It is hoped that we can get 100% of all eligible people to donate, so let's get behind it and push it as much as possible. There is nothing to be afraid of in donating blood; if there are any questions ask any member of A.P.O. or other persons who have given blood before.

**Gov. Hugh Gregg Addresses Student Body**  
The students of Keene Teachers College, on January 25, were highly honored and privileged to have as the principal speaker at their assembly, His Excellency, Governor Hugh Gregg of New Hampshire.

Following an Invocation by the Reverend Pike of the Episcopal church in Keene, Governor Gregg was introduced by Charles Gilman, a student at KTC. Almost immediately, the governor had everyone laughing at his very humorous anecdotes. However, it did not take long for Mr. Gregg to create an air of thoughtfulness throughout the auditorium, with his inspiring talk on Communism. In this talk he pointed out the power and danger of communism right in the United States and read excerpts from testimonies of Communists right in our own state of New Hampshire, naming such figures as Elba Chase, her son Homer, and off-gubernatorial candidate Irma Otto.

Time for questioning was allowed at the conclusion of this talk, at which time the governor made clear his position on the subjects of 18 year olds voting, of which he is in favor, consolidation of Keene and Plymouth Teachers, to which he is heartily opposed, the Air Raid Civil Defense Test, and the Newington Air Base.

Mayor Pickett was next introduced, and he polled the governor's speech with a fervent verbal drive against communism.

**Educational Assembly Given by Bell Tel. Co.**  
On Monday, January 18, an assembly was presented to the student body by the Bell Telephone Company. Mr. Edward Murphy and Mr. John Mungden of Manchester acted as demonstrators for the Bell Company while Mr. Johnston, manager of the local unit, represented Keene.

In a most clever manner, making use of music and large transmitting receivers, Mr. Mungden and Mr. Murphy explained the process of the sound wave and its course.

Following the assembly, a period was allowed for questioning, and Dean Carle made a plea to the students on behalf of the local Blood Bank.

**Urge Increased Study Of Foreign Languages**  
New York, N. Y. (I.P.)—Deploing the tendency in schools and colleges to ignore the study of modern foreign languages, Professor William R. Parker of New York University recently urged educators, "for the sake of our country and for the sake of man's hope for peace on earth, to prepare more and more Americans to meet the rest of the world half way linguistically."

Professor Parker pointed out that more than 40 per cent of the total high school population in 1915 was studying a living foreign language, and then added that, according to statistics, fewer than nine per cent of today's students in all American schools and colleges are even enrolled in a class in a modern foreign language.

The NYU professor offered a seven-point program as a substitute for "the Language Curtain of our isolationist past."

Let American parents see to it that their children acquire no subtle and insidious prejudices against foreign speech and customs.

## EDITORIAL

Through the untiring efforts of the student council, a television set was installed this past Saturday in the Parker Hall auditorium. Members of the student council have been working on this project since last spring after TV had been viewed several times on campus. The sum of three hundred dollars was allocated in the 1953-54 student activity fee budget for the purchase and installation of a television set which might be placed in a central location and used for the education and enjoyment of all KTC students. Due to several causes, however, the purchase of this set was delayed until the beginning of second semester.

It was the hope that TV could be piped into both the Parker auditorium and one of the classrooms downstairs; thus it would be available for use at all times.

However, TV is now at KTC on a trial basis both for the set itself and the students use of it. For the time being a no-smoking rule has been set up and the students have been asked to keep the place in order and as clean as possible.

Let's show that we know how to make use of a privilege and that we will use this valuable and entertaining device to the best advantage.

We note with interest the poll concerning the possibility of lowering the voting age and the results showing that a very small majority of students were against this proposal. We also note, however, that only 283 students out of an enrollment of approximately 450 were able to participate, and only six of the entire faculty cast a ballot. It is also known that none of the people who were student teaching were asked to register an opinion.

We realize that in setting up a poll of this kind it is difficult to contact everyone; however, perhaps in the future a system could be devised whereby more of the students and faculty members could be reached; thus reflecting more accurately the attitudes and opinions of the entire membership of Keene Teachers College.

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## Owls Trip Hawks of Merrimack College

KTC made shambles of Merrimack College as they opened a new rivalry at Spaulding Gym. The Owls rang up a convincing 96-61 triumph, the Owls' highest point production of the season. Merrimack, who has been idle the past ten days due to semester examinations, only made a ball game out of it for the first half. There was just no stopping the Owls as they sank a phenomenal 62 per cent of their shots in the second half.

KTC moved to a 33-17 quarter lead and increased this to a 38-22 halftime bulge. The Owls were led by the fine shooting and feeding of Captain Jesse Evangelou in the first half. The Owls outside men also completely rattled the Merrimack zone. Billy Graham's long one handers and Jay Martin's corner shooting were the chief Hawk offensive weapons.

The second half was all KTC. Fred Hale got hot from in close and Paul Bushey began to drive beautifully. After opening up a 66-39 lead, Coach Joyce emptied his bench. KTC moved the ball in for many easy shots throughout the final 20 minutes. The Owls connected on 21 out of 34 shots in the final half.

The KTC Owls rolled to their eighth victory in 10 starts with an impressive 95-56 victory over a hapless R.I.C.E. club. Spectacular Paul Bushey hooped 31 points, only two shy of the Spaulding Gym record held by Nim Grandin. The small Rhode Islanders were no match for the rangy Owls who dominated the backboards throughout.

R.I.C.E. drove into an early 7-0 lead before KTC's sensational back-court duo of "Crow" Endereson and Ed Croteau began to hit from the outside. The Owls then went on to gain a 20-13 quarter advantage. Bushey notched nine points in the initial stanza. KTC continued hot and R.I.C.E. was forced to abandon its zone. Bushey had 16 points at halftime as the Owls had opened up a 42-25 advantage.

Early in the third chapter R.I.C.E. came to life briefly. Rolfe Blais, their fine outstanding shooting guard, dropped in four field goals to cut the Keene advantage to 11 markers. Fred Hale soon found the range on some beautiful turn shots and the Owls were out in front again. Bushey dropped in 10 points during the period to help the Owls gain a 64-45 advantage. KTC completely dominated play in the final chapter. Fred Zecha entered the game and notched seven points to add to the total. KTC entered the 90's on two buckets by the vastly improved Frosh from Kingston, "Goose" Cross.

Bushey stood out for the winners with 31 points plus a fine rebounding performance. Hale chipped in with 16 points as he continued to score well and Endereson had 14. Rolfe Blais was brilliant in a losing cause with 22 markers. This marked the Owls' 13th consecutive triumph over the Rhode Islanders.

Both the freshmen and seniors will have strong teams, but their potentiality remains unknown. All the intraclass games will be played before the February vacation and when school resumes in March, all eyes will be focused towards the volleyball games.

The KTC Owls saw their conference hopes virtually die as they lost a 72-71 thriller to a classy Willimantic quintet. It was the Owls' second conference loss, both at the hands of the Nutmeg Staters. Willimantic has one conference loss while Salem continues along unbeaten and in the conference lead. The Owls blew a seven point lead in the final chapter. Great clutch shooting by Freshman Dave Shea and Junior Don Sayers in the final two minutes sealed the Owls' doom.

The shooting was brilliant throughout. Willimantic shot 50 per cent during the first half as they moved into a slim 39-38 advantage. Shea notched 12 points in the half, these mainly coming in jump shots from far out. Bushey had 13 for the Owls and Captain Jesse Evangelou 10 as the lead see-sawed back and forth through the first 20 minutes of play.

In the third period KTC moved into a quick lead on three beautiful turn shots by Fred Hale early in the stanza. The Owls held a 56-49 lead until Dave Shea hit twice to cut the advantage to three points as the quarter closed. KTC managed to keep four and five points ahead of the Educators through the first five minutes of the last chapter. The Owls then began to try to stall their way to victory. Despite some brilliant ball handling by "Crow" Enderson, the Owls couldn't withstand the Educators' surge. Shea hit on two long jump shots to knot the count at 67 all. A bad Keene pass gave the Educators possession of the ball and Don Sayers broke the tie with a one hander. A free throw by Everett Watson made it 70-67 but Paul Bushey's two free throws made it 70-69. Then Sayers broke away to score an easy lay-up to clinch matters. Fred Zecha hit with a set shot to make the final score read 72-71 in favor of the Educators.

Bushey and Shea divided high scoring honors with 27 apiece. Hale played his usual great rebounding game along with his 15 markers. However it was the brilliant all around play of Don Sayers that chilled the Owls' title aspirations.

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## Keene Team Loses Hale Bow to Salem-Nip FTC

Salem Teachers College virtually clinched the New England Teachers College Conference title by overcoming an 11 point deficit and fighting off a Keene rally to nip the Owls 65-63 at Salem. For the Witches of Salem, it was their eighth straight conference win against no losses.

The Joycemen jumped to a 17-9 lead in the first period behind the fine shooting of "Crow" Enderson, Fred Hale, and Ed Croteau. The Owls increased the lead to 11 points early in the second period by the Bay Staters cut the Owls' lead to four points at half-time 36-32.

2. Let foreign languages be introduced, along with information about foreign lands and people, in all kindergartens and elementary schools so that our children will learn early and naturally that to be "foreign" is not to be queer or unfriendly.

3. Let foreign languages be available in every high school and let them be required of students who exhibit any facility in learning them.

4. Let foreign language degree requirements be restored in all liberal arts colleges which have foolishly abandoned them, and let colleges and universities recognize a changing world by teaching a foreign culture along with and through the foreign language.

5. Let adults who once studied foreign languages now brush up on them cooperatively in service clubs or women's clubs with the aid of local teachers, and let educated foreign-born Americans help the native-born to acquire a second language and some knowledge of a second culture.

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## Te Ata Presents Indian Legend Program

A delightful evening was had by the large audience present at Te Ata's Indian Legends Program held Thursday evening, March 18, in the Spaulding Gym. It was sponsored by Keene Teachers College and the Keene Woman's Club.

Te Ata is a Chickasaw Indian from Oklahoma. She received her early education in the tribal schools and then took her degree at Oklahoma College for Women. The program was presented at the theater at Carnegie Tech's Theatrical School.

She has appeared on Broadway and toured Europe. When King George VI and Queen Elizabeth visited the U. S., Te Ata was chosen to represent the American Indian and presented her program to them at Hyde Park.

Mrs. Ball of Wilton, Connecticut, accompanied Te Ata on the drums. The program was interesting and varied. She told some of the history of her people and the migration of them to the southwest.

Te Ata's legends came from many tribes. Some of the legends on the program were: "First Birds of Spring"—Seneca; "Song of the New Born"—Chickasaw; "Song of the Maiden Weavers"—Northwest Indians; "The Legend of the Blue Duck"—Dakota.

In talking with Te Ata after the program, many interesting facts were learned. Te Ata's first costume was pale buff buckskin with fine bead work. This dress is worn by the Cheyenne Indian women. The beads are very carefully sewn on with fine stitches in a beautiful pattern. The beads were introduced to the Indian by the white man. The blanket Te Ata used in the legends, "The Blue Duck," was hand woven by one of the Osage Indians.

Addresses were given by Representatives Peter Frelinghuysen of New Jersey and James Murphy, Chairman of the National Citizens of Eisenhower.

KTC was one of the two teachers colleges that attended out of a total of over 30 colleges.
