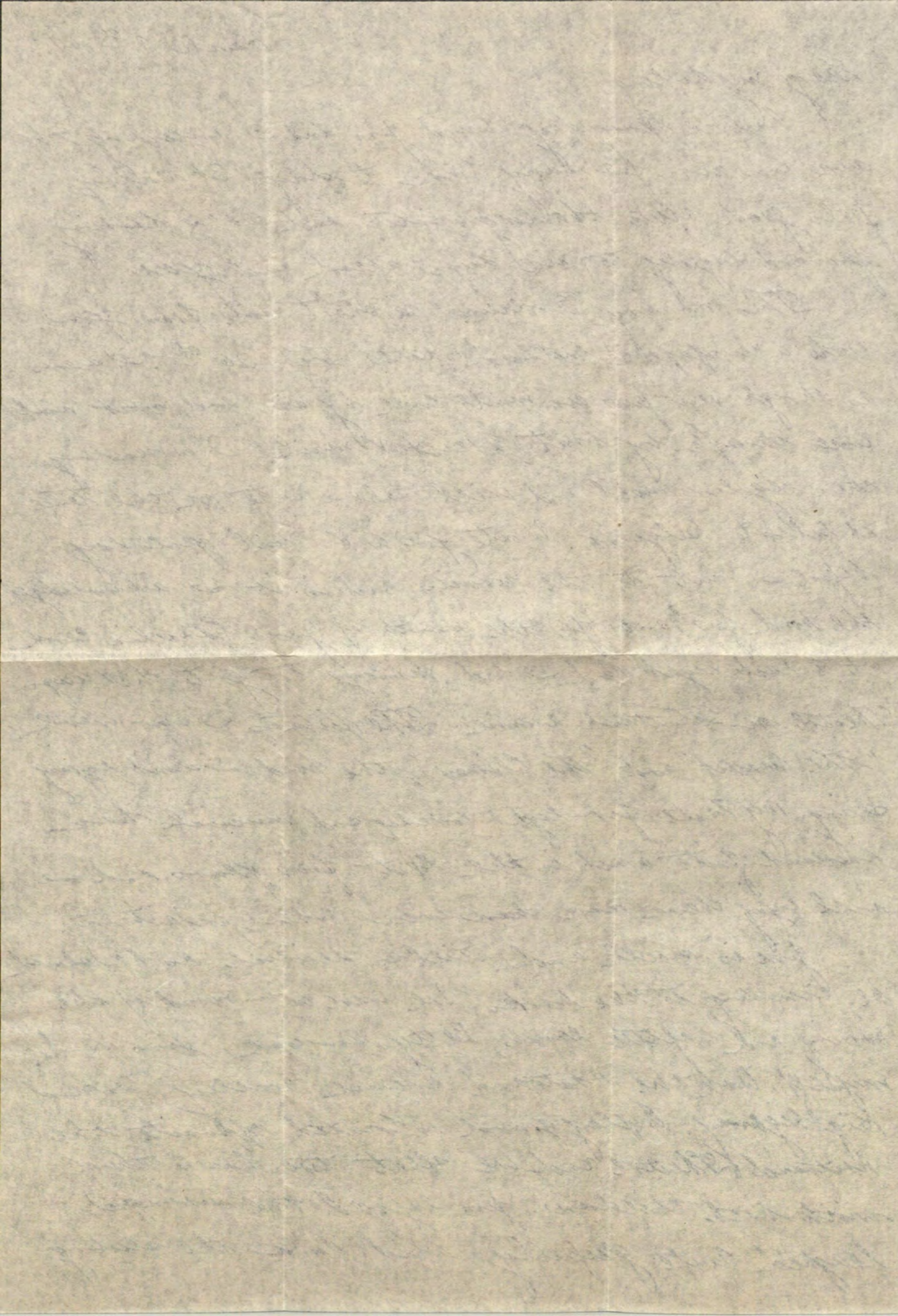
March 9th 1945.

George, my darling,

Another Spring day found Jim and I enjoying the sun and air for many hours to day. It really feels good after the long winter and we're looking forward eagerly to nice days ahead and year.

This morning I received a short note from you with a newspaper enclosed, dated Feb. 26th. It seems as though very few air mails come by air and most mail comes through by boat, except v. mail. I'm sending this regular mail and will make a note on the time it takes to Belgium. Wrote you a v. mail yesterday before I went to the movies and in it I acknowledged the bond for \$10.00 for the month of Jan. Cornelia came at 8 last night and I did manage to go to the Kings Theatre on Flatbush Avenue. The pictures I saw were "The Suspect" and "The Climax", the kind I don't enjoy seeing. My taste for light comedy and musicals has increased quite a bit in the last four years and we will enjoy them more than ever when you return.

Jim is swell and still as devilish as he should be, according to the books. We were out most of the morning and after lunch, Betty, Lawrence, Jim and myself took the Nostrand Avenue trolley toward King Highway. A playground is located opposite the Nostrand Theatre and we spent two hours there with both children. Jim enjoyed the swings, laughed quite gleefully, slid down the sliding



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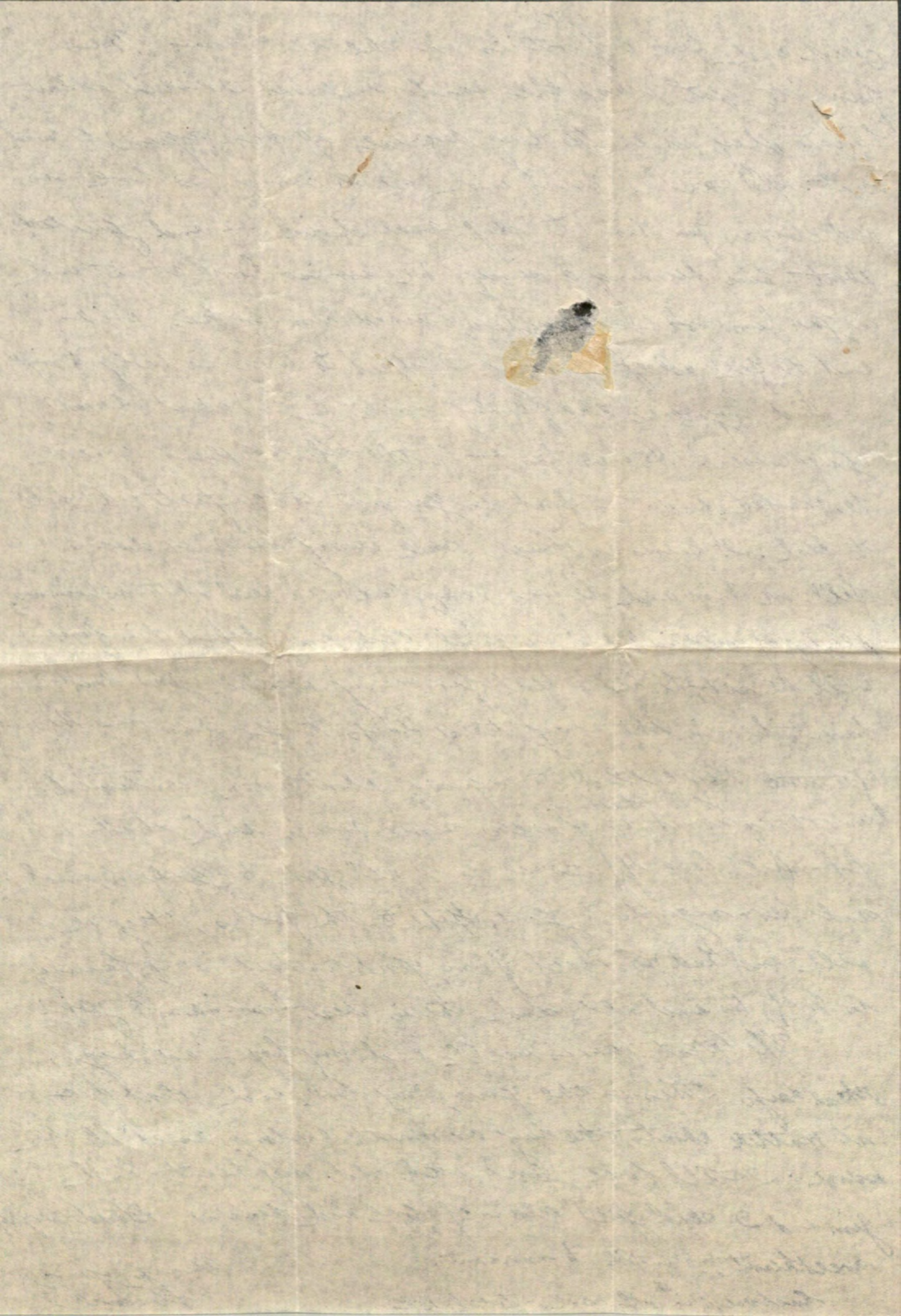

It was a mess and I'm sure I have no old clothes for him to slip around in - and you talk about him becoming a sissy. We arrived home at 5 and I gave Jim ~~and~~ ^{early} supper, tucked him in his crib and he fell asleep shortly. I expect to turn in early to night.

Did anyone in the family write to you about Aaron, your cousin? He was hurt in the defense plant where he worked and his foot is going to take quite a while to heal. It seems as though some heavy door, or door, fell on him and he was very badly in need of transfusions, plenty of medical and surgical care and before his bones will be set, he has to heal for many weeks. Hope to the folks, they're well and had no mail from you to-day. My family is O. K., two and all send their best wishes to you!

The latest news is swell and my hopes are high these days. This is the year, my love and what does it matter about the day or month as long as it'll be soon. I still love you with all my heart and Jim and I send you oceans of love and kisses. Good-night, sweetheart, until to-morrow.
