Dear George:

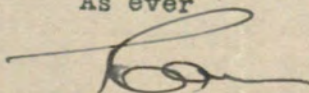
Just a couple of lines to say hello. I am on duty to-day and soon as I leave at about 5:P.M. am driving out to see Bernie out at Lakewood. Havent had a chance to see Florence this week as I have been busier than a Bat out of hell. I am working nights on Wac recruiting and what with the theatres, parade, and Department Store not to forget the Beach Brighton yesterday afternoon, I haven't had a chance to get over the house. I do hope that she ~~has~~ has a pleasant trip out ther and if there is anything that I might do out here let me know.

Now as for that matter, I am still on the lookout and very much on the ball. But it will be the results that count. Now if your hopes are too blown up I am going to take them down a bit, and I am not trying to be calloused about it. But as far as my Capt goes the deal still stands. But We have gotten a ne Colonel in charge of the Terminal and he has been going a bit heavy on the red pencil on these transfers, but by no means that it is FINIS, just keep your fingers crossed and we will see what we will. In fact I spoke to Florence last night and will try and contact her before the afternoon is up and say hello again. I told Florence that I was somewheres yesterday morning with somebody and she can explain more fully when she sees you. So Good luck and I sure have my fingers crossed. Do you Keep your mail?

There is nothinhg else in the way of news except the fact that you are indeed the fortunate one to be getting a typed letter in stead of the usual hodge podge. Oh yes I knew that I had something to tell you. As you must have been made aware there is a ASF Circular called 26 which has to do with the replacement of all men by June 30. Well get it and read it. There has been some succeeding circulars ASF pertaining to the same thing, but a new one came out I believe it is 166 which has to do with the notation that men over 35 do not have to be sent overseas. Now that doesn't mean that they won't be sent overseas, usually where units are set to go, they go, but I believe it is up to the discretion of the C.O. It's worth looking into. Eh What.

That will be about all for now. Stay well, Be Happy and I know you are going to have a hell of a good time in spite of the Army while Florence and Jimmy is still out there. What do you do with your mail?
