

Tuesday eve,

Feb. 22 nd 1944

George, my darling,

It's raining quite hard now and I'll give this letter to Ben to mail in the morning. We've been indoors all day long because of the cloudy weather and rain. Mom and Pop came here about 2 p.m. and stayed until about 6. Baby sure looked great to day and Mom and Pop derived quite some pleasure from his cute antics. He wore a pair of ginger colored overalls with a white fold shirt and looked as sweet as could be and in this weather his head is full of little blonde curls. During the afternoon I took Mom to a little shop where they sell materials (the refugee, and she bought a piece of blue cloth for Anita and some striped material for herself. I also got some green corduroy for another pair of overalls for Baby.

No mail to day because of the holiday and just a few calls from my folks and Sonny who was supposed to spend the afternoon here but didn't because of the nasty weather.

I tried to get Mrs. Pincus on the telephone but I
never spoke to her at the hospital and I'll try again later
in the evening. The flowers will be sent to-morrow. Pop
must have already written to you about the script which
was put in 45 and what a relief to Pop that good
fortune was as he called him his second right hand —
you're the first. Love from your Mom and Pop.

To me you're everything, sweetheart and I'm
determined to be of good cheer and so must you until
we're again with each other. When I hear of some men
who are in 2 and $2\frac{1}{2}$ years, I'm thankful that you're
not away that long — it would seem like forever to me.
Baby and I are fine, ⁽³⁾ resting all day long and are now in
the midst of knitting a heavy white wool cardigan sweater
for our precious one. We'll have some clothes by the time
I get through with all those things I've started in the
last few weeks. Anything to keep me busy makes time go
much faster.

I love you with all my heart and hope you're
well and not worrying too much about Baby and me.
Miss and love from Baby.
