Coach Joyce's baseball team lost the opening game of the season to Worcester T. C. by a close score of 3-2. Dave Fleming pitched a tight ball game all the way, but his teammates were only able to bang out 4 hits. DiGiulio and Cavalieri each got a double, and Seaver and Hill banded out a single apiece.

But the ball players really came to life when they went to Westfield T. C. and pounded out 16 hits for a 14-5 victory. White chucked a very fine game and the big bats of the day were DiGiulio's and Cutler's with three hits apiece. Seaver and Bill Ellis each got long 3 baggers, while Chink, Soucy, Therrien, and Cavalieri slammed out two hits apiece.

Then Boston T.C. came to town and went home with a 3-1 victory. The highlight of the game was Ed Detour's long home run to right field with no one on base. Eddie Renaud pitched a very hard game and was strong at the finish, but again his teammates came up with only a half-dozen hits. Seavers and Soucy banded out a couple of solid doubles and Chink and Cavalieri got the other base hits.

KTC. traveled to Plymouth on a cold wet day and went down to our arch rivals by the count of 8-2. Facing a tough pitcher by the name

of Guy Kennison, the Owls were able to come up with only 8 hits. Also seven errors were counted against Keene and Plymouth made four mistakes. Billy Ellis, Gene Seaver, and Dave Fleming each collected 2 hits apiece—one on Billy's and Gene's being two baggers.

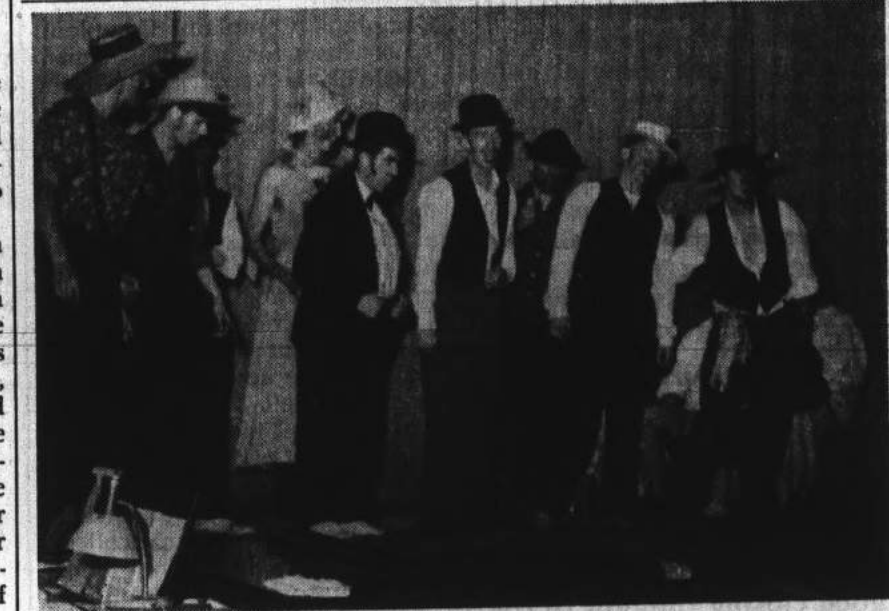

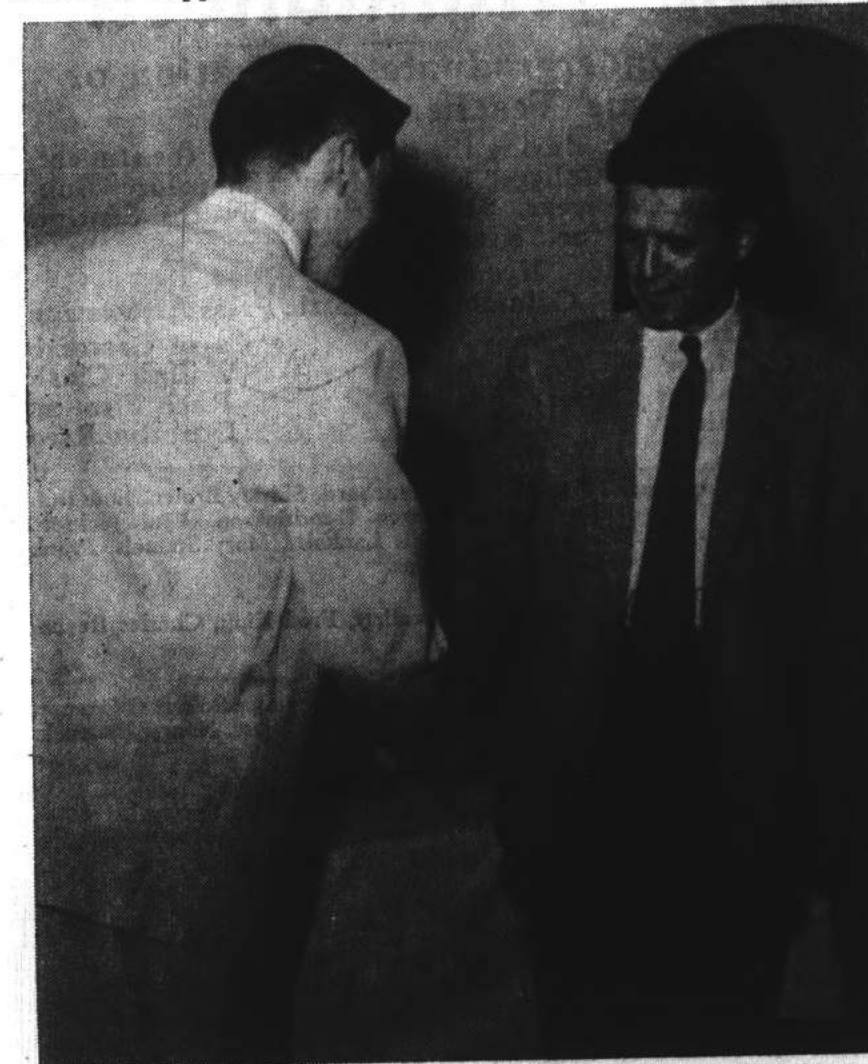
