I am so anxious to tell you in person the things I have been waiting for so many months, that I am hoping Mr. Pinck or Addie or the office was able to get you fixed up with reservations sooner. In any event make haste; I want to see you so, and get the earliest train you can under the circumstances.

It was good to learn that all of you had a delightful day in the Park. The weather has turned quite warm here to-day, and the sun is shining brightly. Received no other letter but yours, and it does not matter, as all I want and need is you. Looked at a couple of furnished rooms last night but they lacked everything. As soon as I know definitely your arrival date I'll be able to really go to work on this problem.

No further news on my transfer request, but please remind Stan to keep on the lookout, as it may slip through without my knowing.

I also went back to the hospital to day, and the doctor advised me that I had no arthritis, or rheumatism, but that my aching legs were due to my flat feet. Since he admitted I had better arches than he could supply, and since I already had "light duty", he suggested my suffering along bravely until the war ended, and I could go home to suffer in peace. In the interim he recommended that I soak my feet alternately, one 10 minutes at a time, in hot then cold water, see what I mean?

Stock market continues upwards, and Eidler is really making a buck of dough on that tip I gave him on Int'l Del-Del; so is Harris. He too has some, and at present we have 6 points profit in allied stocks, and 3 points profit in Int'l Del-Del.
