By this time you no doubt received my most recent change of address, and not assured I arrived at my new home just in time to experience some of the wind and rain that harassed the Atlantic coast. Have not received any mail from you for several days, but I expect that it will all catch up with me soon. There was plenty of work to catch up with after we got to our new camp, so I neglected to write yesterday. I hope you and Jimmy are in excellent health, and that your spirits are good in view of the highly optimistic war news.

Had a letter from Bob prior to my departure, and he seemed to be in high spirits due to his excellent grades in his recent exams. It begins

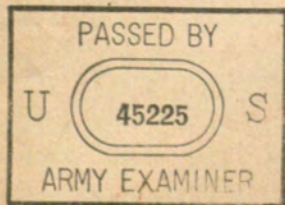
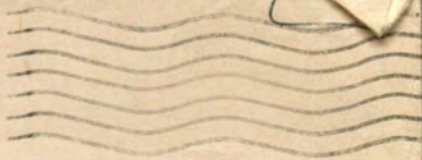
