

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

The following letter (dated September 19, 1955) was received, edited and submitted by Dr. Earley to the readers of THE MONADNOCK in the belief that it would be of interest to the many friends of Dr. and Mrs. William A. Wolfer and their daughter, Lynne Lee.

Dear Bill,

KTC is really such a fine college and I miss the privilege of working with the group—both staff and students—so much.

It is wonderful to learn of the enthusiasm you have written about—I have a special faith in that elementary senior group. They are fine young people and it would be a real pleasure to see them at their student teaching. I shall hope to see them all some day soon.

Tomorrow marks our second month here. We are beginning to feel very much at home. I finished guiding the summer session at the men's college and during that time I gave two lectures or rather held two classes, one in social studies and one in professional education. It was a rare experience. The students are not used to any class participation as their schools are run entirely on a lecture basis and it's a new idea to ask a question of a class. However, before my hour was over I had the class in a circle and several did offer some comments.

My immediate counterpart is the principal of the men's college. He was formerly the Registrar at American University in Cairo. His ideas are quite up-to-date, but the whole program is tied up in various Ministry Officials and some of the ideas will need revision, but slowly.

As a start, I held a three-day conference last week—members of the staff and our department. We took them to a village called Emmaus Kubebe, between Jerusalem and the Israeli border. Here we found a German Hospice run by a Maltese—miles away from any town and no telephone. The Hospice covers several acres, has lovely natural gardens and beautiful tall pine trees not generally seen here. It was quiet and we combined relaxation with business. All three of the American wives in Education went along and we took Lynne too. I took along our badminton set and they enjoyed it during off hours.

In the evening we showed our educational film and one for recreation, as well as colored slides. Our conference was fruitful in that we are going to teach a common core of social sciences and sciences to all students—reduction of chemistry and physics and addition of general science. This we justified on the basis that the economy of the country is basically agricultural and we do continue for many years. Thus we do not have highly trained scientists as such but, rather we need to work more practically toward the type of living school which will follow the tribes around. Azrak may well be the base for the moving school.

On the way home Major Karadshi stopped the car and said that we would go in here for a little to eat. Brother—what a feast! In Arabic. First they passed us pickled, stuffed egg plant, next fried liver with big slices of garlic on it, then a bowl of salad which everyone dipped with his fingers. Then the main course—a whole roast lamb was brought on, stuffed with rice, pine nuts and almonds. The head is left on the lamb and the eye was looking right at me. A Legion Colonel rolled up his sleeves and started. He ripped off a huge portion of lamb and gave it to me. Then heaps of rice. Next they brought on a roasted goose, and then two roasted rabbits.

Everyone ate and ate—rice is made into little balls and flicked into the mouth by the thumb. I learned my lesson—eat slowly because an empty plate gets filled again. Brother, that was a real experience. The head of the family was there—105 years old and very spry indeed. Needless to say I was bashed when I got home. It's now 48 hours later and no ill effects, so guess I made the grade. They get terribly offended if one refuses to eat their food.

In October we will make a five-day tour of the Legion Outposts to the south for the purposes of determining how we can assist teachers through in-service training. I always wondered how I would deal with an education budget, but got a very liberal education working ours out here and it has now been approved. We will have co-education in the first three grades, hoping to see it carry on into higher grades. Moslem tradition hampers much of this.

On Saturday of last week, I went where I've been told to go several times in my life—out in the desert where it was 110 to 115 degrees F. The chief and I accompanied Major Salim Karadshi of the Arab Legion to a desert legion outpost some 60 kilometers into the sea of sand, to a village called Azrak, very close to the Saudi Arabian border. The Major is an old desert hand of 25 years service with the legion and is educating the Bedouin boys and we are providing the technical assistance. Truly the desert is beautiful in spite of intense heat and sand. In the distance as we drove one could see myriads of color in hazes—ruins of Roman forts, lava beds and dried up lakes. At times we drove ten miles an hour, but on the clay beds we could travel for several miles at 65 or so. There are no roads—just wheel marks in the general direction, but the Major smelled the way for us. Upon arrival at Azrak we found a clear fresh water pond, marishes, some trees, and a few small houses as of the adobe type. A legion Camel Corps which patrols the border and rides herd on the tribes. They are well trained and fierce looking. Actually, about 90 percent of the legion is made up of men from the Bedouin tribes. Major Karadshi says they are the best soldiers and would kill their own brothers if they stepped out of line.

A couple of miles from the post one can look across the marishes to a Druse village. The boys may come to a school on a day basis. We will soon run a workshop for his teachers and also start a moving school which will follow the tribes around. Azrak may well be the base for the moving school.

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New Dormitory for Men Nearly Finished

It is hoped that before the Christmas vacation, the new men's dormitory will be completed and ready for occupancy.

Construction of the new dorm was started in April of 1954. The structure, which is three stories high, sound-proof, and fire-proof throughout, will have a large window and a sufficient number of electrical outlets to provide for study lamps, electric razors, etc.

Located on the main floor will be a large social room, featuring a television set and a fireplace. A laundry room for student use and quarters for a house mother or father will also be located on this floor.

Perforated ceiling board will be used for the ceilings in the new dorm; the walls will be plaster, and the floors will be covered with in-laid tile. The building will be heated by the college's central heating plant. There will be a wall register in each room.

The construction of the dorm was unusual in that the floors, made of cement, were poured into forms on the ground, and then lifted into place by hydraulic presses. The purpose in using this method of construction was to permit the installation of all electrical outlets at once. KTC can proudly boast that it has the first building in the state of New Hampshire constructed in this manner.

Mr. H. Dwight Carle, Dean of Men, in an interview last week stated that the new men's dormitory is the most modern dormitory on any college campus in New England. He feels that it is the finest thing that has happened for men students of the college in its entire history. Besides consolidating the student body, he feels it will exert a very democratic influence.

Thursday night, skit night, was the most active of the week. The skit, "The new men's dormitory," was being put up as fast as the wind could blow them down. A great deal of imagination and skill was put into these posters and skits should be given to those who made them.

By Wednesday, all three candidates were fairly well established in the minds of the student body, and the campaign speeches of that evening settled the matter. Each candidate enjoyed a good reception and enough humor was involved to hold the interest of the spectators.

Kappa Delta Pi to The Student Body

It seems that the award of certificates to last year's 4 outstanding Freshmen has provoked a buzz among the student body concerning the society that calls itself Epsilon Pi chapter of Kappa Delta Pi and not the fraternity that bears a name so similar to it that only one letter is changed, Kappa Delta Phi. The former, whose name appears to be so misleading to the Freshmen and Transfer Students, has different functions and a different cause.

As a result of this, many questions pertaining to the former organization have come up through different channels and from all types of students. Where did Kappa originate? What are its aims? How do you become a member? What is it composed of? What type of privileges does it offer its members? What type of activities does it participate in?

This organization started from an old educational club springing in 1909 at the University of Illinois. It became incorporated in 1911 as an educational fraternity, but changed its name to Kappa Delta Pi, an honor society in education in 1932. Our own chapter was formed in 1948 and in the same month as we are in now, November, with the Epsilon Pi attached as some designation of a new chapter.

Its aims are to encourage high professional, intellectual, and personal standards and to recognize outstanding contributions to education of race, religion, sex, or color. It is a membership society which exhibits commendable personal qualities, worthy educational ideals, and sound scholarship.

To become a member you must first be in the upper quartile of your class in scholarship or academic achievement, be in the process of completing 12 Ed. credits or having already done so, portray a professional attitude, and show signs that lead to a success in future years as a teacher, regardless of race, religion, sex, or color. You are then considered by the group and pro-rated by a number of competent people.

The society consists of institutional and alumni chapters and a Laureate Chapter. It has 194 such chapters and situated in all types of colleges and universities. It has approximately 110,000 members and continually growing. The Laureate Chapter is composed of distinguished educators, nationally and inter-nationally known, and the membership at no time exceeds 50.

One elected to the organization is a member for life. He may attend all meetings both locally and nationally. The Educational Forum is given to the members and some type of national placement bureau is maintained. Its members in turn are to live up to all expectations and to observe at all times the professional standards of the society.
